KUOI War Scare Alarms Campus

KUOI phone lines were swamped with scores of indignant listeners who didn't appreciate The Paulsen Playhouse April Fool production of "Attack" during and for an hour following the broadcast Wednesday night.

The play, a modernization of the Orson Welles invasion from Mars broadcast of 1935, reported an atomic attack on Washington, D.C., and ended when "N.B.S." in New York was forced to leave the air in the face of a second attack on that city. Despite melodramatic acting and pulsating sound effects records, listeners found the program realistic enough to be "not very funny."

When calls became threatening towards the end of the program, Maurice Paulsen and the actors drew the broadcast to a hasty and nervous conclusion with the emphatic announcement, "We repeat, this has been an April Fool broadcast entirely from the studios of KUOI."

The revised ASUI constitution was taken to Focattello for presentation to the board of regents by President J. E. Buchanan this week. The president had made some changes in the constitution which were "reluctantly" approved by the executive board.

The constitution, brought up to date after two months work by the executive board, must be approved by the board of regents and voted on by Idaho students before it goes into effect.

The changes made by President Buchanan placed further limitations on the board's powers. Seven members refused to vote on approval of the president's revisions leaving a vote of one affirmative and one negative. This constitutes an affirmative vote according to Robert's Rules of Order.

President Buchanan is expected back with the constitution Sunday night.

April Fools day in French means "poisson d' Avril" and if you were the object of a joke from one of your friends yesterday, you were a "sucker" for that's what April 1 means in English.

Since early times, the first of April has been associated in the United States, as in many other countries, with playing harmless pranks on friends and neighbors who have forgotten the change in dates.

The reason for observing April 1 in this manner is not known definitely but one of the stories connected with its possible origin is the one about Noah. It seems that in the year 1760 Noah made the mistake of sending his dove out of the ark before the water had abated, and to remember this mistake, it was thought proper that whoever forgot so remarkable a circumstance, to punish them by sending them upon some "sleeveless" errand similar to that infelicitous message upon which the bird was sent by the patriarch.

Pints of Pigeon Milk

What are known as "sleeveless errands" have always been a favorite on April Fools Day in England. People caught being so simple as to ask at the village bookstore for a "History of Eve's Grandmother", for a "pint of pigeon's milk" at the grocer's or for a "strap of oil" at the cobblers were the object of much laughter.

Pranks on April 1 that were used long ago are still in practice today by the young and old alike. Some of the more common ones are leaving a valuable looking package in a public place which really doesn't have anything in it, placing a brick under an old hat on the side-walk for the passer-by to kick at with disastrous effect on his toes, placing a purse with a string attached to it in a public place and jerking it away when someone seeks to grasp it, or laying a hot iron carelessly around where it may be picked up and dropped are just a few of the pranks. One of the newer jokes is to give your best friend a piece of candy which is plentifully spiced with cayenne pepper.

Engineering Jobs Open In Virginia

The Civil Service Aeronautics Advisory Committee is accepting applications for positions at Langley Field, Virginia.

Florence Anne Borroughs of St. Maries received \$75 as second place winner and Gayle Loosli of Ashton won the third prize of \$50.

\$847.50 Awarded

Names of the contestants were not known until after the prizes were awarded. Judges knew manuscript writers by number only. A total of \$847.50 was awarded to boys and girls throughout the state from the Borah foundation which was established at the University of Idaho 19 years ago with a \$50,000 bequest from the late Salmon O. Levinson, noted Chicago attorney who honored Senator Borah in this way.

JEFFERSON'S ROUGH DRAFT OF THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

A Declaration by the Representatives of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in General Congress assembled. When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's god entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation. We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness; that to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, & to institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles & organizing it, powers in such form, as to them shall

Johnson Cops Lead In Tennis Tourney

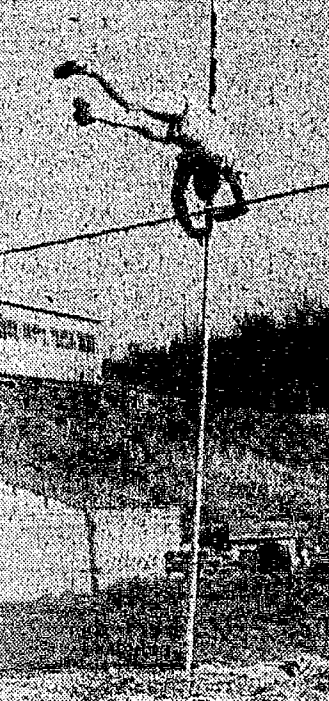
