Students receiving these awards may enroll for graduate courses in any college of their choice which is accredited for advanced study in specialized newspaper work.

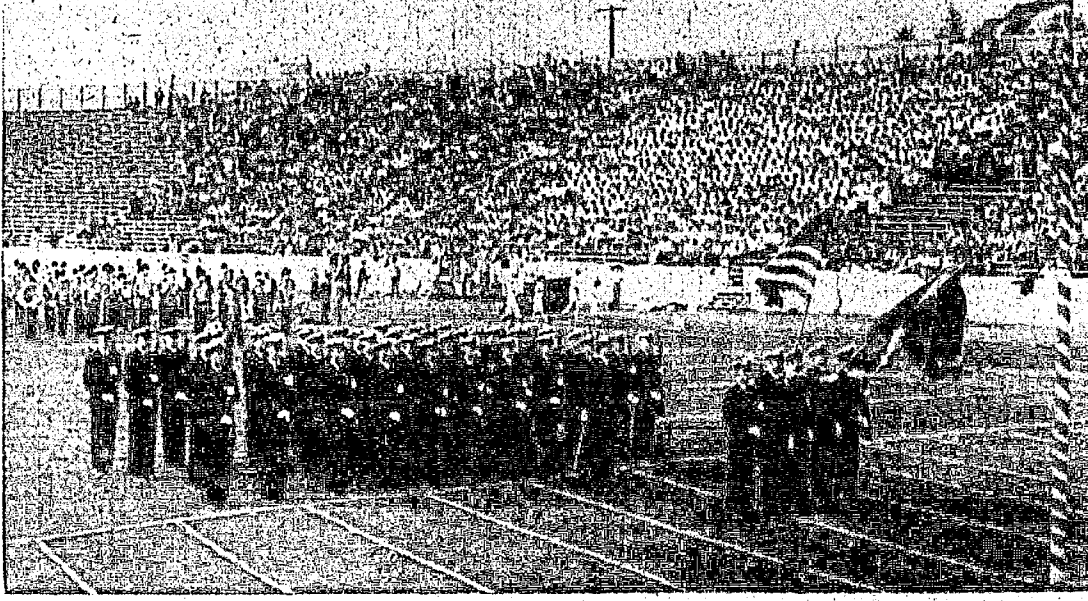

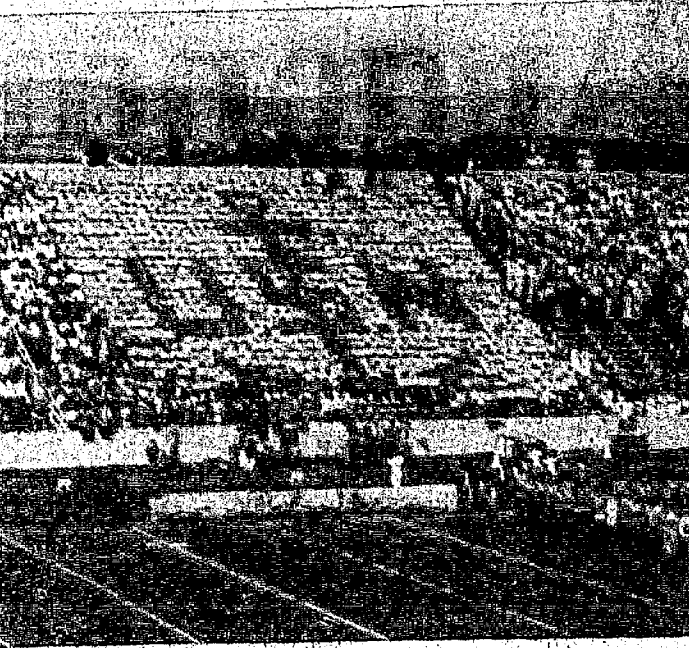

"What about your study habits?" asks the writer of a feature for the "Grows 'Nast" of Athens college. He lists the following study habits to be checked by every individual.

Have a definite place and time in mind and with the idea of recalling things studied and of using what is learned.

Limit the time spent on a lesson and try to do a little more in the same length of time each study period.

Get an over-all view of the work by looking over the whole assignment or chapter before beginning to study.

Try to analyze material into its parts and after selecting important points write them in fewer words and use key words for memory.

Try to discuss with others things that have been learned and also try to practice what has been learned.

Get reports and written work in on time; don't let your feelings toward the teacher affect your study.

Be accurate in your work and try to develop an interest in every study. Make definite preparation for exams.

Work out a good system of taking notes in lectures so that the material is understood and the importance of the various facts gauged before the notes are written down.

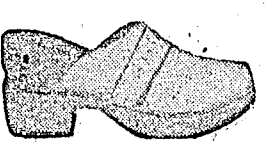
BJC Scores Twice In Fourth

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Powerful Vandal Offence Swamps Mont. U.

Idaho Gridders Run Riot; Overpower Grizzlies 39-0

Vandal Coach Dixie Howell put everyone but the water boy into the game Saturday as the Idaho squad vividly displayed that "new look" while downing the Montana Grizzlies from Missoula, 39 to 0.

Halftime score was 33 to 0 but the crowd of 7,500 Vandal rooters clung to their seats throughout the rest of the game as their team aimed at the 48 to 0 count by which their archrivals, WSC, had defeated the Montanans earlier this fall.

It was not only the Vandals' first conference win in five starts but was also the first time they have successfully converted for the point after touchdown this season. Will Overgaard's toe placed three of his six place kicks squarely between the uprights. Overgaard's kicking was one of the standouts of the Vandals' one-sided victory. He missed only once getting the ball into the end zone on his kick-off boots, and once it sailed clear over the field markers into neutral territory.

Idaho power asserted itself against the Grizzlies and the size of the score was the only question in the minds of most fans after a very few minutes of play. From the opening play to the final gun the crowd expectantly watched every Idaho play for a touchdown. The Moscowites capitalized on power plays for their victory, throwing only 6 passes in the course of the game. Bob Mays rambled 36 yards for one touchdown, Johnny Brogan sprinted 22 for another, Sam Theis bulled his way through center for a 12 yard score, and Brogan passed to Beitz in the waning seconds of the first half for the fourth counter. Mays ran seven yards on a reverse to the right for the final T.D. half-way through the fourth quarter.

The Grizzlies, sparked by the brilliant running and kicking of Ray Malcomb in the backfield but weak in the line, were held to a total of three first downs. They reached Idaho territory with the ball in their possession only once, late in the second quarter, and the thrust ended on the Idaho 45.

First Quarter

The first two Idaho drives bogged down but Mays cut over right tackle, reversed his field, and outran Montana's secondary to score standing up after 11 minutes of play. Overgaard's kick was good and the Vandal march was on. Montana took the kickoff but was forced to punt. Idaho took the kick on the Grizzly 43 and Brogan, Diehl, and Chadband marched to the four as the first quarter ended, Idaho-7, Montana-0.

Second Quarter

Jerry Diehl roamed over for a touchdown after Chadband had moved to the two beginning the second quarter. Overgaard's kick was good, 14 to 0. Idaho came right back again, this time from the Montana 46. Brogan and Riley alternated, carrying the ball to the 22 yard line. Brogan then took the ball, faked a pass, ran around right end, cut back to the left, and scored for the Vandals. Overgaard missed the goal posts the ball went wide and the score stood, Idaho-20, Montana-0.

With less than four minutes left to go in the half, the Vandals again powered their way up through Grizzly territory for another counter. Starting on their own 46, Christianson, Theis, J. Diehl drove to the Montana 12. Sam Theis took the ball on a center smash and gave a free ride across the goal line to three Grizzly players, and the Vandals scored again. The kick by Overgaard was good, 27 to 0.

Malcomb Injured

A rib injury to Ray Malcomb, Montana's standout left halfback, sidelined him for the rest of the half and the Idaho eleven rolled over the Montana 0 yard marker again. Brogan passed to Bill Beitz in the end zone and the gun ending the first half sounded while the ball was still in the air. The conversion was wide and Idaho led

Idaho gained 19 first downs, holding the Montana squad to three. In total net yards gained, running and passing, the Cougars ran up 341 yards while the Grizzlies gained 101 yards. Idaho, on the other hand, gained 468 yards while allowing the Missoulians only 86.

The teams appear more evenly matched this year—at least on paper—than for many years.

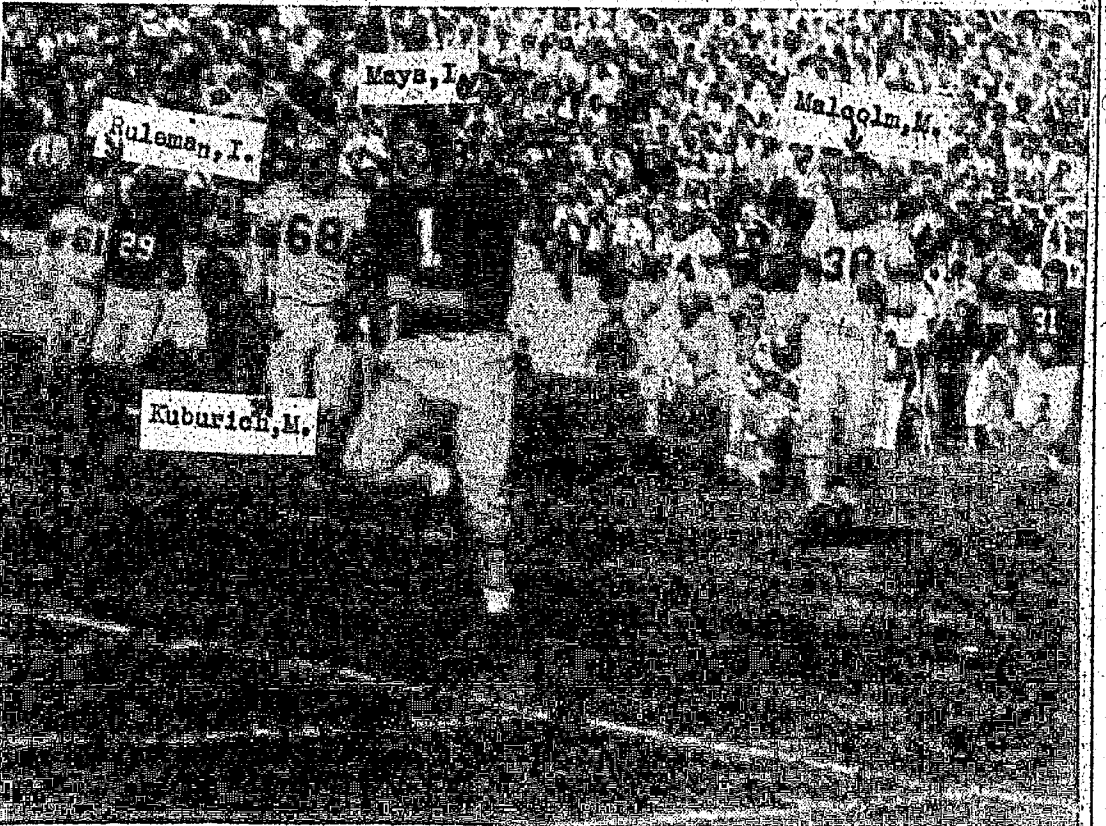
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Mays Scores Number One For The Vandals
