The GOLDEN FLEECE by Jason

As school started this fall many new building programs were noticed getting underway on the campus. A new field house was being erected and the golf club house was being remodeled. Several indignant ASUI executive board members began to wonder where the funds were coming from. Nothing had been said to the board. No ASUI approval had been made.

The rumor was somehow circulated that the money was being taken from the sales of ASUI activity books. Jason wishes to nip that rumor in the bud. Nearly twenty years ago, as Jason understands it, a fund was set aside whereby \$5 from each initial tuition fee would go into the building of Memorial gymnasium. The gym was built and paid for but the fund was kept, looking toward the future when other buildings or repairs would be needed. The same fund will supply the money needed for building the addition to the Student Union building.

More Questions
All of which brings another question to the minds of the student. "After all of the yelling about a new SUB during the campus elections last spring, why hasn't something been done toward starting the job?" This is another question Jason will attempt to answer.

When the plans for the addition were drawn up the Board of Regents were looking forward to a drop in building costs. Instead of dropping as the Regents had anticipated, the costs went up and as near as Jason can find out, are still going up. Perhaps if you are a frosh you will see work begun on the addition sometime during your stay at the university.

Regulations Changed
The ASUI election board, according to the newly revised constitution, is composed of fourteen members. The member having one year's experience and who receives the highest grade on the election board examinations is designated as the chairman. The three highest "Greeks" and the three highest "Independents" will automatically sit on the board. The remaining seven were to be competitive positions.

At an executive board meeting Wednesday night the fact was brought out that one party might school their members so that the ratio could be three to 11 if all on one side received the high grades. It was felt by the board that this might cause added friction between the two parties. A vote was taken and the regulation stands at present with five rather than three from each party receiving automatic seats on the board should they make the highest grades on the exam. The three remaining members will be picked according to their grades regardless of party affiliation.

Examinations for the new board were given last night. Their first job will be to count the ballots (Cont. on page 2, col. 7)

Scholastic Awards To Be Presented At First Assembly

The annual awarding of scholarship cups and awards will take place in the Memorial gymnasium at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning, October 6.

President Jesse Buchanan will announce the special awards for students who will have their names inscribed on scholarship plaques. Awards presented will be for beginning students as well as for last year's achievements.

Scholastic Awards
Among the more important awards is the Inter-Fraternity plaque which is presented to the fraternity with the highest scholastic average for the previous semester. In the same category is the Beulah Garrard Dale scholarship cup awarded to the women's living group which had the highest scholastic average for the previous semester.

Vandaleers Will Sing
The Vandaleers, under the direction of Glen Lockery, will be present at the assembly to sing three selections: "Alma Mater," arranged by Hall Macklin, head of the music department, "There Is a Balm in Gilead," and "Soon Ah Will Be Done."

Periods will be shortened to 35 minutes Wednesday morning, according to Dean H. E. Lattig, director of student affairs, to enable all students to witness the presentation of the awards.

Decker Will Give Graduate Exams

Record examinations for prospective graduate students will be given under the direction of Mr. Charles O. Decker, student counselor, October 25 and 26.

Although not required, these examinations are recommended for many students planning to enter graduate fields. Most leading graduate and professional schools request that these examination results be submitted by students seeking admission, according to Decker.

The examinations are offered three times each year, in October, in May, and in February. An examination fee of ten dollars to cover examination and report expenses is charged and the results are sent to the institution in which the student wishes to enroll.

It was decided by vote last night to officially accept transfers from other institutions.

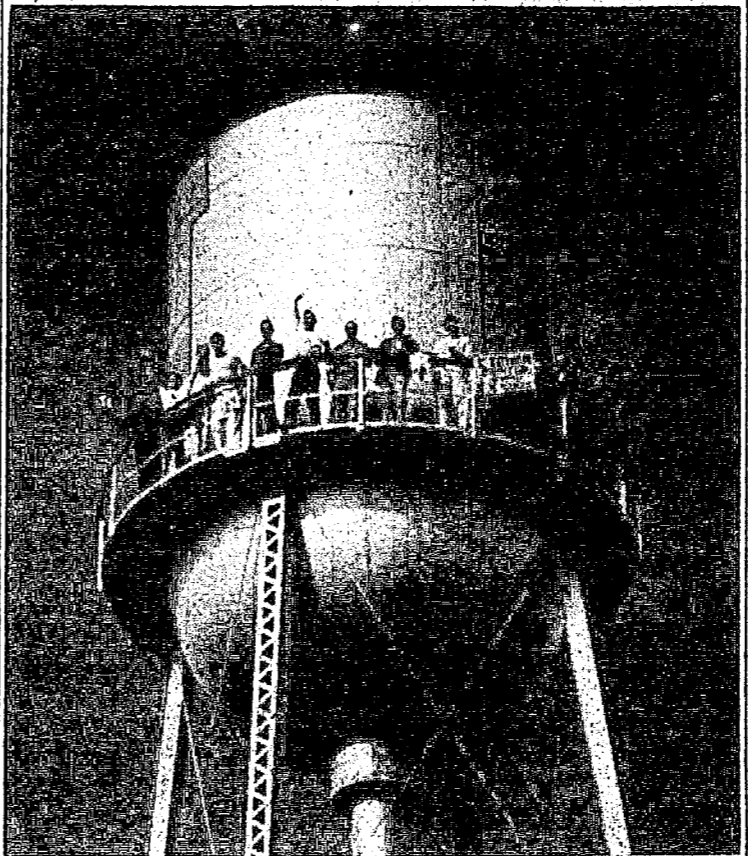
Over 750 Enrolled In ROTC Program

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Veterans' Checks To Arrive Late

Veterans attending school or college this fall under the GI bill are reminded by the veterans' administration to be prepared to finance themselves for from 45 to 60 days before they receive their first subsistence checks.

In most cases, veterans will get their first subsistence checks from the VA on November 1. In a few instances, checks may be delayed longer. Initial VA payments will include all subsistence due, retroactive to date of enrollment.

Veterans without dependents are entitled to an allowance of \$75.00 per month. Those with one dependent are entitled to \$105; those with two or more dependents will receive \$120 a month.

Campus Sex Ratio Remains Lopsided

Men on the U. of I. campus outnumber the women approximately 4 to 1 according to a release from the registrar's office which showed 2856 men students enrolled for this semester, while the women number only 778.

Letters and science drew the largest number of students with 1119 registered. Second in popularity was the school of business with 987. Engineering drew 545, education, 389; agriculture, 384; and forestry, 228.

Freshman have by far the largest class with 1005 members. The junior class of 809 is closely followed by the sophomores with 897. Seniors number 711, and the graduate class holds 122.

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

Idaho Wins

In the opening game of the season, the Vandals were defeated by a heavier Oregon State eleven 27-12. Last weekend, breaks were against the Vandals, as passes were thrown all over the field, only to land in the wrong arms. Utah won handily 21-8 on a rain swept field.

Though the Vandals' lone score against the Utes was gained through the air, the team's passing attack hasn't clicked as well as it should. Of the thirty five passes attempted thus far they have completed 9.

Looking Better

However, the Idaho squad looks much better in scrimmage sessions this week, and should play their underdog role with everything that can be expected of a green team in the building stages.

With the exception of Captain Ed McFaul, end, the Vandals will be in top strength for the U.C.L.A. game. McFaul is on the doubtful list due to a knee injury received in early season practice.

Fleet Idaho Back Has Tenth Highest Punting Average

Idaho's valuable halfback, John Christensen ranks tenth among the nation punters according to statistics released by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau. In two games he has punted five times for an average of 42.4 yards per kick.

Other Pacific coast teams who figure in the national statistics are Jackie Jensen, California, third in total offense with a total of 304 yards, and second in rushing with the same total; Samuels, Oregon State, ninth in total offense with 241 yards; Nagle, UCLA, 14th in offense with 193 yards; Dill, So. California ranked 18 in offense with a total of 191 yards, and in forward passing second with 16 completions; McKay, of Oregon, in offense was 20th with 186 yards and in rushing ranked 8th with 186; Malcolm of Montana was 11th in rushing with 159 yards, while his team mate O'Loughlin ranked 20th, with 140 yards; Van Brock-

lin, Oregon's heralded passer could do no better than 7th in his specialty with 139 yards. In pass receiving Poltsfoot of W.S.C. was third with 8 catches for a total of 138 yards; while Stilwell of So. California was 7th with 7 for 56 yards.
