Council 'Adopts' Two War Orphans For Year's Care

The Idaho campus seemed to buzz with life this week as students returned for the final run to the end of the semester. The "hellos" were more frequent and friendlier, the classes were fuller, people seemed more "alive" after the two-week vacation.

The Interfraternity council has again this year adopted two children under the Foster-Parent's plan for War Children. Each fraternity contributed \$30 to make a total of \$360 for the care of the two children for one year, according to Chuck Gilb, council president.

Moscow's rain and near flood stopped Northern Pacific trains but it made few changes on the campus. Women complained that the curl was leaving their hair. Campus eateries overflowed, but school life maintained its pace.

The two children assigned by the organization to the council are Bernard Come, 11-year-old French boy; and Johannes Van der Veer, 14-year-old Dutch boy. These children are not the same ones adopted by the council last year under this plan.

Students awoke suddenly to the fact that final exams are only two weeks away. Jason heard more than one person say, "Wish I hadn't let myself get so far behind in my classes."

Bernard is described as typical of Europe's war children—undersize, under weight, undernourished and extremely nervous. When France was invaded and occupied by the Germans, his father was seized by the Germans for his activities in the Maquis, and for his political opinions and shot.

During the occupation Mrs. Come, Bernard and an older brother endured cold, hunger, fear, bombings and the shock and grief of the father's death. At the end of the war, they were destitute.

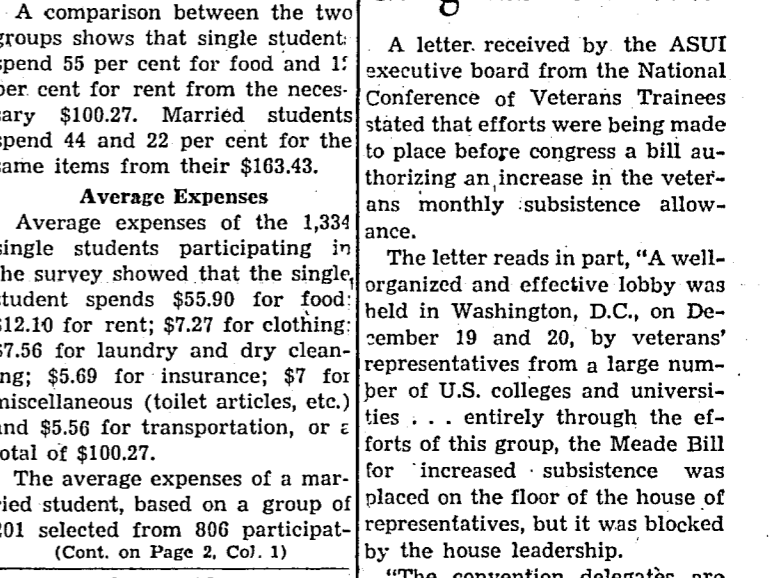
Veterans Urged To Write Their Congressmen Now

Foundation Puts Peace Problems To HS Seniors

High school seniors of the state were asked today by the University of Idaho to do some thinking—and writing—on world peace.

An essay contest was announced for the students under the sponsorship of the William Edgar Borah Outlawry of War Foundation at the university. The foundation was established in 1929 by Salmon O. Levinson of Chicago "in recognition of the priceless contribution of Senator Borah to the cause of world peace."

Subject of this year's essay contest will be "My Personal Attitude Toward Contemporary Efforts to Establish World Peace."

"Purpose of the contest," said Dr. Boyd Martin, chairman of the foundation committee, "is to encourage the young people of Senator Borah's home state to learn and think more about the current efforts to achieve the objective toward which Borah was working until his death—a world that should be free from war and from the fear of war."

Essays will be submitted through the students' own high schools. Both district and state prizes will be awarded. All prize winners will be invited to attend the Borah Conference for the Outlawry of War at the University of Idaho, April 14, 15 and 16.

Vandal Boxers Prepare For Louisiana Openers

Air-Minded Squad To Leave Monday

Road work, rigorous exercises, and four three-minute rounds of hard and fast fighting is the present bill of fare for the Vandal pugilists as they prepare for the forthcoming trip to Louisiana. The squad will leave from Spokane's Geiger field at eight a.m. Monday via the United Air Lines. An overnight stop will be made at Denver, Colorado. Tuesday morning they will proceed, again via air, to the "land of cotton." Those slated to make the trip are as follows: Ken Clark, 125; Ed Morgan, 130; Dale Hammond, 135; Darrel Titus, 145; 155 pound representative will not be chosen until Friday; Herb Carlson, 165; Ted Diehl, 175; and Will Overgaard in the heavyweight spot. These are last years weights and will be used only in the fights at Louisiana. All other meets this year will be at the Olympic weights.

John McNeese First
The Vandal's first card will be with John McNeese Junior College Wednesday, January 14, at Lake Charles. Thursday morning they will travel to Baton Rouge where they will meet Louisiana State Teachers College Friday evening, January 16. Ken Butler, who piloted last year's Vandal fighters to a tie with Wisconsin for the National Inter-collegiate boxing title, declined comment on his team possibilities. He stated only that, with the exception of the two newcomers in the 130 and 155 pound weight divisions, the team is in excellent shape. Many of the fighters who turned out at the beginning of the season have quit, and Coach Butler would welcome anyone interested in the "manly art of self defense."

Idaho Tank Squad Shows Prospects

Several new men have turned out for swimming squad and coach Kirkland reports that prospects are looking better for the January meet with the University of Washington.

Among the promising turnouts are Ken Baily, a backstroker who has returned from last year's squad; four free stylists, Gerald Weaver, Coyt Payseur, Vaun Bollingbroke, and Wayne Stewart; and Wally Warner, breast stroker, who was on a doubtful status for a while.

Kirkland stated that John LaFrenz is looking especially well in the 50 yard free style and should be able to pick up a few points for the team there.

Jim Farmer and Jack Smith have been practicing high diving at Pullman, thereby increasing the Idaho team's chances in that division.

Sparks' Scorebook Gains Popularity

Lester J. Sparks, Physical educator, did much for the game of basketball, when 25 years ago he organized his unique combination basketball scorebook and basketball charts to assist coaches in selecting their material.

The record is kept on a replica of a half court, one for each time. The regulars and substitutes are denoted by a different colored pencil marking their shots at the place on the floor where the ball was shot and whether the shot was made.

This combination also provides a place on the scorebook for recording the loss of the ball by passes, violations, fumbles and backboard work.

Sparks has not commercialized his ideas, but has requested for about a hundred copies of the scorebook each year from colleges and high schools. The University of Oregon has used the "Sparkbook" for several years.

The scorebook and shotchart combination can be changed to suit the needs of different coaches, Sparks revealed.

On February 19 of last year, the Oregon State Beavers rolled into Moscow boasting a record of 10 wins and only one loss. The lowly Vandals hadn't won a conference basketball game all year, and had lost 13, two of these in Corvallis. But the Vandals found themselves that Friday night, and surprised the Beavers and everyone else. They jumped into an early lead over the Oregon Staters and never relinquished it, winning 57-46. Jack Phoenix held the great OSC center, Red Rocha, to three free throws as he piled in 12 points himself and watched his teammates, John Evans and Norm Fredeking pour in 16 and 11 respectively to make Crandall's 19 for Oregon State quite useless.

On April 26, the Oregon State track squad journeyed to Moscow, and came out on the short end of a 69-61 count. Dick Armstrong, Jay Gano, Dick Wilcomb, and Norman Farnham led the Vandals to another surprise over the boys from Corvallis.

Baseball Too
The Vandals did it again on May 55 and 6. This time it was Guy Wicks' baseballers who turned back the touring Beavers, 6-4 and 4-1. "Lefty" Auer held the Beavers to 7 hits as his teammates pounded out 13 and committed only one error to, three for Oregon State. Don "Red" Fodrea led the Vandals attack with a perfect afternoon at the plate, hitting 4 for 4.

In the second game, Fodrea took the mound to hold the Beavers to 5 scattered singles, and stretched his hitting streak to six as he hit 6 for eight in the series.

Next Monday and Tuesday the Beavers will be in Moscow again. Maybe that Vandal jinx will prevail.

Until recently it was believed that since varsity boxers had switched to Olympic weights, the green light would be given to freshmen for varsity competition. 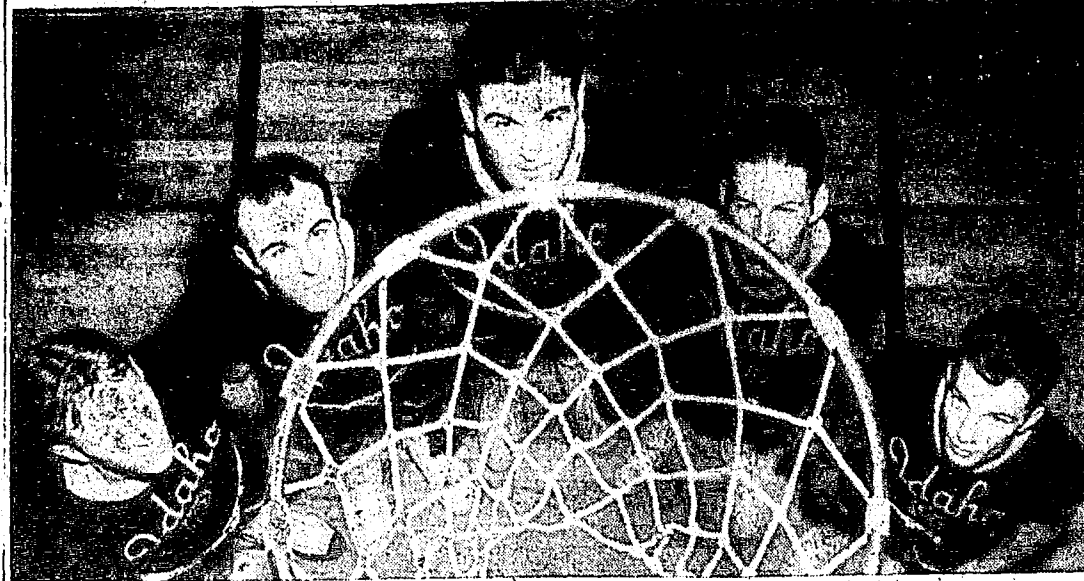

Wisconsin To Sponsor 1948 NCAA Boxing Tournament

The University of Wisconsin has agreed to sponsor the 1948 NCAA boxing tournament April 1, 2, and 3, according to I. F. "Crip" Toomey, Pacific Coast representative of the NCAA boxing committee. Since these dates are one week previous to the dates originally set for the Pacific Coast tournament, the dates for the latter will be changed to March 15 and 16.

The national tournament in 1948 is an Olympic regional trial, the winners of which qualify for the Olympic Final trials in Boston for selection of the sixteen boxers for the United States team. The Pacific Coast meet will be held earlier in order that member colleges who desire to do so may send their qualifying and best men.

Freshmen Ineligible
Freshman, transfers, graduates, and other students who may be ineligible for scholastic or other reasons will not be permitted to participate in the NCAA. However, all of these above-mentioned persons may get a chance in the trials for the Olympics which in boxing means entering the Olympic sub-regionals in the district in which their college is located. If no sub-regional is to be held, then they can enter the regional. For the Olympic year, no penalty will be attached to such competition. This granted permission is specifically for Olympic trials and does not include every AAU or other tournament which may be held during this year prior to the Olympics.

The following colleges have requested permission to participate in the Pacific Coast tournament this year: Santa Barbara college, Chico State college, Humboldt State college, St. Mary's college, and Gonzaga university.

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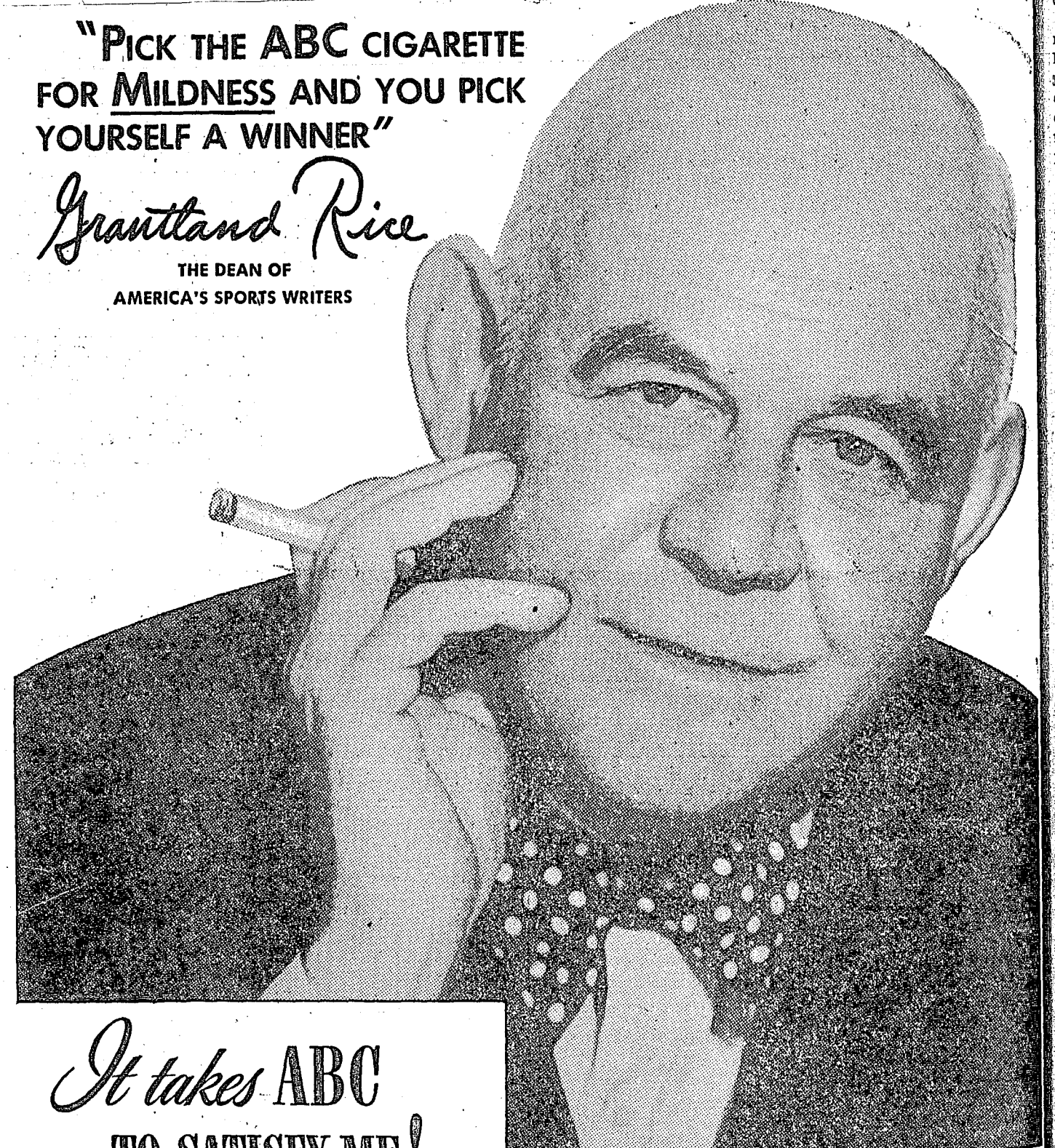
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
