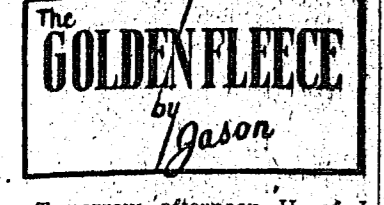

U. of I. men will make a choice of one of the five coed finalists pictured here for Homecoming Queen when they go to the ASUI election polls tomorrow afternoon. The winner will be announced in the Friday issue of the Argonaut and crowned during the half-time of the Idaho-Oregon Homecoming football game Saturday by Gov. C. A. Robins. The remaining four women will be crowned as princesses at the same time by Spokane's "Miss Spokane" Glenda Bergen. The queen will be guest of honor at the Homecoming dance Saturday night and will ride at the head of the parade the same day.

All-Male Vote To Decide Queen Contest Tomorrow

Male students will be able to go to the polls for Homecoming Queen tomorrow afternoon in the Ad building from 1 until 4, announced the election board committee yesterday. Students will not be allowed to vote unless they bring their ASUI books with them.

Names of five women will appear on the ballot. They are Doris Moore, Betty Hogan, Carolyn Johanson, Marilyn Heinrich and Gayle Slavin. One will be crowned Queen and the others princesses.

Campaigns Started Posters and placards bearing the candidates' names and pictures have been appearing on the campus since Friday. The five are finalists among 21 nominees nominated by men's living groups and selected by the football team.

The women are being introduced and entertained at dinners and lunches at all the men's living groups in an effort to permit every male student of the university to at least see the candidates in person before the polls open.

Pictures and news stories concerning the candidates are being circulated throughout the northwest, both through student channels and through the university publications office.

May Be "Miss Idaho" A good possibility exists that the Homecoming Queen may be invited by the Los Angeles Alumni association to the Rose Bowl game on New Year's day. Another rumor circulating about the campus has the state alumni association in favor of sending the Homecoming Queen to Atlantic City to represent Idaho in the "Miss America" contest next summer.

All male students are urged to vote, announced Dick Boren, assistant homecoming chairman. Boren also asked that in voting men should consider the dignity and attractiveness of the candidates only and not be influenced by their respective living groups or their sponsors' living groups.

Helldiver Tryouts Set For October 7

Helldiver tryouts are scheduled for Monday evening, October 7, at 7 in the Memorial gymnasium swimming pool according to Jim Farmer, president. All students interested in swimming activities are invited to attend. Freshmen must have permission for the evening meetings.

Farmer announced the election of other officers for this year. They include Norman Green, vice president; Jan Garber, secretary-treasurer; Patti Brown, publicity chairman. Miss Mary Fram was named faculty advisor to assist Eric Kirkland, present advisor.

World Federalists Plan Discussion On Monday Night

Preserving world peace is the scheduled topic for this week's meeting of the Student World Federalists at 7 Monday night in the Bucket, according to Pete Wilson, acting chairman. Officers will be elected and program plans drawn up for the coming year. Students interested in the program are urged to attend.

Organized last spring, the SWF Idaho group is one of over 150 chapters in colleges and high schools throughout the country devoted to working for world peace and federation. Professor Robert Hosack, political science department, is faculty advisor and sponsor of the group.

Beliefs Published The Student World Federalists are affiliated with the United World Federalists, a merger of the principal groups in this country working for world federation. In November, 1947, the UWF published the following statement of beliefs:

"We believe that peace is not merely the absence of war, but the presence of justice, of law, of order—in short of government and the institutions of government; that world peace can be created and maintained only under a world federal government, universal and strong enough to prevent armed conflict between nations, and having direct jurisdiction over the individual in those matters within its authority."

Draft Deferments Open To Students

Students eligible for the peacetime draft program must appeal to their local draft boards for academic deferment, according to word from H. E. Lattig, dean of mail.

"Most staff members and students are aware that a regularly enrolled student will be deferred from the draft until the end of the academic year, provided he remains in good standing," stated Lattig. "However, many students are not aware that the responsibility of notifying the draft board lies with the student."

Students may obtain a form letter from the Registrar which may be mailed to the draft boards. A few of the draft boards in Idaho have submitted lists to the registrar, but students must be responsible for their own appeals in order to be sure.

Cooperation Urged In Housing Alums

Homecoming alumni housing problems must be met with cooperation from private homes and the various living groups according to James Lyle, alumni secretary. Those groups having rooms to spare are requested to contact the alumni secretary office early this week.

"All requests for housing so far have been taken care-of," announced Lyle, "but past experience has shown that during the last week a great number of requests will be received." To accommodate these last minute appeals there must be reserve housing available. Moscow hotels and motor courts are completely filled.

Last year over 11,000 alumni were in Moscow for homecoming and a larger crowd is expected this year.

Pershing Riflemen To Elect Officers

Election of captain and first lieutenant of Pershing Rifles is scheduled for Wednesday at 4:00 in the Memorial gymnasium. Nominations were made at a meeting last Thursday and will also be accepted from the floor Wednesday.

Drill schedules and formations were also outlined at the Thursday meeting, conducted by Cadet Lt. Sam Kersey. Captain Zimmerman, Pershing Rifle advisor, and Cadet Col. Ohms, regimental commander of Pershing Rifles, explained the parade uniform of the group with emphasis on brassards, white gloves, and leggings.

Ali Baba Trio To Play Today

Hot music and modern rhythms will be the order of the day when the famous Ali Baba Trio appears on the campus this afternoon for a specially arranged homecoming kick-off dance at the Blue Bucket ballroom from 4:00 to 5:30 p.m.

The trio, currently engaged at the Athletic Round Table in Lewiston, has just recently arriving in the northwest following a highly successful season playing in night clubs in and around Denver. Receiving top billing on theater marquees throughout the circuit of their western tour, the group eventually intends to return to their home territory among the bright lights and night life of the Chicago Loop.

Jack Perciful, Mark Barnet, Bud Walter and several other exponents of modern music on the campus have been asked to appear on the bandstand with the trio in a jam session which should hit a new high for campus musical entertainment. Homecoming queen candidates will be introduced during intermission at the dance, which will be a strictly informal, "stag" affair. Admission price will be 25 cents or less.

Rules for joining the college board are listed below: 1. Contestants must submit a report of two typewritten, double spaced pages on any new and interesting phase of college life. 2. Contestants must submit a snapshot, plus complete data on college and home addresses, class year, college major and minor, other interests and activities, and paid or volunteer jobs held. 3. All material must be mailed to the College Board Editor, Mademoiselle, 122 east 42 street, New York, 17, New York, not later than November 1. 4. Only undergraduates at accredited colleges and junior colleges, available to work as guest editors from June 6 to July 1, 1949, are eligible.

Other members of the team wear shin pads which protect the player's legs, allowing more action in the game.

All players, except the goalee,

carry hockey sticks approximately 3 feet in length. With the center forward starting the small hard ball used, the object of the game is to get the ball from the center of the field to a goal cage.

Preparations for the game are almost as exciting as the game itself. In the team dressing room, potential "all American forwards" like Sue Heardsley buckle on the shin pads. Goalee deluxe, Jean Wardell, treads about in Frankensteinian fashion in her heavy leg and foot pads. Dorothy Gale's contribution is tennis shoes two sizes too big—a possible protection from clubs.

Knowledge Not Needed "Field hockey is definitely a game of skills," said manager Wardell, "and we would like to see a lot of women come out so

we can develop talent and build up at least three class teams for a tournament." Knowledge of the sport is not needed, as many of the players are beginners. Instruction and techniques, as well as actual game practice, is included in the program.

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

Vandals Score
It wasn't until midway in the third quarter that the Idaho attack began to open up. Trailing 28-0 the Vandals blocked a U.C.L.A. punt deep in the Bruins territory and recovered the ball on the 4 yard line. It took exactly two plays to put the Vandals in the scoring column, as Jim Hatch pushed the ball over for six points. Overgaard's conversion was wide.

Block Goes Over
Bob Mays, Idaho's brilliant sophomore back from Boise, sparked the Vandals second drive in the final period, as he ran and passed his team for 76 yards and a touchdown. On the series of plays, Mays ripped off huge chunks of ground with runs of 37 and 16 yards. The score came as Mays threw a flat pass from the U.C.L.A. 9 to fullback King Block. Overgaard's conversion was no good.

U.C.L.A. scored 14 points in the first period and the same in the third, as the Vandals held them scoreless in the second and fourth frames.

Pass Defense Clicks
Statistics show that the Bruins made 22 first downs to Idaho's 7. Net yards gained by rushing totaled 282 for U.C.L.A., while the Vandals made 69. In passing the Vandals had a better average, completing 5 of 15, while the Bruins could snag only five of their 19 attempts.

Idaho played a brilliant game on pass defense, intercepting 8 of the 19 thrown by the Uclans U.C.L.A. on the otherhand was able to steal but two from the Vandals. The Vandals outpunted the Bruins 41 yards to 25, while on punt runbacks the Californians made 86 yards to Idaho's 84.
