150 Delegates Expected For Regional IRC Meet

The International Relations club of the University of Idaho will host Friday and Saturday, October 28 and 29, to the Northwest regional conference of International Relations clubs. Approximately 150 delegates representing clubs from thirty-seven colleges and universities in Oregon, Washington, Montana, western Canada and Idaho are expected.

Purpose of the conference is to stimulate and encourage interest in discussion of current international problems. The theme will be centered around the proposition: Uncle Sam, Shylock or Santa Claus? Also on the agenda will be roundtable discussions on such subjects as Indonesia, devaluation of currency, technological and economic assistance as brought out in President Truman's "point four" plan, military assistance, and multilateral trade.

Banquet speaker will be O. Meredith Wilson, Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at the University of Utah, with Dr. Boyd Martin of the University of Idaho giving the welcoming address. Registration of delegates will be from 7:00 p. m. to 9:30 a. m. Friday. Conference meetings will begin at 9:45 a. m. Friday, with the last meeting closing at noon Saturday. The banquet, open to all delegates and participating U. of I. students, will start at 6:30 Friday evening at the Ad club followed by a mixer at 9 o'clock in the women's gym on the campus. All conference meetings will be held in the Methodist and Presbyterian churches.

Committee heads in charge of arrangements are Prof. Robert E. All Idaho students who wish to attend can register during the designated hours. A tentative charge of three dollars will be made up on registration, which charge will include the banquet and dance.
