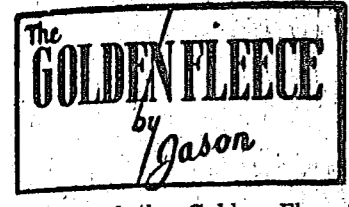

### Football Records Disclose WSC Not Always Winners

The "All-Time Vandal Record," compiled by Ken Hunter, ASUI News Director, and printed in the 1948 Football Booklet for the use of newspapers and radio, offers many interesting comparisons and records to followers of Idaho football.

For instance, did you know that Idaho has not had a winless season since 1899? (Stanford had one last year—its first—and the Vandals helped them toward that achievement.)  
Idaho has had two undefeated seasons—in 1900 when Washington lost the Northwest Championship to the boys from Moscow 12-6 in the locals' only game of the season; and in 1905 when the ancestors of the Vandals won five contests. One of the teams to suffer defeat at the hands of Idaho that year was Lewiston high school, who lost 41 to 2.

**Idaho's Biggest Score**  
The University's most lopsided victory occurred in 1923 when the Vandals squelched College of Idaho, 83-0. Conversely, Idaho's biggest defeat was administered by Southern California in 1929 who whacked the Vandals, 72-0.  
Idaho's first football game was in the spring of 1893 with Wash-

The United party, in a landslide election Wednesday, won 12 out of 16 places in the battle for class offices. Of the 3650 students enrolled in the university, 2105 of them chose the officers, while last year's class heads were voted in by a 1476 minority.

**Miners Learning Mine Rescue Work With Oxygen Mask**  
University mine rescue and crew work students are learning to play basketball with 30 pound oxygen packs on their backs. The course, given in cooperation with the U. S. bureau of mines, has been covering rescue work for the last week under R. K. Ward, safety engineer with the Seattle bureau of mines.

**Devoted to use of oxygen breathing apparatus and first aid rescue instruction, the course included work with formaldehyde gas, and various types of gas masks.** Monday, Ward lectured on oxygen breathing apparatus techniques and Tuesday the class wore the equipment while playing a vigorous game of basketball.

**Mine Rescue Taught**  
During the last two days of the course, the men learned to stop bleeding, apply splints, administer artificial respiration, and handle burns. How to conduct a rescue in a mine which has had explosions or fires by building barricades was also explained.

Each mine gas mask worn by students costs from \$150 to \$200 and is furnished for rescue work by the government. These masks will last two hours at full blast under 100 per cent labor and 15 hours if used while resting.

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## Vote Privilege Ignored

Yesterday we asked the question, "When are elections?" about 20 times. The same number of times we received the answer: "What election?" We, of course, meant general elections to choose officials far more important than class elections. Probably very few students will vote in the general election Tuesday and for several reasons.

First: They haven't registered. That situation can still be remedied. Any person a resident of Moscow 30 days and a resident of Idaho six months can register and cast an absentee ballot.

Second: they believe the old argument that goes, "Why should I consider the candidates very carefully and cast my vote rationally when some illiterate who knows nothing about foreign policy or inflation can come along and cancel my vote?" These people seem to forget that by not voting they allow the illiterate's vote to go uncancelled.

Why not keep people from voting irrationally? Because with most people politics is a logic-tight compartment and most voting is completely irrational.

In either case there seems to be no excuse for failing to vote. Despite our system of voting which allows a person with a minority of the votes to be elected to the presidency and despite the fact that the best candidates may not be running, it is still a duty and a privilege to vote.

## Veterans Warned To Inform Board About Allowances

Student veterans are reminded by the Veterans Administration that they must inform the VA at least 30 days ahead of time if they do not wish to draw subsistence allowances during the winter vacation period.

Unless notified a month before the end of the fall term, veterans will be granted leave automatically and paid full subsistence during the period between fall and winter terms.

### Policy Explained

The leave policy, adopted a year ago, allows unbroken subsistence payments to all veterans attending college under the G.I. bill. Under the plan, a veteran receives payment for the full enrollment period certified to the VA by the educational institution he attends, providing there are no more than fifteen days between terms.

Time spent on leave, between terms and at the end of the school year, is charged against the veteran's educational entitlement. The VA said that some veterans would prefer to sacrifice the leave privilege in order to make use of the entitlement for actual schooling.

## Fellowship Opened To Mortar Boards

Announcement of a \$500 Katherine Willis Coleman fellowship open to members of Mortar Board graduating in 1949, was made this week by the national senior women's honorary. The fellowship, awarded to nine women in the last seven years, will go to an applicant selected by a national committee of deans and Mortar Board officers.

Application blanks may be obtained from Mrs. Edward M. Williams, Mortar Board fellowship chairman, 1 East 602nd street, Orangeburg, New York. Deadline date is December 1, 1948.

Candidates for the award must be unmarried and fully qualified for the master's or doctor's degree in an accredited graduate school.

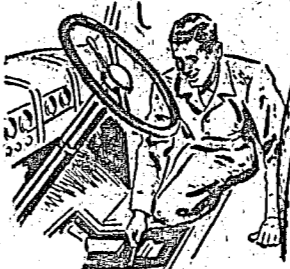

**Students Regaining Their Upper Hand Over The Profs**

In the 12th century university students were fined for throwing rocks at their professors but other than that, they could do almost anything.

Bergen Evans, writing in the June "American Mercury" and advocating a greater amount of student control, traced the history of universities and contended that universities lost their use as students lost control. Evans, a professor of English at Northwestern university, traces the following evolution of higher education:

In the good old days (circa 1100 A.D.) universities were unions formed to protect young men who had congregated to hear the lectures of famous men. They ordinarily outnumbered townspeople and demanded and got rent control and protection of the law. If they didn't they moved their university to another town.

They demanded that their teachers be punctual, that they had something worthwhile to say and that they answer all questions. "It is plain . . . that the students themselves fostered a somewhat more mature attitude than most college administrators foster for them."

Gradually the universities declined; they grew authoritarian and accepted the words of Aristotle and the Church as final authority.

Worst of all, says Evans, they grew rich. Having acquired property "the old threat of getting the hell out became a hollow bluff. They sold their birthright for a mess of Gothic Pottage."

The students were convinced by school officials that they should have degrees. They originally went to universities to get what they wanted, with teachers forced to please them. With degree requirements the students were forced to please the professors.

In the 12th century Leipzig students were fined for stoning their professors and at Caen all who took finals were required to take an oath that they would not attempt to kill the examiners if they failed. By the 16th century Heidelberg was granting degrees and students were not allowed to criticize professors.

However, says Evans, there is still hope. The student is again, accidentally, regaining control. Higher taxes have reduced gifts and higher education has become more dependent upon student fees. This puts the student in a strong bargaining position. "Once they realize that fact they may start laying down the law again . . . to put an end to irrelevance and pedantry and academic bullying."

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# Howellmen Renew Rivalry With Cougars Tomorrow

### Squad Seeks Win After 23 Defeats

With appetites whetted by last Saturday's steamroller win over Montana, a vengeance-seeking band of Vandal football players cross the line tomorrow to attempt to wrest a victory from the favored Cougars from Washington State college.

Seeking their first win in 23 years, the Vandal squad will be at or near their peak in strength for their clash with the traditionally rival WSC gridiron team at Rogers field in Pullman. Since the rivalry began in 1894, when WSC was known as Washington agricultural college, the Cougars have come away with 32 wins, leaving Idaho with 12 wins and three ties. Saturday's battle will be the 48th meeting between the two schools.

The Vandals crashed into the conference win column last week for the first time in five starts during the 1948 season as a result of the victory over Montana. WSC is rated by the experts as definitely top-dog in the contest, with a conference record of three wins and two losses.

### Anything Can Happen

Although Idaho ranks ninth in conference standings while WSC stands third from the top, sports fans are throwing out all records in judging this cross-line battle on the theory that anything can happen when Idaho meets WSC on a gridiron. The Cougar lineup, however, includes several old veterans of the caliber of Jerry Williams and Don Paul, while the Idaho team is well sprinkled with sophomores. At least three sophomores will be in the Idaho starting lineup, including Wilbur Ruleman at guard, Bob Mays at left half, and King Block at fullback.

### Starting Lineup Named

Captain Ed McFaul will be starting at right end for his second game of the season, following an early season injury. His counterpart on the other wing will probably be George Ballew.

At the tackle spots will be big Carl "Bear Tracks" Killsgaard, rated as one of the top tackles of the coast, and Will Overgaard, a kicking specialist, recently nominated by the nation's sports writers as one of the top linemen of the week. In the Montana game, Overgaard booted four kickoffs into the end zone and accounted for three of six points after touchdowns.

Ken McCormack and Wilbur Ruleman, who have started nearly every game of the season for the Vandals, will probably be named in the starting lineup in the guard positions.

At center will be Idaho's only three-year letterman, Ralph Pasch, an able player on both defense and offense.

### Diehl Will Call Signals

Calling the signals at quarterback will be Ted Diehl, while King Block will probably get the call at fullback. At left half on offense will be a pair of sophomores well up in the individual conference standings, Bob Mays and John Brogan. Mays has an average 9.2 yards in 26 carries, while Brogan leads the conference in punting with a 41.2 yard average. John Christenson will carry the defensive load at left half.

At right half, Bud Riley will be the offensive starter, while Jerry Diehl will hold down the spot on defense. Jim Hatch, injured in the Oregon game, may also see some action at right half.

The University of Washington defeated Stanford 25 to 0 last year but on the basis of the showing Schwartz's squad made against USC last Saturday, it's Stanford by 6.

The fourth ranking (nationally) California Bears are gunning for their sixth victory of the season when they meet USC on the latter's home turf, and it's a good bet they get it.
