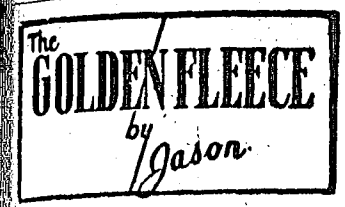

Tex Beneke's Orchestra To Give Concert Sunday

Local music fans will be able to see and listen to the Tex Beneke orchestra Sunday afternoon at 3 in Memorial gymnasium.



Tex Beneke, who is coming under the auspices of the ASUI, will present the band which Glenn Miller had intended to bring to American audiences before he was reported missing in action during a flight while serving with the armed forces.

A survey was taken among campus living groups during the last week to determine which musical selections students would like to hear the Beneke orchestra play. Many of the choices were numbers popularized by the pre-war Miller orchestra. The choices include: "String of Pearls", "In the Mood", "Moonlight Serenade", "Meadowlands", "Stardust", "St. Louis Blues March", "Body and Soul", "Chattanooga Choo Choo", "Little Brown Jug", "Sunrise Serenade".

The Moonlight Serenaders, a vocal group featuring two men and two girls instead of the customary three and one combination, will appear at intervals during the three hour concert.

General Manager Gale Mix had chartered a special bus to take the Vandals to Spokane where they will board a train to Seattle for the two game basketball series Friday and Saturday. Four Judges Refreshments, prepared by the girls of Phi Upsilon Omicron, will be served during the entire dance.

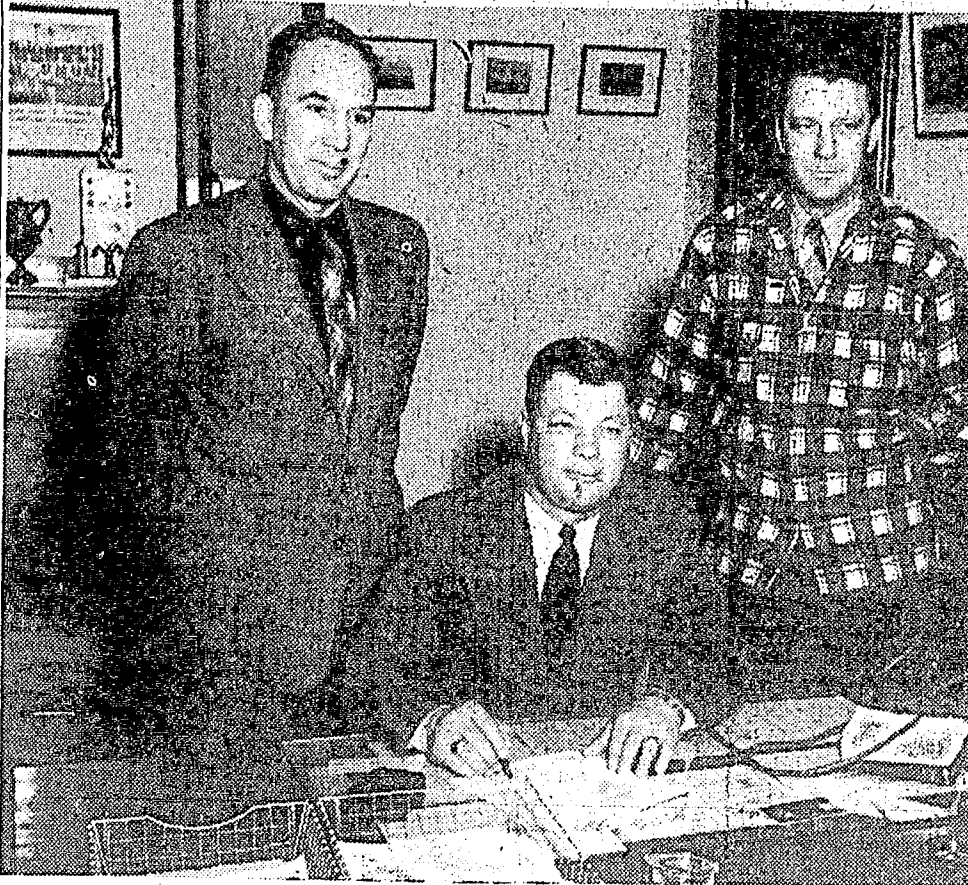

University's SOS Results In "2894"

Locomotive No. 2894 of the Union Pacific, which has been on an emergency standby basis at Spokane for the last two months to assure that 3,700 University of Idaho students would not be frozen out of their classrooms, was back today to routine riding of the rails.

It all began when the university started replacing two small, worn out boilers with a big, modern one. Came the unusually cold weather, and two boilers remaining on duty during the installation had to huff and puff to work up enough steam. If one failed, quite a chill would come over the campus buildings.

President Sends Plea President J. E. Buchanan wired a plea to Union Pacific officials explaining the predicament. The railroad responded with one assignment for locomotive No. 2894: "Stand by for an SOS from the University of Idaho." Couplings were made ready at the university heating plant so that all the locomotive had to do was roll up to the plant and start giving out steam. But there was no breakdown, and the new boiler is now ready for action.

No. 2894 served by merely standing and waiting.

Wearing of uniforms by military students and veterans is optional. Semi-formal dress will be worn by those not wearing uniforms. A military theme will be carried in the decorations.

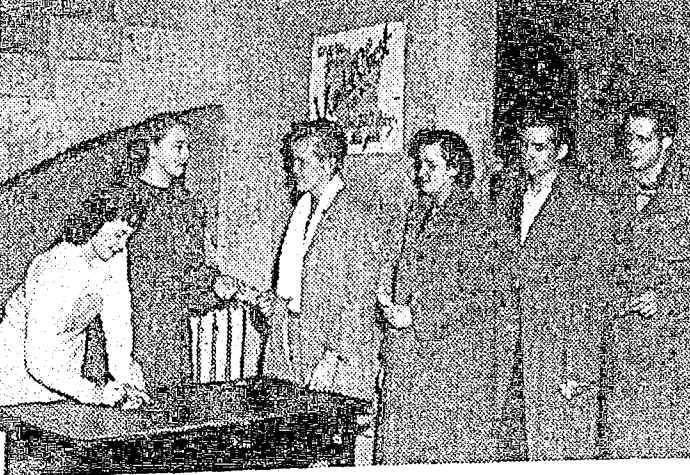

Conference To Decide New Research Station Projects

New research projects for the University of Idaho's five branch experiment stations, at Sandpoint, Parma, Caldwell, Aberdeen and Teton, will be outlined at the annual experiment station conference on the campus next week, February 13 to 19, inclusive.

Participating will be branch station superintendents Ralph S. Samson, Sandpoint; D. R. Franklin, Parma; R. F. Johnson, Caldwell; Ralph E. Knight, Aberdeen; and W. A. Moss, Teton; resident research workers in the university college of agriculture, and representatives of the U. S. department of agriculture cooperating in projects underway at the branch stations.

Research inventory is primarily to outline the coming season's programs for the branch stations, it is also somewhat of an annual inventory of all agricultural research in Idaho," explained Dr. Glenn C. Holm, research director for the agricultural experiment station. "All told, the college of agriculture has underway more than 140 research projects."

"More projects are to be added at the suggestion of the agricultural consulting council, composed of representatives of all major agricultural associations in Idaho. The council suggests problems needing research attention. The branch stations participate in most of the research projects."

Program Announced

The program for the seven-day conference, just announced by Dr. Holm, covers all phases of the university's field research in agriculture. Among the highly technical topics to be discussed will be the effect of 2,4-D spray on the protein content of wheat. Attention also will be given to a survey of new cereal, vegetable, and fruit varieties developed by plant breeders elsewhere in the United States that merit trial under Idaho conditions.

Snowshoes And Slide Rule Garb Of Idaho Faculty Man

High in the Bitterroot mountains near Mullan pass, a University of Idaho engineering faculty member went snowshoeing last week—but not for fun. It was a research assignment that took him into that land of deep snow and magnificent views.

Calvin C. Warnick, research technologist with the engineering experiment station, accompanied by Marcy Laragan, a senior in civil engineering, had to put on snowshoes to inspect the battery of experimental high altitude precipitation gages involved in a university research project.

Need Accurate Gage

Goal of this research study, explains Warnick, is a type of shield that will reduce the influence of wind on the accuracy of the precipitation-measuring gages. Accurate gaging is necessary to permit reliable forecasts of future runoff. Small-scale models were tried out in wind tunnels in the engineering laboratories last year. Smoke was used to trace wind flow.

Full-scale installations of the shields that proved most satisfactory in the laboratory tests were installed on gages on a mountain top guaranteed to provide plenty of snow and wind. Some gages are of the standpipe type, 18 feet high. Others are of the tower type, the tower rising 15 feet above ground with the gage itself four feet high. Employees at the Mullan Pass civil aeronautics communications station make weekly observations of the performance of the shields.

Fills Many Needs

"Last year's heavy floods in the Northwest demonstrated the importance of accurate winter precipitation measurements," said Warnick. "People must be given forecasts they will believe. Irrigation districts need dependable information on water supply. Power companies want to know probable stream flow. Accurate gages form the starting point in filling all these needs."

As yet, Warnick has no definite conclusions on his gage research. His snowshoeing research—his first—yielded one definite conclusion.

"It's a lot easier to come down a mountain on snowshoes than it is to go up," he declares. Late in March or April he will make another check of the gages.

Various decorative themes have been used in the past 32 years. For one of the most outstanding themes, the gymnasium was completely decorated with cedar and pine boughs and throughout the dance couples were showered with an "ersatz" snow from the ceiling of the gym. In 1933 Babe, the Blue Ox, announced the dance numbers by carrying a placard across one end of the dance floor.

Although the School of Forestry was deleted during the war years, the Associated Foresters still managed to keep this tradition alive by presenting a Woodchopper's Ball every year.



Idaho Boxers Meet WSC In Nine Matches Tonight

Another turbulent storm will rage in Moscow this evening and Idaho's blustering arctic weather will not be directly responsible for the blowing that is predicted to take place on the Idaho campus. Tonight's fury will be confined strictly to the Memorial gymnasium where Coach Ike Deeter's recently victorious Washington State college mittmen are the guests of Coach Frank Young and his classy Vandal leather belters. The nine-bout presentation is scheduled to start at 8 o'clock with every match on the card a "true natural."

Three top-notch freshmen exhibition fights will set the stage for six varsity bouts. The classy, clever Walker brothers from Wallace, Idaho, will open the varsity card in a bang uv' fashion at the 130- and 135-pound weights when they pitch the twelve-ounce gloves against two well-weathered Washington State punchers. This evening's match-ups will be the first varsity assignments for the two Walkers. Norm steps out of the Vandal corner at 130-pounds to meet sharp looking Larry McLaughlin, who has started an impressive string of victories at WSC. Brother Len follows suit in the 135-pound weight against tough Jerry McHugh.

Thane Johnson, Vandal varsity veteran in the 145-pound division, receives the acid test in his first fight of the 1949 campaign when he races rough tough Nip Long of Washington State. That slugfest will be followed by the matching of Vern Bahr, Idaho, and Dallas Sartz, WSC, in what promises to be another whirlwind go.

Carlson vs. Clifford
Two-time intercollegiate champion Herb Carlson crawls between the ropes in the 165-pound bracket and the smooth, sharp shooting Wallace, Idaho, product will throw jabs and hooks with Benny Clifford of Cougarville. Ted Diehl, hard hitting Idaho belter, and Jim Aklin, scrappy trouble making Washington State light-heavyweight, highlight the star-studded card in the final bout of the evening.

Plenty of talent will be displayed in the freshman exhibition bouts also. Idaho's crowd-pleasing, 125-pound Franky Echarria meets Everett Connelly in the initial fight of the evening, while at 150 pounds, blonde, bombing Bud Lawson of Idaho receives his first assignment of the season when he tangles with Tony Hardwick, WSC. Third preliminary bout puts Lloyd Schiller, a sparring mate of Herb Carlson, against the Cougar's Chuck Morgan.

Two On Sidelines
Two battling Idaho regulars will be on the shelf tonight as a result of forfeits in the 125-pound and heavyweight class. DeForrester Tovey who has recently been hampered with a bone bruise he sustained in training, will not mix it up with WSC's Jack Melson in the bantamweight class. Young withdrew the mauling Malad youngster out of the varsity lineup when Tovey failed to respond fully to treatment.

Idaho's heavyweight, "Pug" Don Ellis, previously scheduled to meet Bob Dornick, will not take part in the ring activity because of a WSC forfeit. Dornick was chilled early in the second round of his fight last week with an inexperienced University of Minnesota unknown. Weather conditions caused cancellation of close to seventy-five ring side seats which had been reserved by personnel from Wallace, but blizzards or not, a capacity crowd is still expected.

Tanksters Face Huskies Saturday

The University of Idaho splash squad will meet the Washington Huskies tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 in the Memorial gymnasium. Captain Jim Farmer with teammates Lyons and Gust appear to be the main links in the free style events. Others bolstering the Vandal squad are Smith and Bishop in the diving events, Edmark and Barbee in the backstroke, and Green, Miller, Pearson and Kinney who form the relay team. The University of Washington team is the holder of all but one of the Northern Division swim records and has a good record this year. Idaho hasn't fallen in with the general herd in that respect, however, since the Vandals have lost five of their nine home contests this season.

Rise Of Athletic Fortunes Due To New School Spirit

(Editor's note: H. L. Gregory, sports editor of the Oregonian at Portland, is a veteran of many seasons in covering the northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball races. His analysis of the Idaho team and the system used by Chuck Finley to bring the Vandals to a peak for the Oregon State and Washington State series is being reprinted to show Vandal boosters what really has been accomplished during the season by the Idaho coach.)
"What has so suddenly and surprisingly made a 'giant killer' of what early this season looked like pretty nearly a hopeless Idaho basketball team? For instance, within six nights Idaho stopped the two northern division leaders, first Washington State by a 41-32 count, and then Oregon State, 51-39, and with nothing fluky about either victory, and while Oregon State turned the tables the second night to win and stay in the race, it was a real struggle all the way. . . ."

Something Happened

"Obviously, something has happened at Idaho, and we'll try to tell you what it is. In part, of course, it is just natural for the basketball team to show development, but we believe the full answer goes considerably deeper, to wit: First, under Dixie Howell in football, and now under Chuck Finley in basketball, there suddenly is developing a real Idaho spirit and team pride. This, plus the acquisition of some important material, is producing a new athletic outlook at the school. Astonishing Development "As for team development, the sudden advance of Finley's team astonished no one as much as the basketball experts. He used an unorthodox system of play, first, on slowing down opponents whenever the Vandals get ahead; but second, along with this is an odd system of screening, in which Idaho screens away from the ball rather than in front of it. . . . "Idaho started too far back to the 440 yard free style. He also placed second in the 300 yard medley."

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Idaho's always-tough leather pushers have been engaged in hot and heavy ring-work for the past two weeks, after triumphing over the EWCE sluggers, 4-3, in the season's opening meet. Here is the squad which will tackle the Cougar boxers here tonight. Left to right, they are: Frank Young, 125; Len Walker, 135; Vern Gasser, 145; Vern Bahr, 155; Thane Johnson, 145; Woody Delorme, heavyweight; Don Ellis, heavyweight; Ted Diehl, 175; Herb Carlson, 165; DeForrester Tovey, 125; and Norm Walker, 130.

Cagers Journey To Seattle To Vie For Cellar Position

It is a crucial trip for the Vandal hoopsters, since the outcome of this series and the two-game series with the Huskies here next weekend will determine which of the two squads will end up on the bottom rung of the northern division ladder. Both teams have a record of three wins and seven losses in conference play, so that they are currently in a tie for fourth place in the northern division.

Vandals Have Edge
In all games played during the season, the Vandals have an edge over the Husky quintet. The Idaho team have won 13 of their 26 games, for an even 50 percent, while the University of Washington has made eight entries in the win column out of a total of 20 games played—a 40 percent average.

In a round-up of the common foes, the Huskies have beaten Oregon State once out of five attempts; Idaho has dumped the Beavers once out of four. The same figures apply in the case of the University of Oregon—one out of five for Washington, and one out of four for Idaho.

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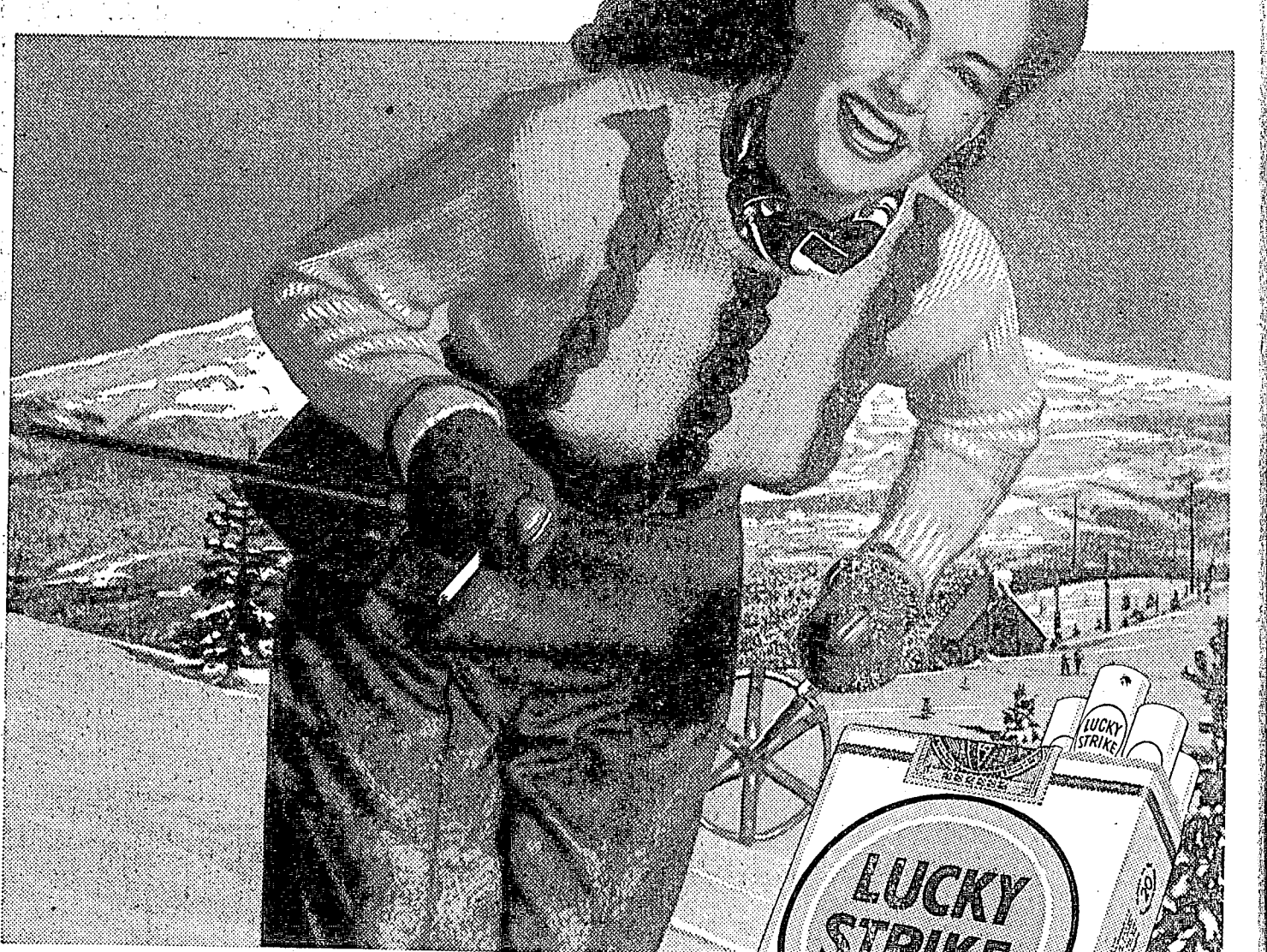
