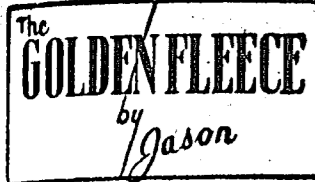

ASUI Play Ends Borah Foundation Discussions of Peace

'State of Union' Gives Laughs And Lessons; Second Showing Tonight

Delightfully mixing laughs with a pointed political lesson, the ASUI comedy "State of the Union" draws its curtains at 8:15 tonight on the second of its three-night run. A record Thursday night audience called the cast back for two curtain calls.



Now being billed as a part of the Borah Foundation conferences, the Broadway hit by Howard Lindsay and Russell Crouse romps through three acts with two main plots: the conflict between the presidential possibility Grant Matthews and his estranged wife, played by Bob Miller and Pat Barnes, and the conflict between him and the political forces that would like to fit him to their pattern.

Honorary Seeks Support For Democracy Plan

Steps to eliminate a "non-Caucasian" clause from national constitution were taken by Blue Key, upperclassmen's honorary, this week when the group sent letters to most Western Blue Key chapters to enlist their aid.

Unable to send a delegate to Reno for the organization's Western regional conference to be held the third week in May, Idaho Blue Key has asked the University of Southern California chapter to present its stand on the question.

As the constitution now reads only "male Caucasians" may be pledged to the group. The chapter hopes eventually to muster enough strength to amend the national constitutional.

Conclusions Of Three-Day Foundation To Be Given At Final Session Today

A summation of the various views expressed and the conclusions of the forums will be presented in the final general session this afternoon which will conclude the three-day peace conference of the William E. Borah Foundation for the Outlawry of War at the University of Idaho.

Phi Delt's Object To Caucus System; Enter Withdrawal

Phi Delta Theta withdrew from the Greek Caucus following a meeting Tuesday night. In an open letter to Idaho students the fraternity listed the following reasons for their action:

"We do not believe in: (1) Intra-party rotation system of voting, (2) The maintenance of two parties as they stand. Parties controlled for the interest of a select few to the exclusion of interested persons within the party, (3) Parties drawn along arbitrary lines. That is, Greeks versus Independents, (4) Compulsory voting.

"Under the present political system, persons in student body offices are not usually representative of the ASUI. The office of President, for example, is the only contact that the students have with the administration and the State of Idaho as a whole. Persons filling this office should be the ones best qualified from the entire student body irrespective of any political alliance.

Wants Primary
"We feel that true representation can be attained only through a non partisan system, wherein those persons feeling themselves qualified to fill an office may be nominated by petition and run on a primary ballot. The two persons receiving the most votes would oppose each other in the final election.

"We wish to make clear that we have no intention of forming a third party, but will strive in every way to abolish the present system and create one in which each student may voice his individual opinion without influence from any political party."

"State of Union" Applauded

Graduate School Arranges Nuclear Engineer Course

A cooperative agreement between the new graduate school of nuclear engineering at the General Electric atomic engineering works, Richland, Wash., and the university was announced today by Dr. C. W. Hungerford, dean of Idaho's graduate school.

Developed during recent conferences between F. Ellis Johnson, director of the nuclear engineering school at Richland, President J. E. Buchanan and Dean Hungerford, the cooperative agreement has been approved by the Idaho board of regents.

"This agreement brings the University of Idaho into the newest field of engineering—developing uses for the energy resulting from smashing the atom," explained Dean Hungerford. "Under the plan, employees at Richland will be able to do graduate study, under General Electric scientists, with their credit accepted toward a master's degree from the university. It also opens the door for graduate students and faculty members at the university to go to Richland for special work in this new field."

Seven employees at the General Electric plant already have signed up to do their graduate study under the Idaho cooperative plan and others are interested, Dean Hungerford explained. A maximum enrollment of 15 to 20 is possible.

More Than A Slide Rule Necessary For Engineers

"A slide rule and an engineers' handbook is all you need to be a successful engineer," according to the sophomore engineer. Most of the remainder of the class agreed.

The senior engineers didn't agree. After four years of carrying 19 hours a semester they felt they had at least some qualifications other than the ability to use a few tools.

Quite often the last two years of their course developed into a great deal of work. The classes stressed solving problems and the problems the engineers solved were usually long—taking from one to 20 hours—and were always hard.

Not Worth Time

If there were few engineers attending the meetings of the Borah Foundation, it wasn't because they weren't interested. It was more probably because they had some problems to do.

Were the problems worth the time spent on them? A strong "No" was the answer of at least one senior engineer. He felt that after a while they became merely exercises in multiplication and graph-drawing. The time, he said, could be better spent studying principles.

A few less required courses would also be desirable, he said. The engineers feel a need to take courses in literature, psychology and social sciences. They also wanted to spend a little less time solving problems and a little more time attending Borah Foundation forums and listening to Yehudi Menuhin.

Only then would they be satisfied with their college education—for then the answer to the question "What do they expect to get out of college?" would be the same thing "What would they like to get out of college?"

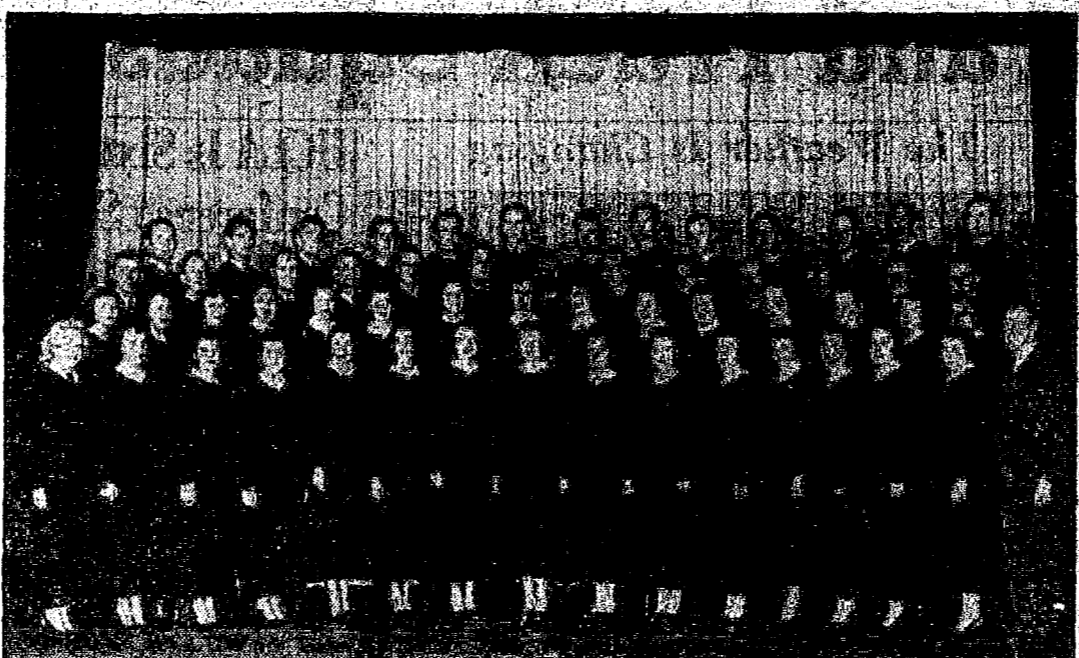

They meet the University of Washington Huskies at Seattle today and tomorrow for the games that open their conference season. The Idaho club meets the Oregon Ducks at Eugene next Monday and Tuesday, and then travels to Corvallis to clash with the OSC nine before proceeding home.

The Vandal aggregation is fairly deep in most positions this year, especially in the hurling department. Seven pitchers are included on their traveling roster, including last year's veterans Francis "Lefty" Auer, Don Fodrea, and Arnold Beebe. Also on the pitching staff are Fred Klink who played in the outfield last year, Bob Linck, Chuck Plastino, and Don Hunt. The catching department boast Carl Munson and Bill Williams. Dex Linck will again handle first base; Ozzie Kanikkeberg, second base; Tobe Masingill, third base; Cliff Masingill, short stop; Calvin Sparks, right field; Chuck Cooper, center field; Joe Grove, left field. Joe Whitcomb will go along as utility man, and Everett Rice as manager.

Good Record

Idaho has an impressive pre-conference record of 9 victories, 3 losses and a tie in 13 games. Pre-conference victories included wins over the Bremerton Blue Jackets of the WIL, Whitman, Faragut college, and Gonzaga. The lone tie occurred in a night game with the NICE Loggers at Lewiston Wednesday night when the game had to be stopped at the end of the eighth inning with the score knotted at 8-all. Due to a city ordinance the lights had to be turned off before the game was over.

The Idaho baseball team is expected to better the record of last year's squad which was victorious in only four of their 16 conference games.

Net Squad Meets Cougars Tomorrow

The Vandal tennis squad, headed by newly elected Captain John Bretz, travels to Pullman Saturday to clash with the Washington State college racket team. The matches will begin at 2 p. m. The Idaho squad is composed of Jack Rainey, John Bretz, Hal Barnes, and the victors in this afternoon's matches which pit Tom Benson against Mark Euscher, and Bill Cartin against Nolan Johnson.

In matches held Monday night to determine the preliminary lineup to meet the Cougar squad, Jack Rainey downed Tom Benson 6-3, 6-2; Mark Euscher defeated Nolan Johnson 6-2, 6-2; John Bretz overpowered Mark Thome 6-1, 6-0; and Bill Cartin won over Howard Berger 6-2, 6-4.

Vandal Coach Eric Kirkland stated that his squad has an even chance to defeat the Cougars and added that the team has been improving by leaps and bounds. He was particularly strong in his praise for Tom Benson, a new man on the Idaho courts, who will bear watching.

The University of Idaho track squad, under the guidance of Coach Stan Hiserman, will open its conference season at Moscow tomorrow against the Washington State college Cougars. The Vandals' previously scheduled opener with the Oregon Ducks, slated for last weekend, was cancelled because of a wet track.

Idaho will go into the meet a definite underdog, because of hampering weather conditions and injuries to several key men. Dick Wilcomb, javelin letterman with good possibilities this year, will probably watch from the sidelines because of a sore elbow. Lee Balderson, letter winner last year in the half and mile runs, will probably not see action because of an injured ankle. Larry McEntee, sprinter, and Don Faulkner, 440, both are out with pulled muscles.

Idaho Enters 13

Coach Hiserman said that the following men would be entered in the competition:

Armstrong, Badger, Farnham, Hawthorn, and Humphrey, distances; DePalmo and Miller, jumps; Lattig, Brighton, and Keating, pole vault; and Fagnan, Hiner, and Irving, weights.

Armstrong broke the Idaho 100-yard mark of 9.9 set by James Montgomery in 1908 and equalled by James Kalbus in 1934. His time for the event was 9.8. He also tied the 31-year record in the 220, touring the furlong in 21.5.

Other standouts on the Vandal squad are Lattig who topped the 13 feet pole vault record set by George Makela in 1940 and equalled by Darrell Kirby in 1941 and Lattig in 1947. Lattig went over the bar at 13' 1 3/4". Taylor tied an 11-year Idaho mark 24.3 in the low hurdles set by Bill Powers in 1936.

Neblon Leads Cougars
Outstanding prospects on the Cougar squad are Neblon, who ran third in the NCAA meet quarter-mile last year and Keniston, sprinter. In the middle distances, the Cougars are strong with Paeth, recent winner of the Cunningham mile at the Portland Military Academy relays. His running mates are Parnell and Eischen.

In the weights, the Cougars will be represented by Mataya, Gregg, Wright, Metzger, and Wideman. All except Gregg and Wideman are lettermen.

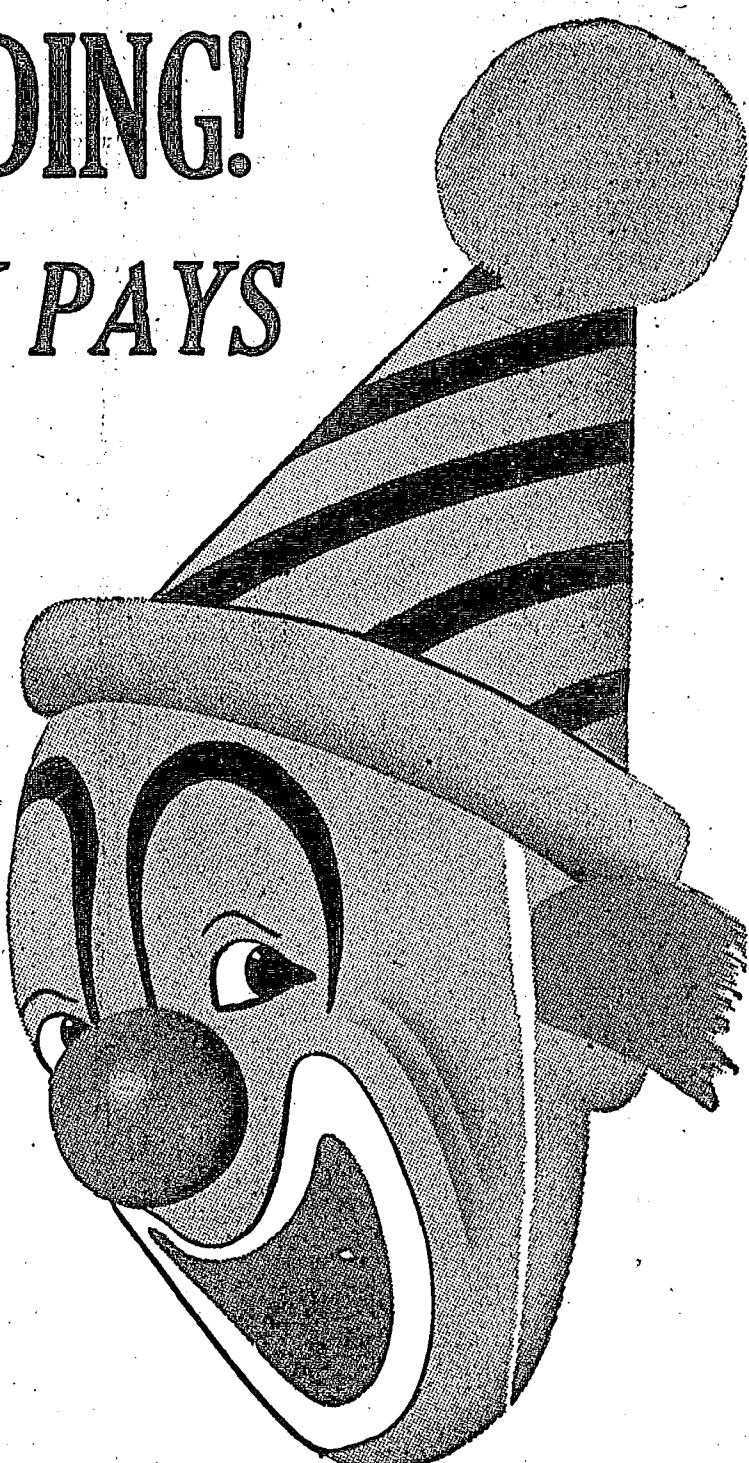
