Deadline Set For Veteran Benefits

G-I education and training benefits have two deadlines, one to enter training and another to complete training. Education or training must be started within four years after discharge or by July 25, 1951, whichever is later.

As a general rule, education or training must be completed not later than July 25, 1956. Exceptions from the general rule are veterans who enlisted or reinlisted before October 6, 1946. These men figure deadlines on G-I Bill
