

DePalmo Cracks Record In First Cinder Meet

Vandal Trackmen Win Three, Tie One

An Idaho fleetfoot provided the feature attraction at the invitational track meet at the Washington State field house last Saturday. LeRoy DePalmo, Vandal cinder aspirant, breezed over the 300-yard run in 33.5 seconds, shattering the previous record of 34.3 seconds held by Washington State's Christianson.

Dick Wilcomb, John Taylor and Max Lattig also placed well for the Vandals in the four team competition. Wilcomb copped a first in the javelin event; and Taylor led the pack to take first place in the 70-yard low hurdles. Lattig tied the Cougars Shattock for the top spot in the pole vaulting. Participants from Idaho, Washington State, Montana and Whitman competed in the meet.

A two-mile exhibition was run by Fred Wilts, a University of Indiana graduate studying at W.S.C. and in training for the Olympics. He was clocked at 9:23 for the race.

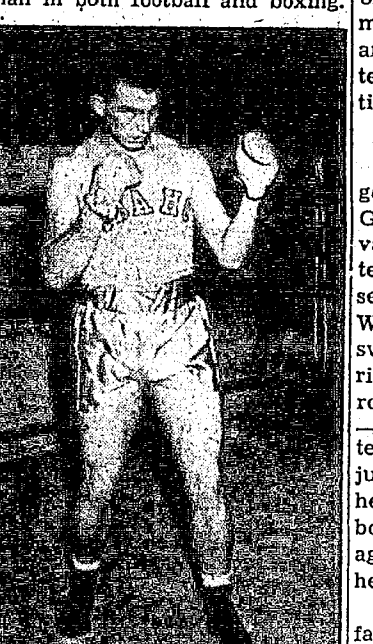
..... Portraits
Ted Diehl, Vandal letterman in both boxing and football, was born at Twin Falls, Idaho, on February 16, 1926. He attended grade school and high school at Jerome, Idaho, and was a four-year letterman in both football and boxing.

When he graduated from high school, Ted entered the Navy Air Corps. He attended school at Idaho State College under the Navy V-5 program, but didn't interrupt his athletic career. He played football at Idaho State, and won the 154-pound Inter-mountain golden gloves title.

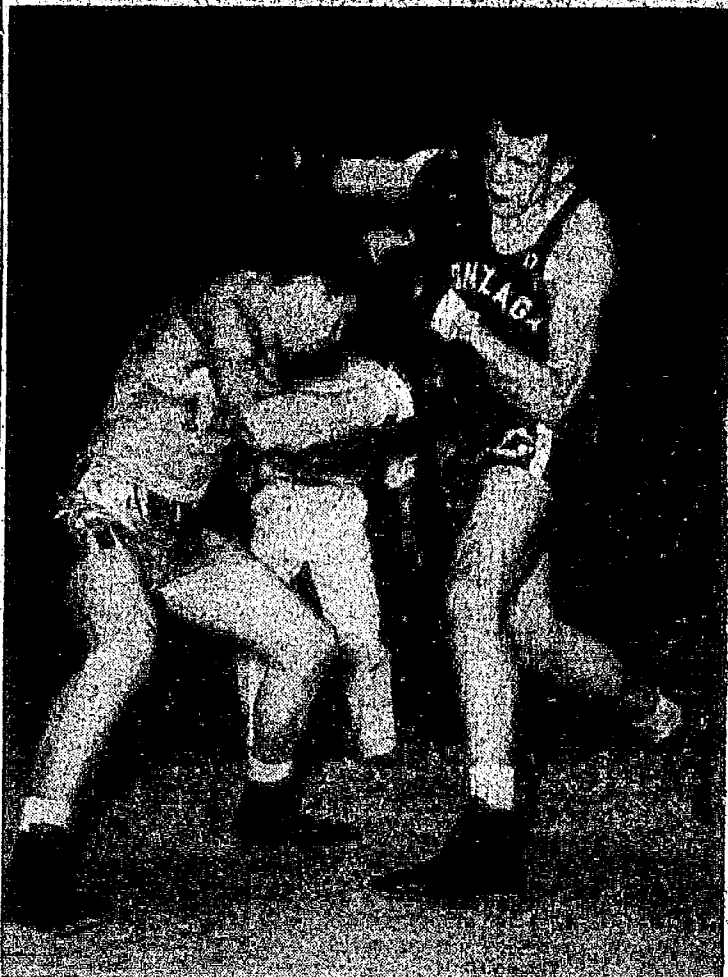
Ted was sent from Pocatello to St. Mary's college in California, where he continued boxing and playing football. His boxing coach was Ike Deeter, now at Washington State college. He played football under the guidance of Frank Leahy, Jim Lawson, and Art Lewis.

From St. Mary's, Ted proceeded to Glenview for his primary training, and on to Corpus Christi, Texas, for his wings, and was discharged there in May, 1945.

Coach Finley announced that he would take two catchers, five infielders and four outfielders on the Walla Walla trip, along with the pitchers who are ready to take the mound.
