

Soulen is a former president of the Idaho Wool Growers association. The grading study will shift next to Picabo, where sheep owned by Breckenridge, present head of the Idaho woolmen, will start through the shearing pens May 10. Grading of fleeces from the Stolworthy bands is scheduled for about June 1. Breckenridge and Stolworthy are second-year cooperators in the Idaho study.

This 1949 study is a followup to last year's project, which included "skirting" of fleeces prior to grading, a practice generally followed in Australia, Skirting involves removing of sorts and tag ends from fleeces. Professor Hickman estimates that the Idaho study, which will get comparative data on various types of fleece handling and marketing, will continue another two or three years.

Add to this the difference between the cost of living here and on other campuses. In a comparison on that basis several factors in a small town where living costs are traditionally lower than in a large city where many western institutions are located.

Board Is Lower

A second factor is that almost all Idaho students board either in fraternity and sorority houses or in university owned and operated dining halls. Cost of board in such cases is considerably below what it is in commercial dining establishments. Idaho is also famous


