Redskin Eleven Swamps Vandals On Rainy Field

Brogan To Ballew Lone Idaho Score

The University of Utah Redskins had it pretty much their own way Saturday night as they dropped the Vandals on a rain-swept field at Salt Lake City. The score at the final gun read 21 to 6 favoring the Redskins. A near record crowd of 18,099 fans witnessed the Utah team get revenge for their defeat at the hands of the Vandals last year, spoiling an otherwise perfect record.

Rain fell intermittently throughout the contest, but failed to put a damper on the Utah passing attack which worked consistently as they scored in every quarter but the third.

First Tally
The Redskins' first score came midway through the first quarter when halfback Bob Matthews took a pass from quarterback Cannon Parkinson on the Idaho 25 yard line and sprinted to the end zone. Place Kick specialist Bud Gleaves made the conversion good.

The Redskins scored again in the closing seconds of the second period after a series of passes and running plays brought the ball to the Idaho two-yard line. It took four rushing plays to push the ball into the end zone putting the Redskins out in front 13 to 0. They added another tally after the gun went off when Gleaves' kick was good.

Idaho Scores
The Vandals lone score came as a result of a Utah fumble which was recovered by Idaho guard Wilber Ruleman on the Redskin 15. Two passes from Brogan to Beach fell incomplete, but on third down Brogan completed a desperation heave to Vandal end Ballew in the end zone. Overgaard's try for point was low.

The Utes received the kickoff on the ten yard line and Matthews returned the ball to his own 42. After a series of successful running and passing plays the Redskins lost the ball on a fumble on the Idaho 20. Riley out ran the Ute flankers for a Vandal first down on their own 33, but Brogan's attempted pass was intercepted and run back 29 yards to the Idaho six.

Allen scored the Redskins' third touchdown after two line plunges, and "Automatic" Gleaves converted his third straight place kick.

Riley Shines
Outstanding ground gainer for the Vandals was Bud Riley, 160 lb. left halfback, who averaged 13 yards per rush from scrimmage.

Mighty Purdue lived up to pre-season propaganda and fought toe to toe with the fighting Irish of Notre Dame, losing by one point, 27 to 28. The luck of the Irish had to work overtime to down the Bollermakers in the most thrilling game of the week.

Texas sank to a new low along with sports forecasters hopes when they bowed to unheralded North Carolina. 'Choo Choo' Charlie Justice laid new claims to All-American honors, packing the mail for North Carolina.

Football a la Pacific Coast:
Hopwie Odell listened to the game from a hospital bed as his University of Washington Huskies held the vaunted Minnesota machine scoreless for three and a half periods only to crack wide open when Everett Faunce rambled 58 yards for a touchdown setting the stage for a 20 to 0 Minnesota triumph.

Northwestern kept the big nine's record on the Pacific Coast virtually spotless by taking the measure of UCLA for the second time in two years. The score—Northwestern 19, UCLA 0.

A Little Prestige
The California Bears were more fortunate and added a little prestige for the wounded Coast conference by defeating Navy 21 to 7. The Bear's line, built around Rod Franz was just too much for the Middles.

Surprisingly enough the strong Oregon eleven had a tough time with a hard fighting Stanford club and were pressed to eke out a 20 to 12 victory. McKay did most of the scoring for the Ducks, Van Brocklin made only two conversion points.

A fighting but outmanned Oregon State squad was overpowered by favored Southern Cal Saturday 21 to 6. Don Samuel and Ken Carpenter kept OSC in the ball game however and the score up until the final minute of the game was OSC 6, USC 14.

The Idaho Vandals were completely outplayed in their game with Utah in Salt Lake Saturday coming out on the short end of a 21 to 7 score. Johnny Brogan's pass to George Ballew in the end zone tallied the only Idaho score. Dixie has a lot to iron out with his squad before they leave for the UCLA game this Saturday.
