The GOLDEN FLEECE by Jason

 Arriving in Washington, the group viewed the Naval Air Station at Anacostia, then left in the company of Admiral Cruise for Pensacola, Florida. Admiral Wagner, head of navy training, talked to the group over problems of the naval trainees in universities in the U. S.

Buchanan Tells Of New Addition To Idaho Faculty

George W. Woodbury, associate professor of horticulture from 1935 to 1943, has returned to carry on special research in freezing and canning of fruits and vegetables, announced President J. E. Buchanan following the board of regents meeting at Boise.

Woodbury is now a plant breeder with the Grange League federation in New York. Dr. Eugene Giles, head of psychology at Boise junior college and director of summer school, has been named associate professor of psychology to replace the late Dr. Allen C. Lemon.

White Pine Research

To carry on special research of young western white pine, the university has employed George M. Harvey, graduate of the Yale forestry school, as research pathologist. L.  Schools are obligated to furnish effective education and training to each veteran they enroll, and must not keep a veteran in training any longer than his conduct and progress warrant. They must provide VA with reports of attendance and progress.

Playhouse Casts Barlow in 'Camille'

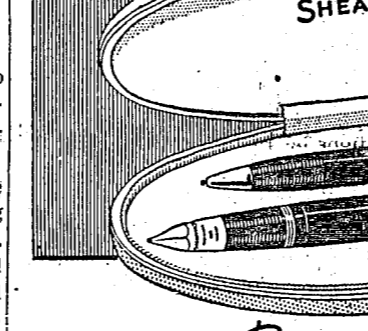

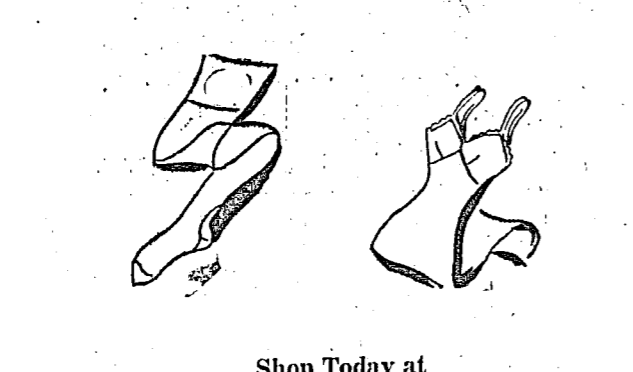

In the second game it was once again a big Duck third inning that spelled the margin of victory for the visitors.
