Some of the major factors in the analysis were that farmers enjoying the prospertly brought about through subsidies, parity prices, and other New Deal legislation, and remembering the ock-bottom market of the early 30's turned in a Democratic vote for the Truman electoral college. Labor was one of the forces toward the Democratic majority. The big factor in the unexpected results lay possibly with the Democratic party splinters. Neither the Dixiecrats nor the Wallaceites polled the popular vote which it was expected they would.



erpreting context.
"Two blacks and a white" may mean anything. Is it any wonder that arguments arise so frequently within families and close friendships? Or that misunderstood phrases form the basis of much of the political "mud slinging." Is it any advertising (several down-town merchants have inquired wonder that in a world of so many tongues, it seems so diffi-


