Annapolis Chooses Only Naval Reserve

Early enlistment in the Naval Reserve is required to establish eligibility for appointment to the Naval Academy under the annual Navy Reserve quota. Under the present Naval Academy conditions, the secretary of the Navy is authorized to appoint 100 Naval Corps Reservists to the academy each year.

One requirement for selection is the candidate must have been in the Naval Reserve at least one year by July 1 of the year in which appointed.

Idaho Squad Slated To Meet Oregon Nine This Afternoon

Finley Rearranges Team To Strengthen Batting

The Idaho Vandals will seek their first conference baseball win this afternoon when they meet the Oregon Ducks at MacLean field at 3 p. m. Idaho's mentor, Charles "Chuck" Finley, went along with other northern division coaches who had their hopes of fair weather for the weekend games dampened by yesterday's snow flurries.

Oregon will play a second game with the Vandals here tomorrow afternoon. Barring any weather interference, Saturday's game will begin at 2 p. m. If the field is too wet for this afternoon's game, a double header will be played Saturday beginning at 1:30 p. m. According to conference rules, a rain-out of both games cancels the series and it is not considered in the final conference standings.

Coach Finley stated that Don Fodrea or Charles Plastino would pitch the first game in the series, and the second contest would have either Don Hunt or Arnold Beebe on the mound for the Vandals.

Weak at Plate
Fred Klink, a pitcher, was moved into the outfield recently by Finley in an attempt to put more punch in the batting order. Joe Whitcomb, utility man at the start of the season, is also holding down an outfield berth now. It was weakness at the plate that spelled defeat for the Vandals in their first home conference game Monday against Washington State.

In an earlier series with the Ducks in Eugene, the Vandals lost both games. In the first game, the Oregon nine shut out the Vandals, 3-0; the second contest also went to the Ducks on a 7 to 3 count.

Last weekend the Oregon batsmen split a two game series with Washington in Eugene. Oregon squeezed by the Huskies 9 to 8 in the first contest; and the Washington squad came back in the shortened nightcap to tame the Ducks 13-3, the game being called after five innings.

The probable starting lineups for this afternoon's game will be Bill Williams, catcher, Dex Linck at first; Ozzie Kanikbeber, second base; Tobe Masingill, third base; Cliff Masingill, shortstop; Klink, left field; Chuck Couper, center field; and Whitcomb, right field. Fodrea will probably be on the mound for the Vandals. Coach Finley said that he would start Phil Hull in the outfield if the Oregon team uses a right hand pitcher.

Hapless Vandal Track Squad Battles Montana Grizzlies

The University of Idaho track and field squad, losers in two straight conference dual meets, will tangle with the Montana Grizzlies at Missoula tomorrow in an attempt to break into the win column.

The Vandals dropped their opening meet to the strong Washington State College Cougars, 98-32, and their second to Oregon State, 82-42.

In last year's meet at Moscow, Montana won eight firsts to Idaho's seven, but the Vandals piled up enough seconds and thirds to claim a 68-63 win. The meet was not decided until the mile relay, the final event, had been run. The Idaho team of Armstrong, DePalmo, Matthews, and Farnham breezed home with the five points that broke the deadlock and won the meet.

Wilcomb Back
Dick Wilcomb, javelin ace, returned to the squad for the Oregon State meet and promptly got back in the groove with a first-

place toss of 171 feet-10 inches. Wilcomb's services were sorely missed in the Washington State meet when the winning javelin throw was 166 feet-3 inches. Wilcomb is not yet at peak again, however. In an early season indoor meet at Pullman, he heaved the javelin 184 feet-3 inches, and last season reached the coveted 190 foot mark.

The six-man tennis squad left yesterday for Oregon to meet the University of Oregon at Eugene and OSC at Corvallis Friday and Saturday in conference competition.

Bill Gartin defeated the Vandal's captain, John Bretz, in intra-squad competition this week and will play the number one position for Idaho. In other intra-squad games Howard Berger was chosen over Tom Benson to make the trip when Benson came down with a cold with their games tied up at one all.

Making the trip are captain John Bretz, Jack Rainey, Bill Gartin, Hal Barnes, Nolan Johnson, and Howard Berger. The doubles teams will be Bretz-Rainey and Barnes-Johnson. Coach Kirkland is counting heavily on these doubles teams for points, especially Barnes and Johnson who work very well together. Jack Rainey has shown much improvement this last week and may pick up a point in the singles.

This will be Idaho's third match of the current season, having dropped a game to WSC 7 to 0, and to Montana 6 to 1.
