

Understand Experts "We don't expect to develop xperts with these courses - just o provide a better understanding of the experts," said President Buchanan. "The scientist should tist the scientist better."

"Introduction to the Humaniies" typifies the scope of the courses. During the first semester it touches the high marks of arly Western civilization—Greek, oman and Renaissance eras-as lepicted in the writings, architectures, art. and music of the periods. In the second semester, it loes the same for the modern

vorld. "We hope most of those who ake this course will be scientists. ust as we hope most of those in he science courses will be humanities students," added the Ida-

no president.




