Thanksgiving vacation, or the lack of it, is still in the minds of numerous Idaho students.

University officials have expressed a desire to give the full basis for the calendar committee's decision on the vacation issue.

First: The university's academic year is kept as short as possible. Idaho starts late in the fall to permit students from rural areas—and we have lots of them—to finish the fall farm work.

Second: Icy roads, crowded busses and trains add to Idaho's transportation problem.

Third: From the administrative angle, it is not economically feasible to shut down a large university for four days, when three weeks later it will again close.

Fourth: Idaho officials don't care when other schools hold their vacation periods. Idaho has academic requirements to meet, and is going to meet them.

Most veterans wish that their subsistence allowance was larger. Two veterans, Leo Smith, and John Mast, inform Jason that they are trying to do something about it.

The pair have written letters to their congressional representatives. Too long to print in the Arg's limited space, the letters present the ex-G.I.'s financial problems at this institution.

They suggest that the congressmen "Be the first... to take immediate action that will culminate in the revision of... P.L. 346 so that veterans will be enabled to maintain a fair and decent living."

The pair also wrote on Bennett Meyers, the former Air Forces Procurement officer being prosecuted for fraud, perjury, and evasion of income tax.

Their letter tells of the inconsistencies of punishments given enlisted men as compared with sentences given officers.

Nine men were selected Wednesday night for membership in Xi Sigma Pi, honorary forestry fraternity.

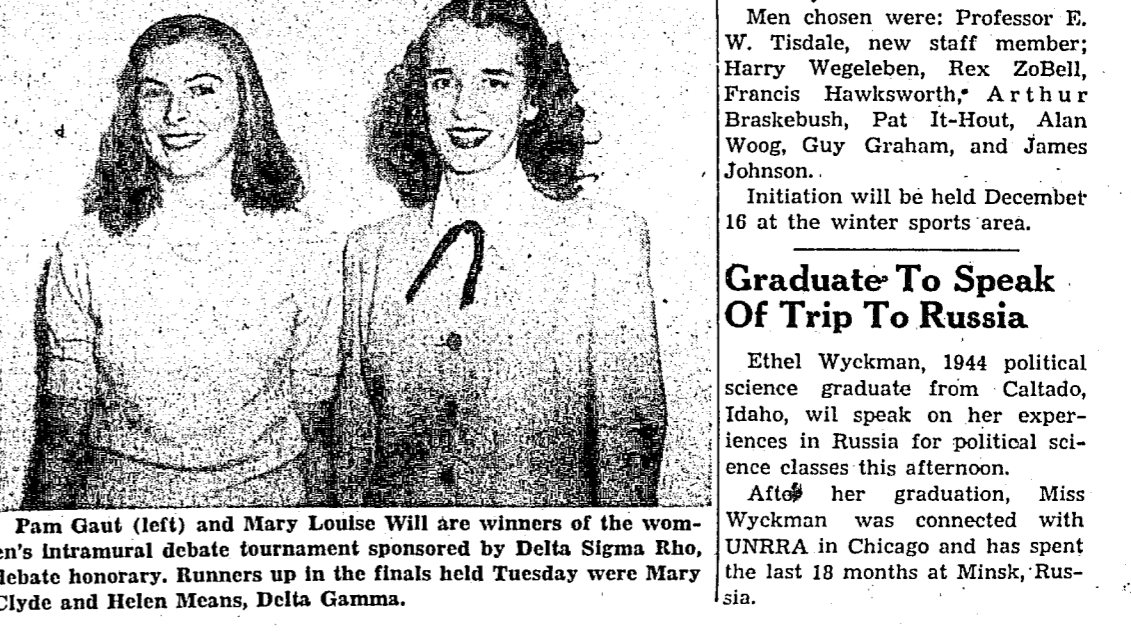

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Geology Instructor Opens New Field Of Research

George J. Neuberger, instructor in the geology department, who is the first man to view optical figures obtained from opaque or non-transparent minerals, has opened an entirely new field of research in basic science.

Neuberger, who is 23 and one of the youngest scientists on the university's staff, began his experiments at the University of California while working for his master's degree. He was studying covellite and discovered the "missing link" of opaque minerals—an optical figure.

Report of his findings was recently published in the American Mineralogist, official publication of the Mineralogical Society of America. This field is so new that Neuberger could find no previously written material on it.

According to Dr. Vernon E. Schied, head of the geology and geography departments, "Neuberger's discovery brings us to the same point with opaque minerals that we were with transparent minerals 90 years ago. The possibilities for further research and development are almost limitless."

Group To Continue Industry Intern Project For Year

In an effort to give young people, especially college students, the opportunity to see industry from the inside, the American Friends Service Committee is sponsoring an Intern-in-Industry project in Philadelphia. This is the fourth year the committee has carried on its work.

The project is year-around. Interns may join at any time and participate as long they desire, at least two months being preferred. They live cooperatively in a large house in south Philadelphia at reduced living costs. The young people find their own jobs at prevailing rates of pay in Philadelphia industry.

Winners must write a 5000 word essay on the subject "An American Program for World Peace in the Present Crisis." Further information may be obtained from the Arg office.



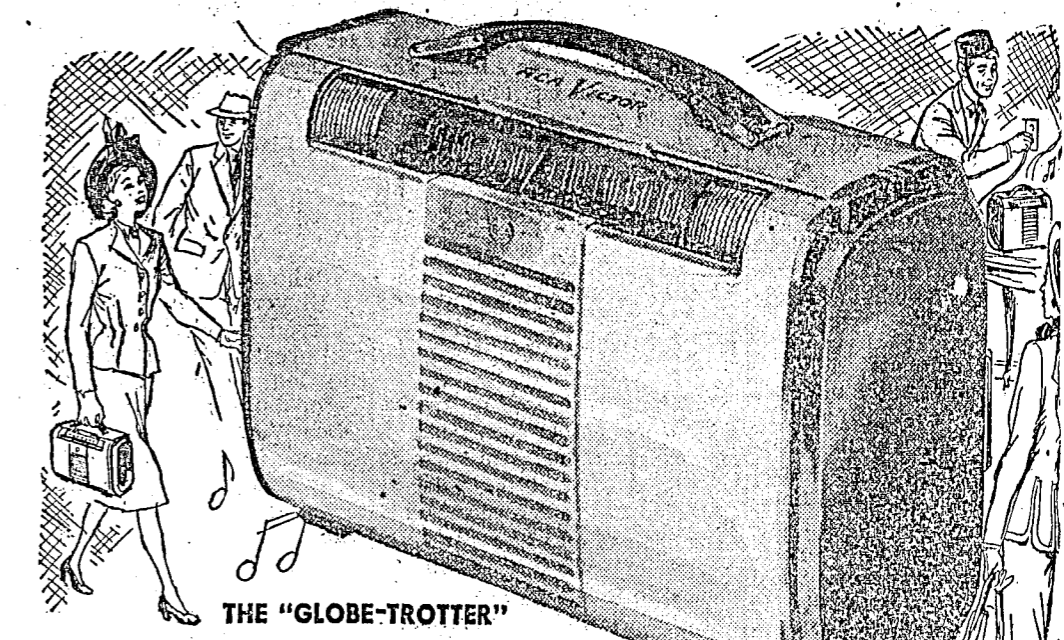
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Pedestrian Responsibilities

IRC Delegates Debate Hysteria As Cause Of War

"There will not need to be another war if the hysteria can be stopped" was a major argument brought out at the International Relations Club Pacific Regional conference which met in Vancouver, B.C. on November 21 and 22.

Papers on current situations in Asia, Europe, and the United Nations provided starting points on three round table discussions. The major resolution for the strengthening of a precarious peace was the fuller cooperation by all members of the UN.

Seven members of the Idaho club arrived early Friday morning in time for the opening session at 9 a.m. Following welcoming addresses by the region's officers, the 144 delegates from 26 schools of northwest United States and western Canada attended round table discussions in which they were most interested.

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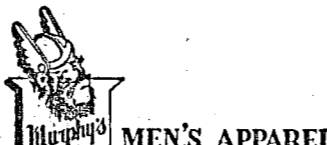
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Houses, Engineers Plan Pre-Christmas Dances

Vandal Boxers To Meet Southwestern Louisiana

The Idaho Vandal boxing team, preparing to defend their share of the national intercollegiate ring crown, today announced the Idaho ring schedule for the winter and spring season, listing nine dual meets. Last year Idaho shared the national team title with the University of Wisconsin as two Idaho fighters walked off with national crowns.

Of these two, Herb Carlson is back with the Idaho squad this season, fighting at 160 pounds. The other, Laune Erickson, has completed his varsity experience. Erickson is one of the three college boxers in the nation to win three national crowns. Ted Kara, also from Idaho, won three ring crowns in 1939, 1940 and 1941. Erickson won his in 1940, 1941 and 1946.

Coach Ken Butler, in commenting on the ring schedule, said 40 potential boxers were trying out for the squad, with five returning lettermen. Besides Carlson, the other award winners are Ray Radford at 126 pounds, Dorsel C. Clure at 126 pounds, Darrel Titus at 147 pounds and Ted Diehl at 175 pounds.

Idaho opens the ring season away from home on Jan. 14, 1948 at Lafayette, Louisiana, against Southwestern Louisiana Institute. Two days later, they battle LSU at Baton Rouge before coming back to Idaho.

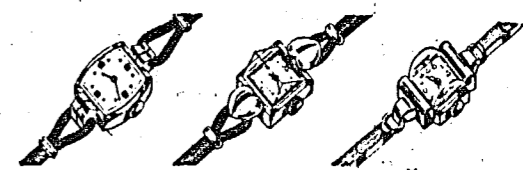
