Dignitaries To Lead Each Section Of Gigantic Homecoming Parade

The annual Homecoming parade, slated to be bigger than ever before, will begin at 10 Saturday morning and will proceed from downtown to the campus to the tune of several bands, and much student enthusiasm.

All entries have been arranged into five divisions, each to be led by a dignitary and each to contain the same types and approximately the same number of entries, according to Mac Black, chairman. Black also stated that aside from the bands which were necessarily distributed to provide adequate music for all, no preference has been shown in assigning an entry to any specific place in the parade.

Time Set
The time of formation for the parade is 9:30 a. m. and each entry must be in position at this time. Parade time for spectators is advertised at 10:00 a. m. On hand to announce the opening of the parade will be a flight of aircraft from Boise.

Each division has been assigned a specific area for forming, and each entry will have a space assigned in that area. Cards will mark the space assignments; guides will be stationed in each divisional area to assist the entrants in getting correctly placed.

Commander Visits Campus; Inspects Local ROTC Units

Idaho ROTC and local units of the Idaho national guard and organized reserve corps were inspected yesterday by Brig. Gen. Robert A. McClure, Vancouver Barracks, Wash., commander of the northern military district.

Accompanying him were Col. Charles F. Hudson, head of the university military department Lt. Colonel Levi Jordan, Boise acting assistant senior army instructor for Idaho ORC, and Capt. Simpson I. Billington, local ORC unit instructor.

The general drove to Lewiston later in the day for similar inspections.

Tour Area
Colonel Jordan and Captain Billington will visit units throughout the North Idaho ORC area this week, including the Kellogg area today, the Coeur d'Alene area Wednesday and the Sandpoint area Thursday, returning to Moscow that night. Colonel Jordan leaves by airplane Friday morning to return to Boise.

General McClure has held assignment as commanding general of the Sixth Army's northern military district since last July. During the second World War he served as assistant military attaché at London, England, and as military attaché for government in exile of Greece, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Holland, Belgium, Norway and Yugoslavia. He also served in the European and North African theaters and with the occupational government of Germany.

Fire Works Arranged
Events scheduled for the rally are yells, pep band numbers, skits, guests from WSC and fireworks. Alumni and friends on the campus who plan to attend the rally but not the serpentine should be in McLean field at 7:30 p.m.

Registration of alumni will be in at the Moscow hotel and the Ad club at noon Friday, officials said. There the guests will be registered, given a schedule of events with a special Homecoming issue of the Argonaut and rooms arranged.

Idaho Judging Team Ranks High In Portland Dairy Show

The Brown Swiss trophy came home for a second time as the University of Idaho's dairy cattle judging team placed first in Ayrshire and Guernsey breeds at the Pacific International exposition at Portland yesterday.

Dairy cattle judging according to ideals set by the breed associations was the job of the dairy cattle judging team. Correct placings are the basis for selecting the winners.

Tasks
Judging of bottled milk, butter, American cheese, and vanilla ice cream, is the task of the dairy products team. Judges select winning students on their ability to evaluate the different products by taste, smell, feel and appearance.

The Idaho team placed second in overall dairy cattle judging with high men on the team Lamont Smith, 2nd, and Keith Ellis, 5th, out of the 18 men judging.

Placings
In dairy products judging, Idaho placed 1st in butter 2nd in cheese 3rd in ice cream. They placed 2nd as a team with Myles Wirth as high man.

In the animal husbandry division, Idaho was judged 2nd in the sheep judging and 5th as a team.

Schools taking part in the exposition were Oregon State college, Washington State college, California Polytechnic institute, University of Montana, University of British Columbia, and Utah Agricultural College.

Two From Idaho Allowed To Try For Scholarships

Competition for the University of Oxford, England, Rhodes scholarships bringing 400 British pounds a year for scholars will be available in December. Two candidates from Idaho may compete with ten others selected from five states for the four scholarships.

The most important requirement for the scholarships is some definite quality of distinction in intellect, character, personality, or a combination of the three.

Qualifications Listed
Qualities which Rhodes specified in his will as forming the basis of selection are: literary and scholastic ability and attainments; qualities of manhood, truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy, kindness, unselfishness, and fellowship; exhibition of moral force of character and of instincts to lead and to take an interest in his schoolmates; physical vigor as shown by interest in outdoor sports or in other ways.

To be eligible, a candidate must also have completed at least his sophomore year by time of application, and be an unmarried male United States citizen between the ages of nineteen and twenty-five.

Alum At Oxford
H. Shull Arms, a 1935 graduate of Idaho; won a Rhodes scholarship and entered Oxford in 1936.

Interested students should see Professor Taylor for application blanks in the Administration Building, room 205, before October 20.

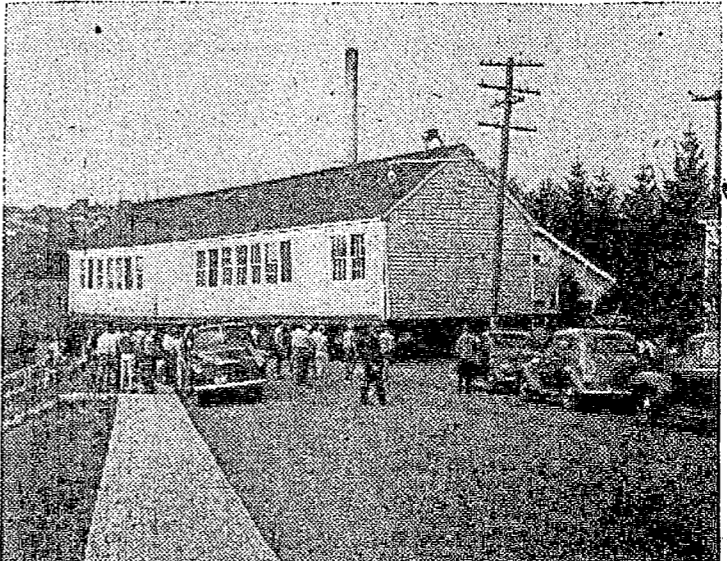
Mr. Peterson is a native of Boise, Idaho, and is a graduate of Boise high school.

Homecoming is essential to the building of a strong alumni association. A loyal body of alums is one of the greatest assets a university can possess and in that respect the University of Idaho can be justly proud of her alumni. They have contributed generously to the growth and progress of their alma mater.

Rent Controls Vs. Education

The housing problem, in Moscow, may take a turn for the worse in the near future, if the Moscow City Council should vote to remove rent controls.

To the single U. of I. student this would just mean that there will be no more rent controls in Moscow and in all probability rates will increase, with no effect on him.

To the married student, ex-GI or not, this will mean adding an additional expense to an already overburdened budget, that is just barely in the black now and would be plunged into the red.

By passing a motion to send rent controls "down the river," the city council could force many of our married students to withdraw from the university, and temporarily, if not permanently, interrupt those students' education.

With the availability of housing increasing, and the number of married students decreasing, such an act could be held off until next summer, without a great loss to anyone. The goodwill that was generated by the Moscow Chamber of Commerce recently, would be lost as fast as the City Council would pass such a motion.

Members of the City Council should remember that without the University of Idaho being located in Moscow, Moscow would not be any more than a small, thriving farming community. Why bite the hand that is feeding you? B.H.

Forestry Classes To Chase Deer From U. Tracts

"Last roundup" of any big game animals that happened to get caught inside the fencing on the 950-acre white tail deer Hatter creek research area on Moscow mountain will come sometime this month, reports Dr. Paul D. Dalke, leader of the Idaho cooperative wildlife research unit.

Basing his guess on the tracts he has observed inside the area, Walt West, Princeton farmer who helped put up five miles of sturdy fencing surrounding the area, figures there are three deer, a cow and calf, elk, and a bear to be chased out.

Human Chain Planned

Students in the wildlife management class at the university, lead by instructor, Kenneth E. Hungerford; members of the wildlife research unit personnel; and other forestry students will form a solid line for the drive. Starting on the eastern boundary the line will move west, herding deer, elk, and bear out two 30-foot gates.

"After the area has been cleaned out white tail fawns will be introduced," explained Dr. Dalke. "These probably will be trapped at Farragut. We hope to get three does and three bucks."

Surrounding the white tail deer research area is a 9-foot fence, 6 feet of woven wire, topped by four strands of barbed wire. "We figure it is both elk-proof and deer-proof," Dr. Dalke declares. The fence was constructed by the Idaho fish and game department.

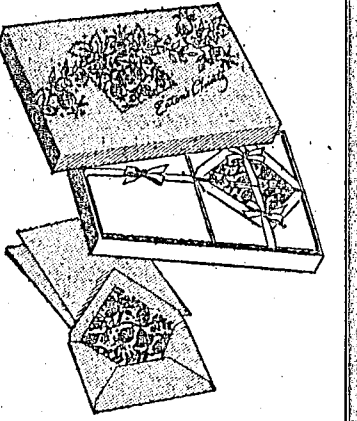
Please The Governor

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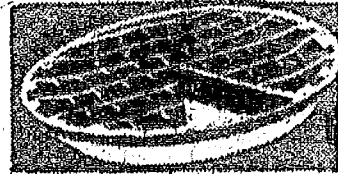
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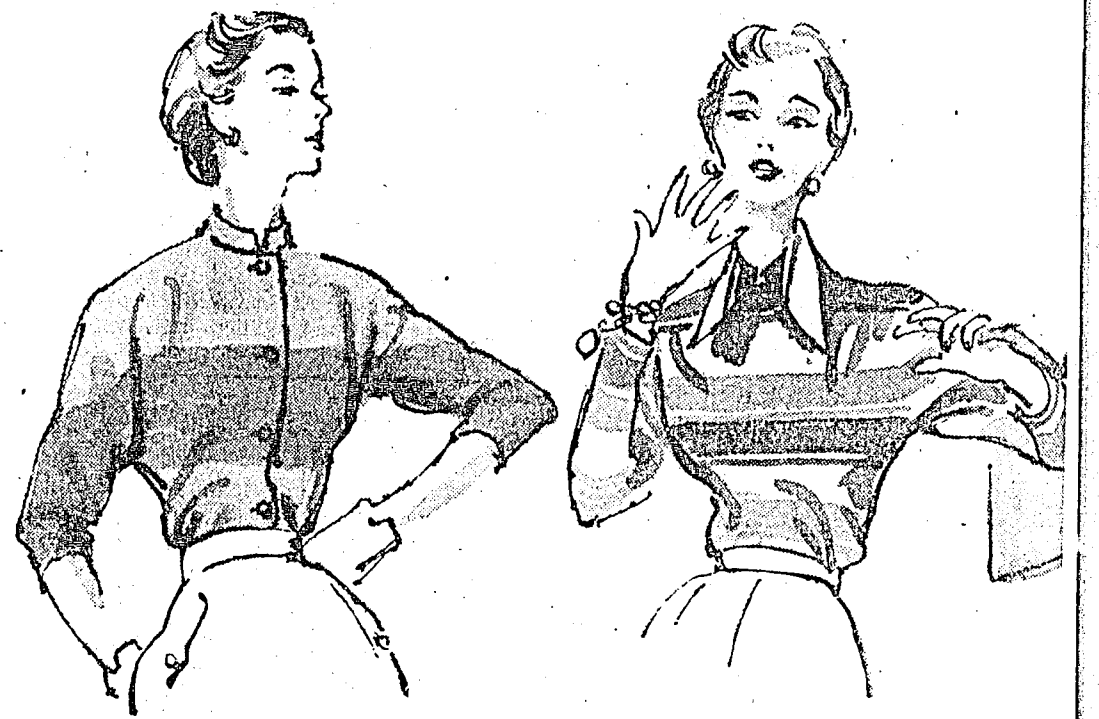

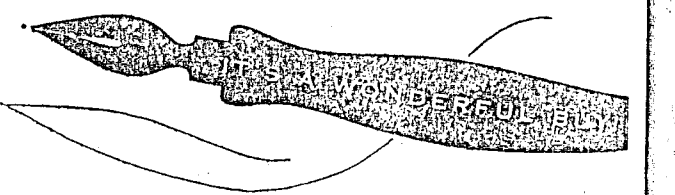

Veterans Should Apply For Money

World War II veterans should apply immediately for their special dividend on National Service Life Insurance policies to be paid early next year by the Veterans Administration, if they have not already done so, the VA has announced.

The VA reports that thousands of Pacific Northwest veterans applied for their G. I. insurance dividend during the first few days after application forms became available August 29. Since then, however, applications from veterans have fallen off considerably.

Increase Volume

In order to process dividend applications efficiently by business machine methods, it is necessary that applications be received in a large volume, the VA explained.

The VA stressed that veterans must apply if they wish to receive a G. I. insurance dividend check. Application forms are available at all postoffices and from the VA or any veterans' service organization.

Dividend applications received without the veteran's signature or his service serial number, are considered invalid and will not be honored unless replaced with properly signed blanks.

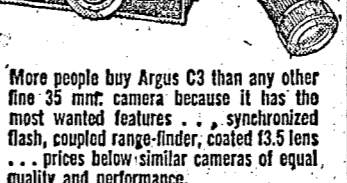

Frosh Look Good Friday But Husky Pups Triumph

The University of Washington Husky Pups got the jump on Idaho's Vandal Babes in the first half of Friday's game to give them a 20 to 7 victory in the Frosh opener. The Pups from Seattle marched to an early touchdown in the first period before the Babes could dig their heels in and they scored again in the middle of the second quarter. Their last tally came as the result of a blocked kick in the Idaho end zone. Idaho's lone score came in the last period when Fullback Bill Nelson went over from the one-yard line.

As the game started, end, Jerry Ogle, kicked to Washington on their own fifteen. With Mitchell passing and quarterback Early running, the Pups brought the ball to the Idaho fourteen. Two plays later Early went over. The try for point failed and the score remained 6 to 0.

Back, John O'Donnell, took Washington's kick on the Idaho 28 and ran it back for ten yards. The Babes then moved to the Pups' 39 yard line where Nelson's pass was intercepted by Dick Sprague of the Pups. The rest of the first period was played mostly in the center of the field with both teams showing good defensive ball.

Pups Make It Two
It was Idaho's ball at the beginning of the second quarter. The Babes moved the ball up to their own 38, where they kicked to Washington. The ball went dead on the Pups 22. The Pups moved the ball up to the Idaho 49 where Sprague kicked into the end zone. Becker punted after four downs to the Idaho 48. Washington then moved down to the Idaho 3 yard line mostly on Mitchell's passing. A delayed center smash by Nugent made the score 12 to 0. The kick was good and raised the score to 13 to 0.

The Babes then came close to scoring, but the end of the first half cut their rally short.

In the second half, Washington kicked to the Idaho 17. A fifteen yard holding penalty put the Babes back on their own doorstep. In an attempt to kick out, Pangello's kick was blocked and recovered by Washington in the end zone to make the score 20 to 0.

Idaho Takes Over
The rest of the half was all Idaho's. In the fourth quarter, Murphy and Petruzzi moved the ball down to the Pups' 16, after tackle McCarty recovered a Pup fumble just before the end of the third period. Zyzak then passed to Jerry Ogle, moved it up to the 16. Murphy then lost a yard but the next play gained it back. On the last down, Murphy failed to reach the goal and the Pups took over on their own 3 yard line.

Washington moved up to their own ten where they kicked. Becker took the kick and was dropped in his tracks on the 40. The Babes pushed the ball up to the 31 and then Zyzak passed to Ogle. The pass was incomplete but interference was ruled. With the ball on the seven yard line, Nelson powered over in two plays for the Idaho tally. Anderson's kick was good. A final burst of power by the Pups was intercepted by a fifteen yard penalty and the game ended, 20 to 7.

Tom picked up his first gridiron knowledge at Gooding high school, where he earned four varsity letters, being elected co-captain in his senior season.

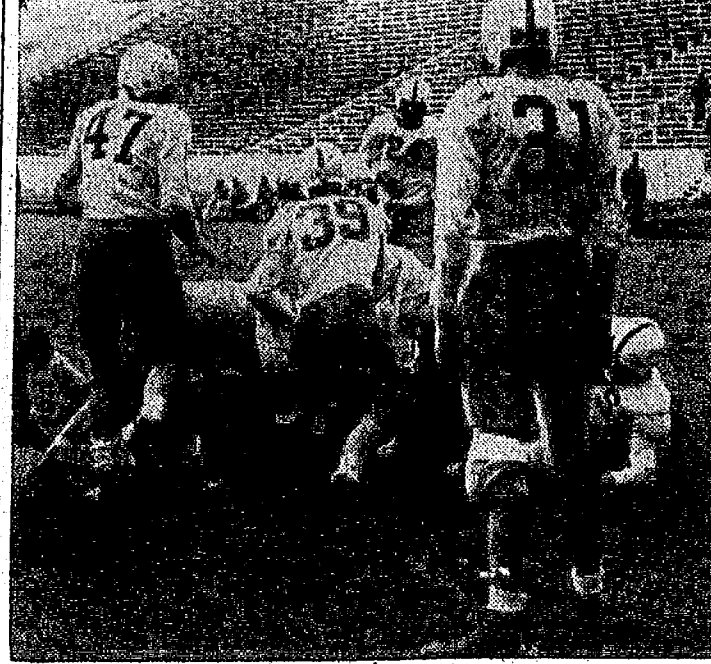

Names

Some Difference
Carl is as dark as Will is blonde. For big men and for tackles they both belie the idea of rough, tough gridiron stars. Both have good personalities and are well liked by the squad and other college mates.

Both Good
Both gained honorable mention on All-Coast grid selections last fall and both are slated for such honors again this fall, barring injuries. Their fathers were both born in the same town in Denmark but the lads never had met each other until they entered the university together as freshmen.

Other Similarities
Both attended high school at the same time. Both held almost identical positions in student council work, although Carl was in North Idaho and Will in South Idaho. Both were student body presidents the same year and both graduated the same year.
