That stopped Jason, not being a master student, and not expecting to be one for at least seven years, he had no answer.

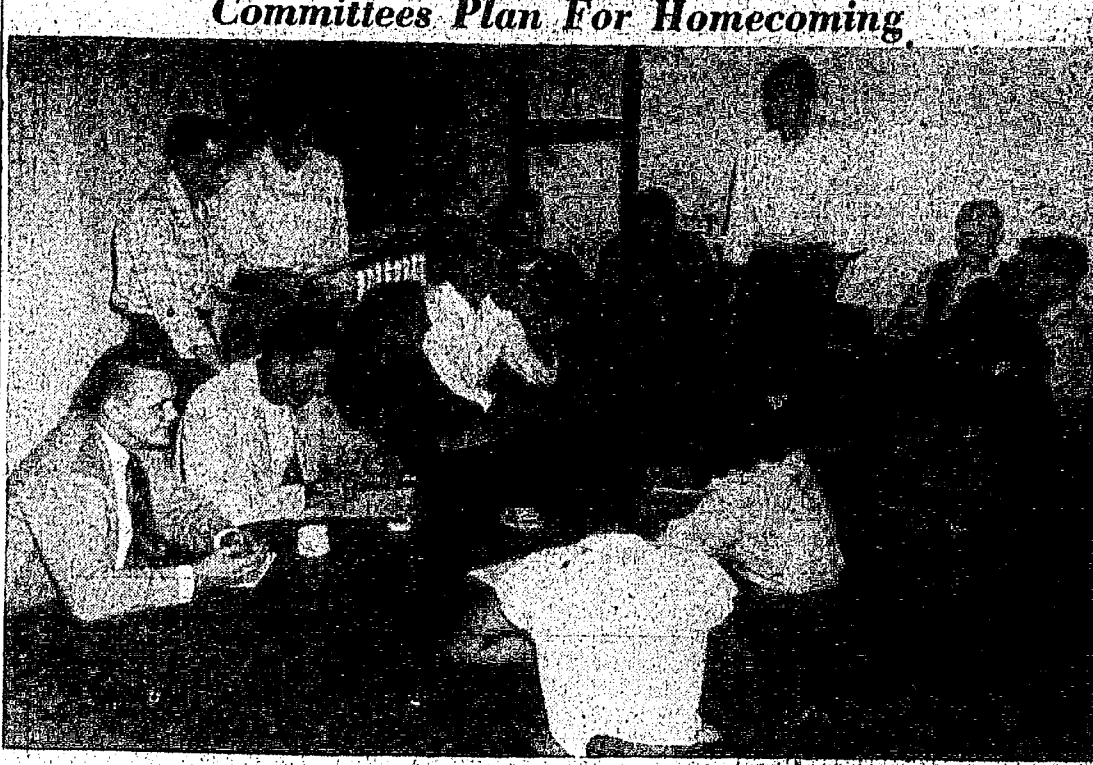

Equal Education To Be Debate Topic For Year

"Resolved: That the federal government should adopt a policy of equalizing educational opportunity in tax supported schools by means of annual grants," is the question announced for national intercollegiate debate this year.

Men and women students interested in the Idaho intercollegiate debate program are urged by Dr. A. E. Whitehead director of speech and debate, to report to TC-2 118 Wednesday, September 30, at 4 p.m. "General announcements and an over-all picture of this year's program will be given at this time," announced Dr. Whitehead.

New Discussion Group Added
Discussion groups similar to panel discussion groups, a new feature in intercollegiate debate, will be included in the program this year. The following questions will be discussed in these groups: "What should we do about communism," and "How can civil liberties be guaranteed in the United States." A second question to be used by some schools in regular debate will be: "Resolved: that the United States should abandon free economy in favor of a system of economic controls."

No experience is necessary for activity in either type of debate or discussion. Reference books and materials will be on reserve in the library, according to Dr. Whitehead.

The scholarship comes from a \$5,000 fund willed the university by the late Howard Shriver, farmer of Whitman county, Washington.

Jet Pilot Makes Shortest Visit

The shortest visit ever made to the campus by an alumnus was credited today to 1st Lt. Peter Kennedy, jet plane pilot for the AAF. His visit consisted of just a "swish."

Lt. Kennedy said he didn't have time to pick out any familiar haunts at his old alma mater, but he got a good view of the Columbia river. From up in the stratosphere, he thought he could see at one time the entire river from its beginning in Canada to its mouth down in Oregon.

Kennedy, a native of Moscow, studied mechanical engineering at the university in 1940-41. During World War II, he was a pilot in the European theater, where he was shot down and imprisoned by the Nazis for a year.

Lack Of Material Hinders Building

Because new equipment has not arrived, the veterinary science department building will not be completed until the building and ground crews finish other commitments.

Students have been enrolled in two courses offered by the department. Fifteen are enrolled in veterinary science three, and thirty-eight are taking course 171. Veterinary science three is a course in pre-veterinary orientation. The other three courses offered this semester have no enrollment.

High Average Required

Two or three years of pre-veterinary work are required before a student may enter a veterinary school for a four year course," stated Dr. L. H. Scribner, head of the department. The veterinary school at Washington State college takes most of the students from Idaho, but a high average is a requirement, added Dr. Scribner. The reasons for this are the crowded conditions at the veterinary schools.

The news that the "Young Man With A Horn" has accepted complete arrangements for the biggest social event on Idaho's school calendar.

Zito's ability and talents are already legendary in the music world. His trumpet solos have been featured on every leading recording label by many of America's most famous orchestra leaders.

Played on Bob Hope Show
His solo passages on "High on a Windy Trumpet" with Les Brown's orchestra, sold over a million copies and made him nationally famous overnight. Even after he organized his own band last year, Jimmy, upon several occasions, flew to Hollywood to play first trumpet on the Bob Hope radio show.

During his professional career, Zito appeared with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the NBC staff orchestra, the orchestras of Benny Goodman, Ted Fio Rito, Raymond Scott, Sam Donahue, Tommy Dorsey and Les Brown.

Recent Releases Listed
Zito's recent record releases with his own band include "The Man With A Horn," "Just Naive," "Hold Me," "Never Make Eyes," "I've Found a New Baby," and "Key Largo." His orchestra has held long engagements at Los Angeles' Trianon Ballroom; "The Lagoon," Salt Lake City; Natatorium Park, Spokane; Trianon Ballroom, Seattle; and Club Morocco, Hollywood.

The young orchestra leader has also been in the movies. Cinema fans will remember him as the featured artist with the orchestra of Tommy Dorsey in "Duffy's Lady."

The band was recently placed among the first ten in a nationwide poll by "Down-Beat" magazine. Zito also holds the all-time record for a single engagement of sixteen smooch weeks at Sherman's night club in San Diego, California.

Thirteen pieces and a vocalist comprise the orchestra. The dance will be held in Memorial gymnasium from 8:30 to midnight. Ticket sales will begin as soon as the price has been set.

"Auditions for new announcers will be held at 1:00 Saturday afternoon in the KUOI station studio, third floor, Engineering building annex," announced Black. Students interested in beginning a campus radio career are urged to turn out for these tryouts. Previous experience is not required.

General radio schedules will be out next week. Beginning at 7 Dale Benjamin comes on the air with "Yawn Patrol," a sparkling "waker-upper" of campus requests. Again at 3 p.m., continuing until midnight, a complete program of music and special events will be broadcast.

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Vandal Gridders 'Ready'; Meet Redskins Saturday

A host of enthusiastically cheering Vandal rooters gave a hearty sendoff yesterday afternoon to Dixie Howell and a 37-man traveling squad, as the Vandal football team entrained for Salt Lake City and a scheduled night conflict with the Redskins of Utah University.

Seventeen radio stations will broadcast a play-by-play account of the Idaho-Utah football tussle held in Salt Lake City on Saturday, September 25. Among the stations carrying the broadcast will be KRFL in Moscow, KRUC in Lewiston, KVIN in Coeur d'Alene, and KREM in Spokane. The game will begin at 6:45 p.m., Pacific Standard Time.

Recovering from an early season epidemic of injuries, the Idaho gridders seem to be approaching the peak of condition, with Ted Diehl, quarterback, and Ralph Paasch, three-year letterman center, back in shape after a week on the sidelines with practice injuries. Big Carl Killsgaard, 215-pound tackle, who played nearly 55 minutes during the Oregon State game, suffered a foot injury during the fracas, and veteran half-back Woodie Delorme played most of the game with an infected foot, but both will be ready for the Utes. Sam Theis, who spearheaded the Vandal offense that upset the Redskins' apple-cart last year, is expected to be back in his usual form by Saturday night.

McFaul May Play
Ed McFaul, veteran end and captain of the Vandal squad, is expected to be in trim for the tussle, after being forced to sit on the bench during the Oregon State game nursing an injured knee. With their appetites sharpened by last week's loss to OSC, and the return of these key players to the line-up, the Vandal crew may be able to correct the two defects noticeable in the previous game—passing offense and defense. The Oregon State aerial attack connected repeatedly, while the Vandal receivers were able to snag only 5 out of 24 attempts. Improvement in both passing offense and defense could be the key to a repeat performance of last year's Idaho-Utah game, when the Idahoans ruined an otherwise undefeated season for Ike Armstrong's team with an upset 13-6 win.

Utah State, third ranking team

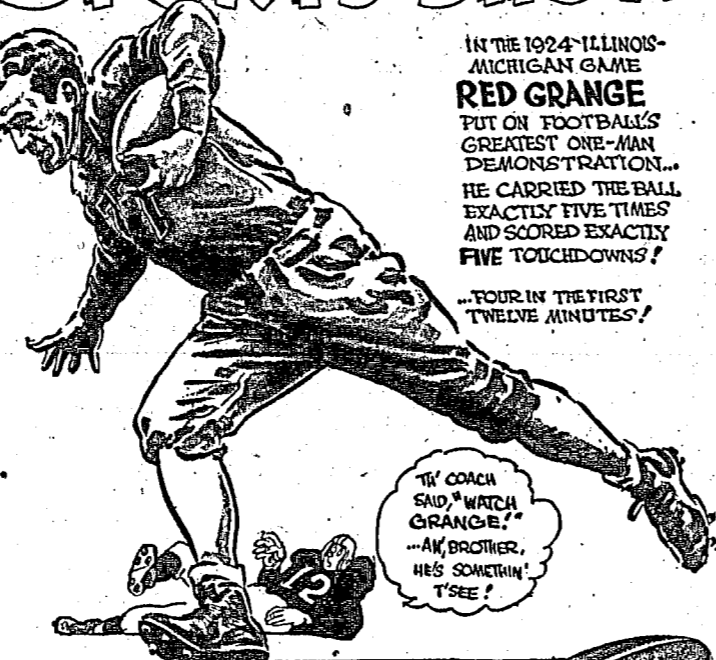
