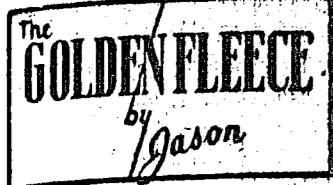

Undeclared Alpha Phi Debaters Take Forensic Cup Debaters Disagree On World Peace

"World government is the only solution for world peace," was the topic of dispute between Reginald Galer and Anthony J. Cox, members of the combined British universities debating team, and Jack Menge and Shirley Jacobsen, Idaho's debaters, at a non-decision debate Friday night.

With the British team taking the affirmative, Cox opened discussion with regionalism as his basic argument. "It is impossible to achieve world government at once," he said, "but we must advance toward unity by building up federations of various related states or nations whose backgrounds are similar economically, culturally and geographically."

Arguments Set Down
Galer built up historical basis for nations organizing into larger units in his argument, and added that the next logical step is the regional federation.

Shirley Jacobsen brought out that, historically, the other attempts at world government have failed. Basic differences between the countries are too great to be reconciled and federal world government is not the only answer.

Included in the recital were "Prelude," "Sonata in E Major," and "Ballade in G Major," played by Davidson. Logan's selections included "The Cave," "The Wayfarer's Song," and "The Last Song." Prof. Hall M. Macklin was master of ceremonies.

Keeping Up With The Joneses

The Kwaiikutl Indians, a vanishing tribe of the Pacific coast, really go all out in keeping up with the Joneses. For the Kwaiikutls prestige is obtained in an elaborate ceremony known as the potlatch. At these ceremonies, a Kwaiikutl chief or his proxies gives away a great deal of wealth. The recipient of the gift, the Jones of the case, then starves and saves until such a time as he can give a larger gift in return. This sort of thing goes on until one or the other is completely broke. Final glory is attained by destroying all of one's property. In the nineteenth century many Hudson Bay blankets were annually dumped into the Puget sound. The potlatch ceremony had no practical use. It was merely a way of attaining social position—of keeping up with the Joneses. Such a system of useless spending often resulted in the loss of a man's wealth. He attained prestige, but destroyed himself. Strikingly similar to the potlatch is the American student's demand that dances and parties be more elaborate than any previous ones. It isn't yet so noticeable on the Idaho campus but at other schools the system is getting out of hand. At the University of Washington for instance, a fraternity with less than 100 members spent nearly \$2000 for a single dance. In the east three fraternities hired a name band to play at a dance. Undoubtedly they paid a price that Idaho's associated students could barely afford. At Idaho, too, the trend is evident. More and more time and money are going into house decorations and into house dances. Nobody is having any more fun because of the greater expense; they merely feel that it is necessary. The purpose of house functions has almost ceased to be to have a good time; more and more the purpose is becoming to keep up with the Joneses. It may result in social prestige; but, like Kwaiikutl prestige, it may bring bankruptcy with it. —H.R.

Frosh End Grid Season; Drop 14-7 Tussle To WSC

The University of Idaho freshman football squad puts away pads and paraphernalia for another season, after going down in defeat to the Washington State college "Cougabees" 14-7 in a well played contest at Neale stadium Friday, October 29. This marks the second time this season that the Vandals have fallen to the Cougars. Incidentally both scores were identical; but it was this time that the Idaho squad had to come from behind after trailing 7-0 early in the second period. In the contest played in Pullman earlier in the season, the Idaho squad took command 7-0, a lead that wasn't relinquished until the third quarter. In Friday's contest the Vandals threatened once in the first quarter; but their attack bogged down on the Cougar 17 after two passes had put them in scoring position. Due to a costly fumble the Cougars took over at this point. Cougar Score The Cougar yearlings held the upperhand throughout most of the first half. In the second quarter they scored when Fullback Lewis Bennville crashed through tackle from the one-foot line. Bud Roffler's conversion was perfect as it split the uprights. Late in the second period the Cougabees almost scored again, pushing the ball all the way down to the Vandal nine; but an intercepted pass thwarted their attack. Idaho's lone tally came as a result of a 47-yard drive, with Andy Christiansen and Fullback Glenn Breeden leading the way. A 5 yard pass from Larry Bell to End Lowry Bennett in the end-zone, gave the Vandals 6 points. Dick Iorns' placement was good and the score stood 7-7 at half-time. Fackrell Elusive The Cougar's winning tally came in the fourth canto, after their line held the Vandals on their own 21 and forced them to kick out. Christiansen's punt went to mid-field where Cougar back Fackrell caught it, fumbled it, picked it up and rambled over the goal line standing up. Almost every Vandal gridded on the field touched him, but were unable to halt the speedy back. Roffler again converted and ended the scoring for the contest. With less than a minute remaining in the fracas, Christiansen flipped a flat pass to back Dick Iorns who ran down the sidelines for 40

Deadline Set For Veteran Benefits

G-I education and training benefits have two deadlines, one to enter training and another to complete training. Education or training must be started within four years after discharge or by July 25, 1951, whichever is later. As a general rule, education or training must be completed not later than July 25, 1956. Exceptions from the general rule are veterans who enlisted or re-enlisted before October 6, 1946. These men figure deadlines on G-I Bill

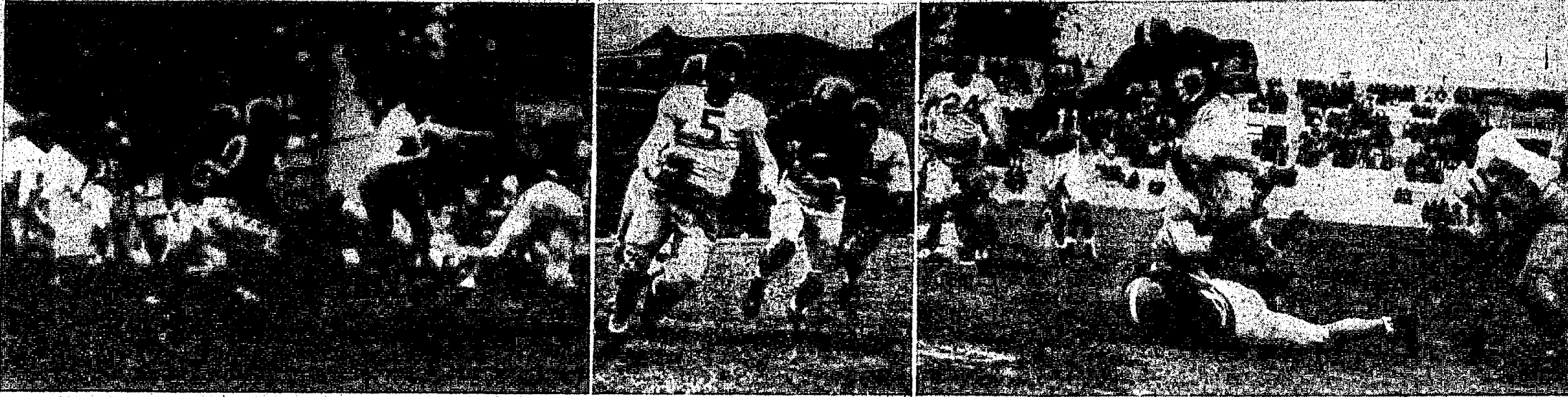

Approximately 17,000 sports fans were treated to a top-notch football game at Rogers field in Pullman Saturday when the University of Idaho Vandals lost a hard fought 19 to 14 decision to the WSC Cougars. The game was one in which every play could have meant victory. Spectacular play by both teams kept the fans thrilled

from the opening kickoff to the final gun. At left, above, Idaho's Bob Mays is about to land hard after being spilled in the early moments of the contest by an unidentified Cougar. Idahoans Fail To Beat 23-Year Jinx As Cougar Team Squeaks Past 19-14

Cross-Line Fracas Draws 17,000 Fans

Idaho's win-thirsty Vandal football machine failed to break a 23-year jinx held over them by the Washington State college Cougars Saturday, as the two teams battled on nearly even terms to a 19-14 heart-breaker before more than 17,000 chilly fans jam-packed into Rogers field, Pullman.

The Cougars reached pay-dirt first, scoring after two minutes of the second period, following a scoreless first quarter which featured unsuccessful drives on the part of both teams. Mataya carried the ball over for the tally from the one yard line. Lippincott's try for point was low, leaving the score 6-0.

Brogan Scores Untouched
Midway in the second period, Idaho got back into the ball game with a 75-yard drive, climaxed by Brogan's 19 yard dash right through the center of the WSC line to score standing up. Willie Overgaard split the goal-posts neatly, and the Vandals were out in front, 7-6.

The aroused WSC aggregation came right back and bulled their way 68 yards down the field to score with a minute left to play in the first half. Gambold's pass from the 27 was complete to Poltfoot in the end zone, Lippincott's try for point went wide, and the Cougars led, 12-7. The half ended with Idaho in possession of the ball on the mid-field stripe.

Third Quarter
Following an exchange of punts in the early minutes of the third period, Baxter recovered a Cougar fumble on the 5 yard line. The Vandals moved down to the WSC 20, where they were held for downs. Paul got the Cougars out of a bad spot with a 70-yard punt which went dead in the Idaho end zone. Idaho rushed and passed to their own 43, and then punted to the Cougar 15. The third quarter ended with WSC in possession of the ball on their own 42.

Fourth Quarter
Early in the fourth quarter, Williams set up the final WSC score with a 25-yard punt run-back to the Idaho 37. Three plays later, Brunswick broke through right guard from the Idaho 1-yard line into the end zone Lippincott's placement was good, and the score stood, 19-7.

A few minutes later, Idaho was in scoring position when Herrington blocked a Cougar punt on the Idaho 40, which bounded back to the WSC 27. Christenson passed to Block, who raced 20 yards for the second Idaho counter. Overgaard's kick was successful, and the score stood until the end of the game, 19-14.

Paasch, Killsgaard Injured
Two Vandal players were injured in the fracas, and may be sidelined indefinitely. Paasch and Killsgaard were both put out of play on the opening kick-off, and neither is expected to be in shape for the Montana state contest in Boise this weekend. Tom Ambrose, who replaced Paasch at center, was also injured during the game, but should be ready to go by Saturday.

Three To Go
With three games still on the schedule for the season, the Vandal squad swung into practice sessions yesterday, determined not to give up because of their lopsided record. Their showing against the third-place WSC team indicates they have plenty of chance to repair their record of five losses and one win before the season is over.
