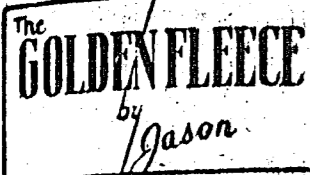

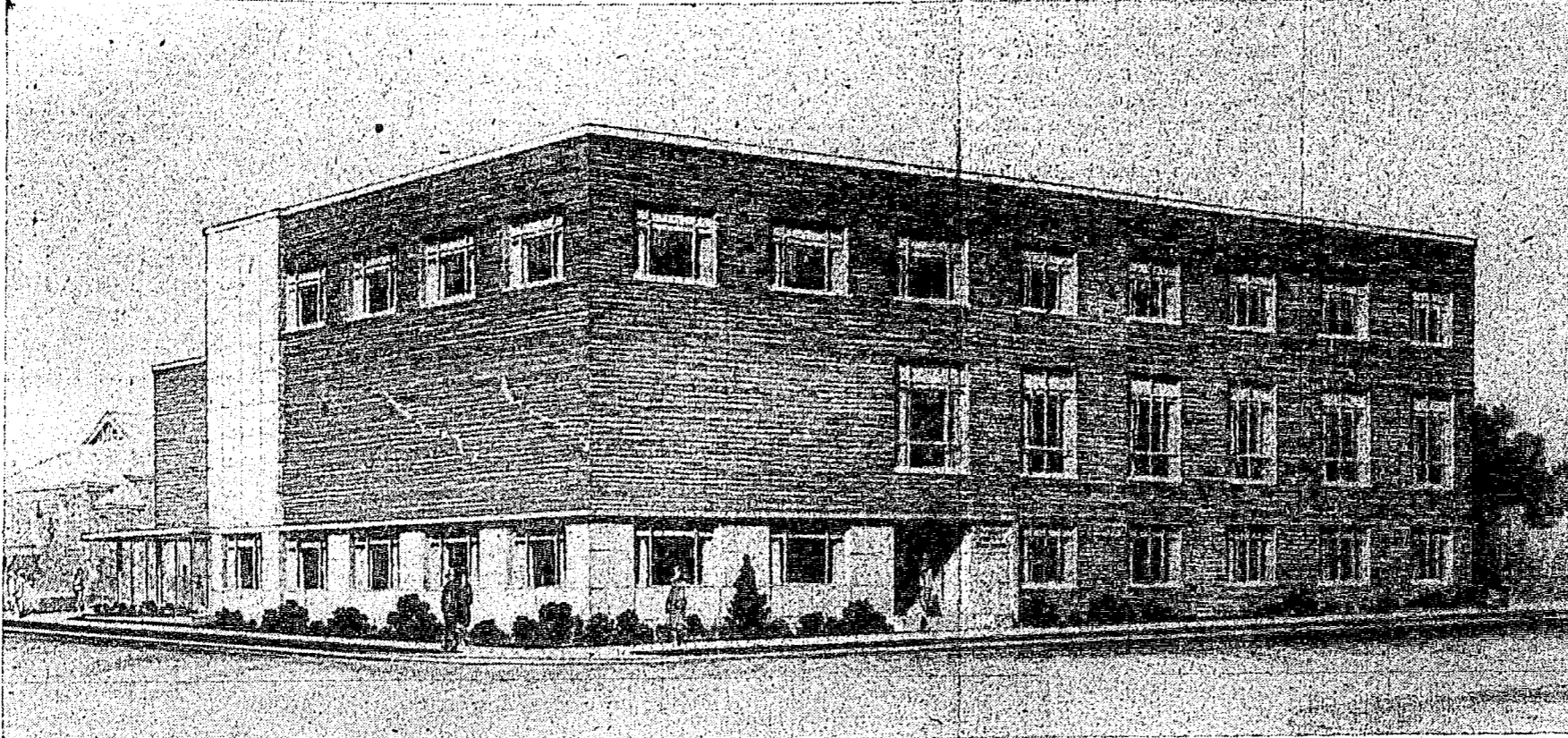

Principal speaker at the regular meeting of the International Relations club this Thursday evening will be Dr. Boyd Martin who will present an analysis of the 1948 election.

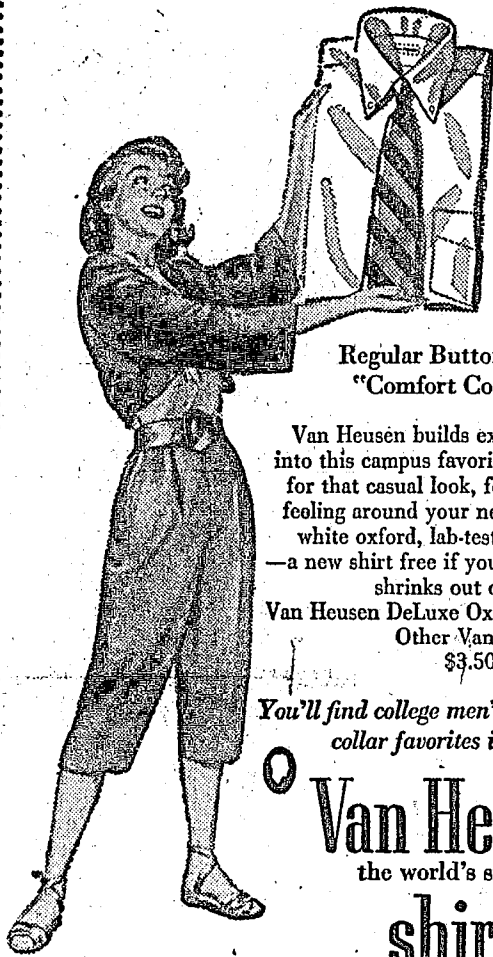

# Rampaging Idaho Vandals Unleash Terrific Power Attack As They Run Wild Over The Portland Pilots



Idaho's Vandals appeared in their last home game of the season last Saturday with an impressive 28-0 win over the University of Portland Pilots. At top left, Jerry Diehl rambles into pay dirt for the final score against the Pilots, and, incidentally, the last score of the season in Neale stadium. Good blocking put him in the open,

and he outdistanced every opponent to cross the goal line with ten yards between him and the nearest player. At bottom, left, Diehl crashes through a host of Portland tacklers for a first down on the Pilot 40 during Idaho's first touchdown drive. Along with Halfback John Christenson and Bob Mays, Diehl was a standout on offense,

carrying the pigskin 156 yards in 12 attempts—an average of 13 yards per try. In the center photo, Bob Mays is being spilled after going around right end for a first down on the Portland 40. The Vandals had sustained a five-yard penalty in the preceding play, but Mays made it up with yards to spare. At right, End Bill Beitz eludes

a Portland body-block after snagging a 15-yard toss from Christenson. Beitz weaved and twisted for 13 more yards before the Pilot secondary dragged him down on their 11-yard line. The play set up the second Vandal tally.

## Idaho Ends Home Season; Drop Portland Team 28-0

Nearly 4500 sports fans braved the chilly weather and threatening skies at Neale stadium, Moscow, Saturday afternoon to watch an awe-inspiring group of Idaho Vandals overpower the highly commended University of Portland Pilots 28 to 0.

Johnny Christenson's brilliant running and defensive work sparked the Vandals to their third victory of the season. Christenson brought the Idaho fans to their feet in the final period when he sprinted all the way from his own 19, 81 yards; for a touchdown only to have it called back on a holding penalty.

**Portland Threatens**  
Only once did the Portland aggregation seriously threaten to score. In the second half, on the opening kickoff, Freeman took the ball on his own 25 and carried to the 33 yard line. The Pilot's Dan Christenson then unleashed the most beautiful pass play of the day. He passed over center to Utz, just past the Idaho secondary, and Utz raced to the Idaho 12 yard marker before being caught from behind by George Ballew, Vandal left end. The threat ended however when Freeman and Welsman gained only 3 yards in four attempts and lost the ball on downs.

**Freeman, Christenson Star**  
Freeman's running and Christenson's passing added the only noticeable zip in the Portland aggregation and were responsible for most of the pilots' net gain of 165 yards.

**Score One**  
Idaho's first tally came in the early minutes of the game when Vandal sophomore Bob Mays con-

ected with a pass to Ed McFaul in coffin corner, from the 8 yard line, to climax a sustained drive from the Portland 48. Overgaard kicked the first of four perfect tries for conversions and the Vandals led 7 to 0 with ten minutes left to play in the first quarter.

Near the end of the first quarter, Portland's Utz got off a kick that went dead on the Idaho 46. The Vandals took over and marched down the field where Keith Bean opened the way for Christenson, who went across from the 11 for the second counter.

In the second period the Idahoans struck again. A series of 13 plays from the P. U. 31 yard marker paid off when Mays went around right end from the eight and crossed the goal standing up, with 4 minutes and 40 second gone in the second quarter.

**First Half Ends Idaho-21, P.U.-0**  
Jerry Diehl was forced out of bounds on the Portland 27 and another Vandal threat ended as the gun sounded the finish of the first half with Idaho leading 21 to 0.

Both teams seemed to go into that traditional third period slump and the count at the end of the scoreless third quarter still stood Idaho 21, Portland U. 0.

**Diehl Goes Over From 45**  
The final touchdown was scored by Jerry Diehl who ran 45 yards from scrimmage behind beautiful blocking to reach pay dirt untouched. Overgaard kicked the point and the final score remained unchanged until the end—Idaho 28, Portland university 0.

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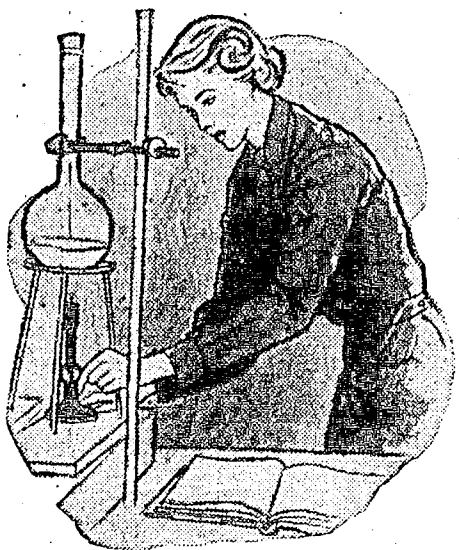


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
