Reds Peril World Security With Actions Near Berlin

Russians were reported today to be building a huge underground air raid shelter outside Berlin and strengthening their secret police force.

The British-licensed newspaper, *Telegraf* said the 370 room shelter is copied after the bunker in which Hitler is believed to have died. It is near completion and will be so big the entire soviet military staff could occupy it "cut off from the outside for many weeks," the paper said.

Summer Camp Has Need For Leaders

Positions are open to women wishing to work in the Home Valley summer camp this summer, the women's physical education department disclosed recently.

Sixty-five miles up the Columbia Evergreen highway from Portland, the camp contains 1,300 acres of timber land, eight lakes, streams, and trails.

The summer program is to be made up of four camp units. Openings include: unit leader—the individual must be at least 20 years old and have had prior camping experience; assistant leader—applicants must be at least 18 years of age.

Any woman who is 21 and who holds a water safety instructor rating may apply as waterfront director. Assistant waterfront directors will be chosen from women who are no younger than 18 and who have senior life-saving certificates.

Salaries vary according to the position and experience of the individual. Emphasis will be based on actual camping experience.

Obscure Refuge

The refuge is in a dismantled ball bearing plant in Ruedersdorf, several miles from the Russian military government headquarters at Karlshorst.

The American-licensed newspaper, *Der Abend* reported the soviets have brought in more secret police and doubled the staff at the Frenzlauer street prison in Berlin. The paper said the prison houses mostly "provocateurs and spies," some held since 1945 because they have not given what the Russians consider proper answers to questions.

Soviet Regime

Meanwhile, German social democrats charged that soviet secret police had imposed a "terror regime" in the Russian zone of occupation. A report issued by the party said the Russians employed one informer for every 100 residents in their zone.

"The soviets have reestablished in their zone the successful terror regime developed by the nazis with an almighty secret police, and concentration and forced labor camps," the report continued.

The social democratic party said it is cataloging the names of informers, so they can be dealt with after "lawful conditions are reestablished" in the Russian zone. The party is the strongest political organization in western Germany.
