The season's initial contest for both squads brought into sharp focus the ragged offense of the Idaho quintet, and the Walla Walla club was able to take a 22-17 advantage by half-time. The Missionaries then displayed a sharp defensive

Idaho Gains Early Lead Idaho seized an early lead when forward Dick Geisler sank a free throw, but Whitman retalialed with a pair of gift tallies to move ahead 2-1. The two teams alternately claimed the lead until the closing minutes of the first half, when the Missionaries put on a

spurt and moved out in front. Defensive action on the part of Whitman stalemated Idaho's attack in the second half; although at one point during the fourth quarter the Missionaries held a margin of only two points. Idaho's attempt to speed up the play during the final minutes of the game were unsuccessful, due to steady Whitman ball-handling and their early lead. Whitman's slow-down maneuver with a six-point lead and eight minutes to play was made particularly effective by Bill Green, Missionary guard.

High Scorers

Forward Loren Blickenstaff o Whitman and Vandal guard Preston Brimhall tied for the scoring lead with 10 points each.

The Vandals found the range in the second game when Nick Stallworth, Idaho's six-foot-six center went on a scoring spree to spark his team-mates to a 42-28 win.

Forward Gerry Gunnels opened the scoring for the Vandals, and the Idaho club led throughout the contest, although Whitman nar rowed the lead to two points in the second quarter before dropping behind 21-10 at the half.

Nick Stallworth connected for four field goals and four free tosses to lead the scoring with 12 points, closely followed by Gerry Gunnels with 10. Blickenstaff, a Whitman freshman, again led the Missionaries, with a total of nine


