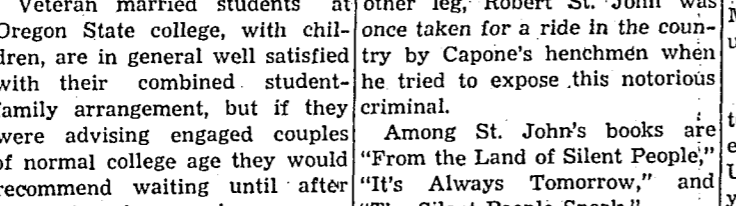
Careful Preparation

Three Members Of Idaho Cage Team Place On All-Northern Division Squad

Brimhall Named To 1st Five; Stallworth, Pritchett 2nd

Selection of three Idaho players to the 27th annual All-Northern Division basketball team has made the Vandals best represented of competing teams. The all-star group includes Idaho guard Preston Brimhall on the first team while Bob Pritchett took one of the forward spots on the second team and Nick Stallworth was named number two center.

Four unanimous selections featured the balloting. They were forwards Ed Gayda of Washington State and Sammy White of Washington, Center Roger Wiley of Oregon and Guard Cliff Crandall of Oregon State. These were the first choices of all five Northern coaches while the fifth man on the team, Guard Preston Brimhall of Idaho, lacked but one vote of being a unanimous pick.

Two On Second Squad
The voting coaches chose a second team composed of Husky Bill Vandenberg, Cougar George Hamilton, Beaver Bill Harper and the two Idaho Vandals, Bob Pritchett, and Nick Stallworth.

Brimhall was Idaho's defensive ace during the past two seasons. He usually managed to hold the opposition's leading scorer to a couple of baskets per game while scoring well himself. Crandall steered the Beavers to the league title both as high scorer and as a floor leader. Wiley, the biggest man in the division, was also the biggest man on the scoreboard. He tallied 235 points in 16 league games to set a four-year conference scoring record of 644 points. Despite illness and injuries White performed brilliantly at all positions for the Huskies. Gayda, in playing his third year on the WSC first team, ranked second in Northern Division individual scoring this season.

All Five Place In '48
Crandall, Brimhall, and White are repeaters from the 1948 first team while Wiley and Gayda were second team selections from last year. Of the five 1949 All-stars only Gayda is expected to play again next year. Although White, like Gayda, is a junior this year, he recently announced his intention to leave school and enter professional baseball's ranks. The other three are graduating seniors.

The 1949 official All-Southern Division team is made up of Bill Sharman, USC; Alan Sawyer, USC; Bill Hagler, California; George Stanich, UCLA; and Dave Davidson, Stanford.
