New Point System Limits Scope Of AWS Activities

Enforcement of the new point system set up by Mortar Board and voted on by the living groups last spring will be the chief project of the Associated Women Students council during the year.

The activities are classified as major (5 points), intermediate (4 points) and minor (1 point). Junior and senior women are allowed 6 points. If a woman is overpointed, a letter will be sent out asking her to drop at least one activity.

The system as explained in the student handbook, is as follows: Organization: 1. Every woman in school will be given a blank on which activity interests at the first of the year must be filled in.

3. All campus organizations are asked to cooperate in using the file to choose committee workers according to the interests listed. A cross reference file will be made so that lists of decorators, typists, saleswomen, entertainers, etc., can be picked at a glance.

4. The point system chairman for each living group is responsible to see that all lists are received and entered. Further check will be made possible through clippings from each issue of the Argonaut.

Each women's living group should have a point system representative to check on points for the women in her respective group each week.

Four New Courses Offered At Idaho For "Broadening"

"As the world shrinks man's mind must stretch out to better understand it," said President J. E. Buchanan of the University of Idaho today. "That is why the university this week started giving instruction in four new broadening courses."

The courses are titled 'Introduction to the Humanities, Social Sciences, Biological Sciences, and Physical Sciences. They do not form rungs in a step-by-step curriculum like most university courses, but offer horizontal coverage of their fields.

"We don't expect to develop experts with these courses — just to provide a better understanding of the experts," said President Buchanan. "The scientist should know the artist better, and the artist the scientist better."

During summer vacation, many improvements were made on Idaho's "powerful little 5-watter."

New turntables have been installed with two tone arms so that either the new long-playing records or conventional recordings can be played during broadcasts. Much of the apparatus has been rewired by members of the station engineering staff, resulting in increased efficiency of equipment and reception.

The ASUI hopes that someday the University of Idaho will have a fine radio station with which the school can train personnel in all fields of radio. KUOI may be considered a pioneer towards that goal.

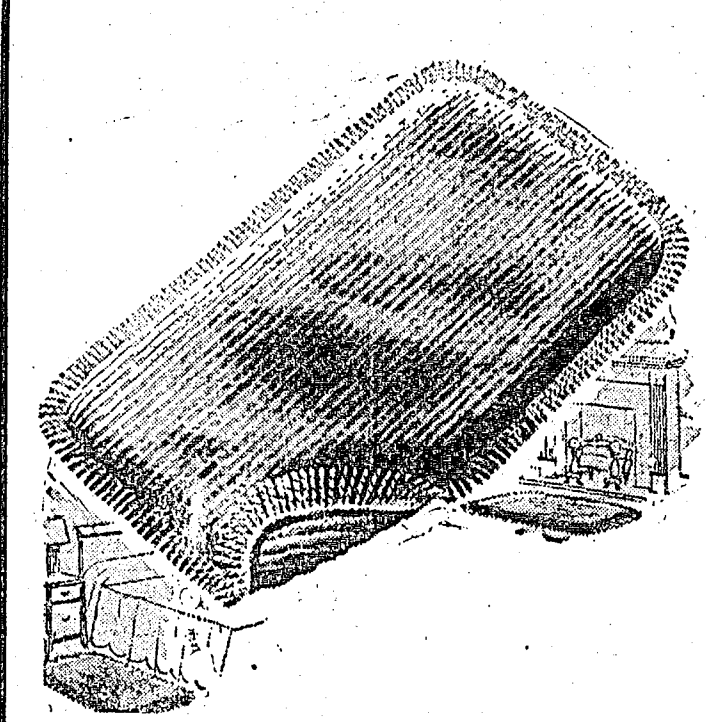

Students Receive \$500 In Awards Of Scholarships

Three new scholarships, totaling more than \$500 have recently been awarded to University students, Bursar Kenneth Dick announced today.

Patricia J. Terry, received an award of \$125 presented by the Spokane Press club. Miss Terry is the winner of the Spokane Junior Press club scholarship.

Massachusetts Award
 A \$100 scholarship was awarded to Howard W. Chadwick. The award was established by Francis L. Thompson, who left \$400,000 to the city of Arlington, Mass. The income from the money is awarded to graduates of Arlington high school. Chadwick, one of about 60 to receive the awards this year, is a freshman at the University of Idaho.

Tractor Troubles Can Be Eased

The tractor that suffers from morning sickness may be feuding with its gasoline tank.

W. J. Schmid, university agricultural engineer says much of the water that bothers carburetors of farm tractors may come from moisture condensation in the tank.

Moisture In Tank
 Schmid says there's a lot of moisture laden air in the tank at the end of the day's work. If the machine sits through the cold night with the air still in the tank, there's sure to be condensation of the moisture. Eventually the condensed moisture gets to the carburetor, and the result is a motor that won't start easily in the mornings.

"Fill her up in the evening, and you'll have less trouble," the engineer says. "That kicks air out of the tank, and no condensation results. Besides all that—you get that much earlier start in the morning." "Works both ways to make both the tractor and the farmer more efficient early in the day."

Longhorns Start Slowly But Have Wild Second Half

The Texas Longhorns got off to a slow start in Memorial Stadium at Austin Saturday afternoon but picked up plenty of momentum in the second half. They coupled a devastating ground attack with a potent aerial offensive to slap down a fighting Idaho team 56 to 7 before a crowd of 23,000.

The two halves of play were like two complete ball games. Idaho showed that they were no cream-puff set-up by holding the highly touted Longhorns at a 7 to 7 deadlock during the first two quarters.

It looked as though an upset could be in the making as the two squads left the field during intermission period. The Idaho line had charged in a here-we-come, move-or-die fashion and had opened plenty of holes for the Vandal backs.

Texas Scores First

After the Longhorns had counted for seven, 5 minutes and 5 seconds deep in the initial period, Idaho retaliated with 1 minute and 25 seconds remaining in the half to tie up the ball game, 7-7. It was the first touchdown scored against the Texans this season.

Idaho muffed one scoring chance when they drove down to the Texas 3-yard line but the attack bogged down and they lost on downs.

Mid-way through the second period tackle Marvin Beguhl broke through the Texas line to block an attempted Texas punt. Tackle Carl Killsgaard pounced on the ball and Idaho took over squarely on the 50-yard stripe.

From there John Brogan flipped a pass to right end Orville Barnes. The pitch was good for 27 yards and a first down on the Texas 20.

Block Goes Over

Jerry Diehl carried to the four on a Statue of Liberty play and King Block bucked over three plays later from the 1-foot line. Tackle Will Overgaard converted.

The second half was a different ball game altogether. The Texans got hotter than the temperature and Idaho could do nothing to throttle the touchdown bound Texas backs. The stampede was on as the Longhorns ran over four touchdowns and a safety in the third quarter and three more T.D.s in the final 15 minutes.

Despite the lopsided score only two men were injured on the Idaho line. Fullback King Block and Guard Bill Fry received bruised shoulders.

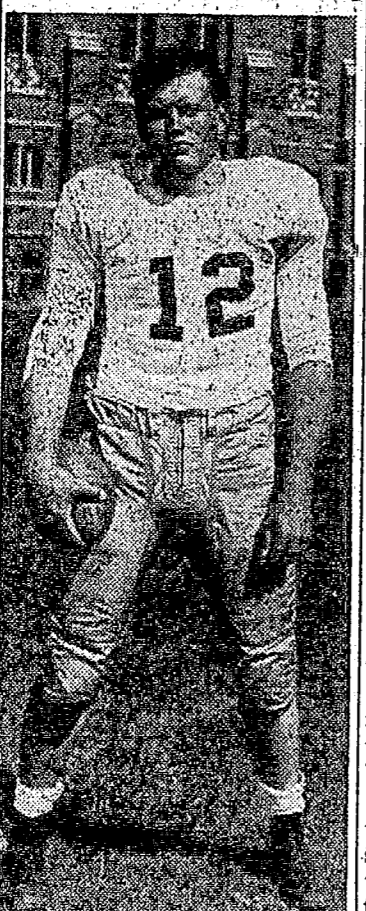
Vandal Portraits

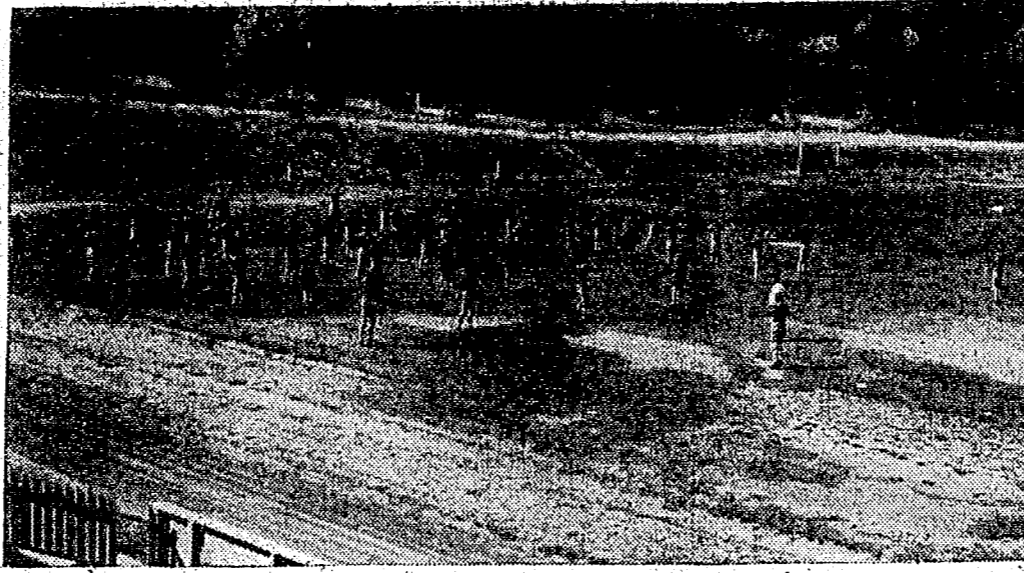


An honor student, he lettered three years in football, and 1 year each in basketball and track.

Standout Players

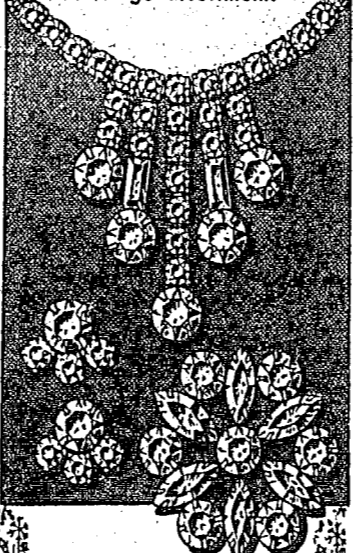
