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DuSault Releases Second Semester Registration Dates

After completing registration with their academic deans and securing deans' signatures on registration blanks, students are directed to report to U.C.B. 101 to be assigned number for the Memorial gym registration procedure. Students will be admitted to Memorial gym by number according to the schedule listed below. Admittance will be made by blocks of numbers, not by strict numerical order, according to D. D. DuSault, registrar. If number blocks are missed, it will be necessary for students to procure a new number and proceed with the new group.

Cooperation will be appreciated in helping make this system operate successfully, announced DuSault. The schedule is as follows:

The broadcast may be heard over KRPL in Moscow at 6:15 p.m., and at 10:15 a.m. over KRILC in Lewiston.

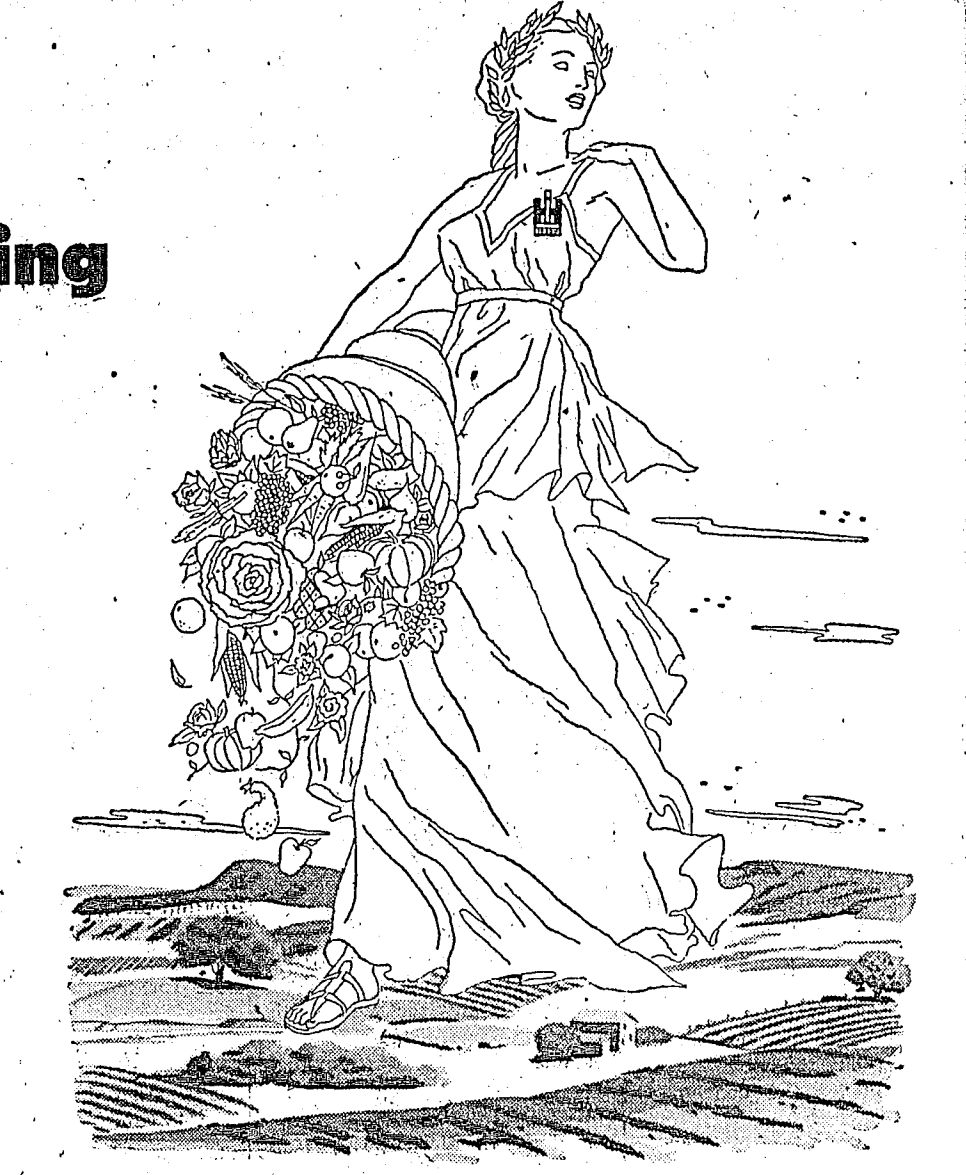

Communitistic Professors

Besides being frequently confused with Vulcan, Voltaire is also well-known for his statement, "I disagree with what you say, but will defend to death your right to say it." News stories of the past week seem to indicate that current feeling would require his statement to be amended to read "unless he's a college professor."

Severest criticism of college professors has come at a big school and a little school. In the big school—the University of Washington—three professors were discharged and three others were put on probation because they belonged, or had belonged, to the communist party.

If the fact that a man is a communist makes him less capable of teaching philosophy, psychology or invertebrate zoology, then the dismissals were probably warranted. However, according to the Spokesman-Review's account, dismissal was requested because of the professors' communist party affiliations.

At the little school—Olivet college in Michigan—three professors were also discharged. The first was fired for ultra-liberalism. The other two—one the socialist candidate for vice-president and the other a Pulitzer prize winning historian—were fired, apparently, for leading a student revolt against the purge.

We know very little about Olivet but a pre-purge student of the school told us that it was a very pleasant place to get a liberal education. And he was a Republican.

We think it would probably do us good to rub elbows with some good, honest communists. We should also like to learn first-hand of mystics, bull-fighters, hermits, socialists and Texans. We think we could learn something from all of them without becoming a mystic, a communist or a Texan.

The American college student should be past the place where he learns by rote. He ought to be able to weigh the arguments of the followers of Buddhism, free love, the new look, communism and states' rights and reach his own conclusions.

Perhaps he can't; perhaps the American college student is barely adolescent. In that case he should be protected—protected from head colds, from loose women, from communism and from the knowledge that President Grant sinned.

The dismissal of the six college professors can be justified if the American student is incapable of making decisions. But if college students are mature, thinking, rational beings; then there is no justification.

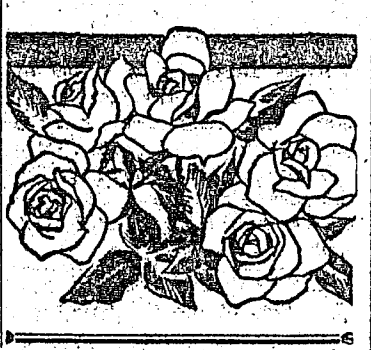

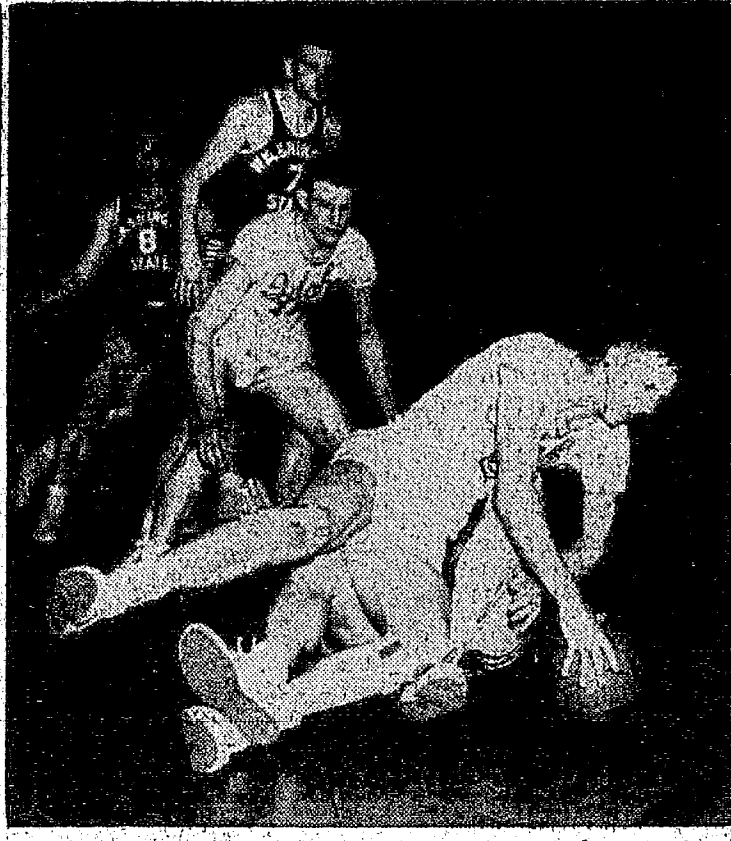

Boxing and basketball highlighted the events of the sporting world on the Idaho campus last weekend, as the Vandals took a 4-3 ring victory over the EWCE Savages on Friday night and dropped a 54-37 decision to the league-leading Cougars from WSC. The high-flying Cougars of Washington State made it five in a row in the northern division conference race by defeating the University of Idaho Vandals 45-37 before a capacity crowd of 5500 in Memorial gymnasium Saturday evening.

Sparked by Ed Gayda, the Cougars' mention for All-American honors, WSC was never in hot water. Gayda scored first with a charity toss and immediately followed with two more to put the Cougars ahead 3-0. WSC advanced their total to nine points, while holding the Vandals to two.

Vandal Boxers Make '49 Debut With 4-3 EWCE Win

Idaho's rugged boxing squad got off to a good start on their 1949 ring season last Friday night by pouncing out a 4-3 decision over the tough sluggers from EWCE. Three exhibition bouts preceded the eight-fight card which featured a knockout, two TKO's, and one bout declared no decision. The Vandals displayed a weakness in the lighter weights, trailing 3-1 by the end of the fourth fight.

Tovey Scores Win Idaho's fireball DeForest Tovey opened the card in the 125-pound class with a decision over Bobby Schmitt of EWCE. The next three contests went to the Savages, as Oliver decisoned Morgan, Worsham scored a technical knockout over Domnick half-way through the second round, and Fiksdal out-pointed Gasser.

The Vandals swung their heavy guns into position with the beginning of the fifth bout, when Idaho's Vern Bahr battered Savage Shanon Hiet for a TKO midway through the second round of the 155-pound contest. The sixth event featured Herb Carlson, twice national intercollegiate champion, who racked up the highest point-margin of the meet in decisioning Cheney's inexperienced Bill Sage in the 165-pound division.

Diehl Gets No-Go In the 175-pound class, the decision first went to Ted Diehl, after his opponent, Al Latermer, failed to answer the second round bell due to a cut over his left eye. Later, the bout was declared no contest, after a perusal of the rule-book disclosed that the time before the sounding of the bell started the second round is legally part of the first round. Under the existing rule, if, in the first round, the officials decide that the fight should not continue, the bout is declared no contest.

The final contest of the evening was a whirlwind display of Idaho's Heavyweight Don Ellis, who knocked out EWCE's McNutt in 40 seconds of the second round.
