Vandals Ready For Grizzly Greats On Wet Field Winner Will Receive Little Brown Jug

Minus the services of Mack Neibaur and Ed McFaul, the Vandal grid machine will meet Montana State University this afternoon in their last conference and last home game of the year.

In comparative scores, Idaho is completely outclassed by the Grizzlies, who defeated Washington State 13 to 12 and Portland university 21 to 0. The Vandals lost to Washington State and squeezed by the Portland Pilots 20 to 14. The Montana squad has had a two week layoff while Idaho knocked up against the strong Oregon Ducks at Eugene last Saturday, and have had only three practice sessions since.

Coach Dixie Howell stated that the team had been polishing defense during the week in short, brisk workouts. Long practice sessions have not been held because of the cold, sloppy weather. Last night no workout was held because of the frosh game being played on McLean field to save Neale stadium for the varsity game.

Snow Scares Dixie

When questioned about the snow on the field, Coach Howell stated that it was old stuff to the team but kind of scared him as he had never coached under those conditions before.

Strong men in the Montana attack will be John Helling, who excels on passes, and Dan Radakovich who leads in scoring in the Pacific coast conference. Dan will probably be on the receiving end of most of Helling's passes.

Montana won the game at Missoula last year to take the little Brown Jug, which is a traditional part of the grid rivalry. Since 1938 when the stein entered the scene, Idaho has won it three times while Montana has taken it twice.

Line Good

Leading the Idaho offensive will be Billy Williams who has amassed an impressive record in games so far, this season. Billy now stands fourth in the nation and first on the coast in total offense. The Idaho line has shown itself to be a hard hitting and blocking organization and has the ability to give the "rifle" the necessary time to hit his receivers with his aerials.

Idaho Leads WSC In Gate Receipts

West Coast football ticket sales were showing the way for the rest of the nation after the first two months of competition with an average increase of 14 per cent over last year's sales. Causes for the increase on the coast were attributed to the return of California and Southern California to the ranks of the nations top teams. Also an influence in the rise is the rebirth of interest at Idaho and Montana, long time conference doormats who have been unusually potent this year.

Following the 15 per cent rise in the west, is a 12 per cent increase in the east. The south and southwest show the smallest increase for major teams with an average of around two per cent rise in attendance.

At Neale stadium in the September and October games, 40,000 fans have gone through the turnstiles. This figure compares very favorably with the estimated 12,000 fans who witnessed the first three Idaho games last year.

At Rogers' field in Pullman 17,000 fans are needed at WSC's next home game if the total number of fans is to equal last year's.

The west is leading the total attendance of sections with 2,013,605 fans for 61 games while the east, in second place has a total of 1,665,315 fans for 73 games.

Idaho's first score came early in the opening quarter when Max Graves took Johnny Brogan's pass into the end zone. Minutes later Idaho scored again on a blocked EWCE punt which was covered in the end zone by an Idaho freshman.

Following the Vandal babes second score. Coach Steve Belko sent in an almost entirely new team which was able to push over another Idaho touchdown and complete the conversion in the second period. All men of both teams were completely covered with mud after a few plays making identification almost impossible.

All Play

The starting line-up was returned to the game as the teams resumed play after the half. The inspired Idaho frosh made another touchdown a few minutes after play began and once Steve Belko sent in the second string. Substitutions were frequent as Coach Belko used the opportunity to give all of his first year men experience.

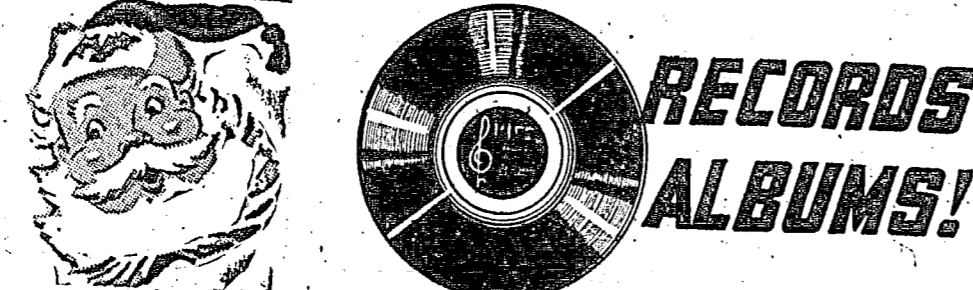
