The GOLDEN FLEECE

Robert Tyson, Hunter college philosopher, may very well go down in history as a "guiding light" for university and college students the country over.

His ten commandments for classroom conduct, designed to win grades and influence professors, are expected to be a great aid to students fighting the battle of GPA.

United Party Captures Fourteen Class Offices

Nearly Two Thousand Cast Ballots In Annual Election

Approximately 1772 votes were cast in the ASUI class elections Wednesday which saw the United Party landslide 14 out of a possible 16 positions over the Independent Party which garnered two. Polls were placed at the first floor of the Administration building.

Total votes cast in the respective classes were freshmen, 495; sophomores, 477; juniors, 413; and seniors, 387.

Fake Snowstorm Used In Tests By Researchers

University snow gage researchers are using synthetic snowstorms to get a better idea of what type snow gage shields will allow the most reliable measurement at high altitude precipitation stations, where both the wind and the snow are real problems. The synthetic snowstorms are simulated by releasing sawdust in a wind tunnel.

Working with Warnick in this study are Dr. Mark Gurevitch of the physics department and Delbert Robinson of Weiser, senior student in mechanical engineering.

Six cooperators are concerned in this special project, Warnick reports, indicating the wide demand for high altitude gage shields that will reduce wind influence. In addition to the civil aeronautics station, the list includes the soil conservation service, the army corps of engineers, the U. S. weather bureau, the federal bureau of reclamation, and the U. S. forest service.

Five Debate Teams Leave For Wash.

Five Idaho debate teams departed for Whitman college at Walla Walla, Washington, to participate in a two day intercollegiate debate tournament. They will meet teams from eight other schools in the northwest in five rounds of debate.

Those making the trip are Richard and Robert Gibbs, James Astor and Tom Rigby, Roland Ogden and Kent Lake, Hugh Swenstrom and Leo Cespedes, and Dave Ulmer and Orval Hansen.

The debate question will be resolved: That the United States should nationalize all basic non-agricultural industries. Debates will be of the parliamentary discussion type with a twenty minute discussion period following seven minute constructive speeches by each of the participants.

Executive Board Removes Curbs On Social Functions

Restriction on the number of social functions which campus living groups can schedule during the year was lifted by the ASUI executive board at their weekly meeting last Tuesday.

Action on the measure was prompted by petitions from a majority of the campus houses. The signers of the petitions requested that the restrictions on number be lifted because of the limited space available for social functions this year.

The measure which the board recommended to the Calendar

committee stated, "The executive board reaffirms its policy on social restrictions except that the restriction on the number of social functions that living groups be allowed to schedule each year be removed. However no group shall be allowed to schedule more than three Saturday nights per school year for social functions."

The restrictions on social activities which are now in effect were passed last year's board upon recommendation of the Student Activities board. Last January the SAB stated that it was necessary that some restrictions be placed on campus social functions if all events were to be successful.

At Tuesday's meeting the board stressed the point that the remainder of the calendar policy put in force last spring remain as guiding principles for the Calendar committee. These measures include:

No more than six events are to be scheduled on any one night and not more than four on the night of an all-campus function.

There will be less discrimination between those with many and few activities while those active in campus affairs will still have their activities covered in the activities and organizations sections of the book.

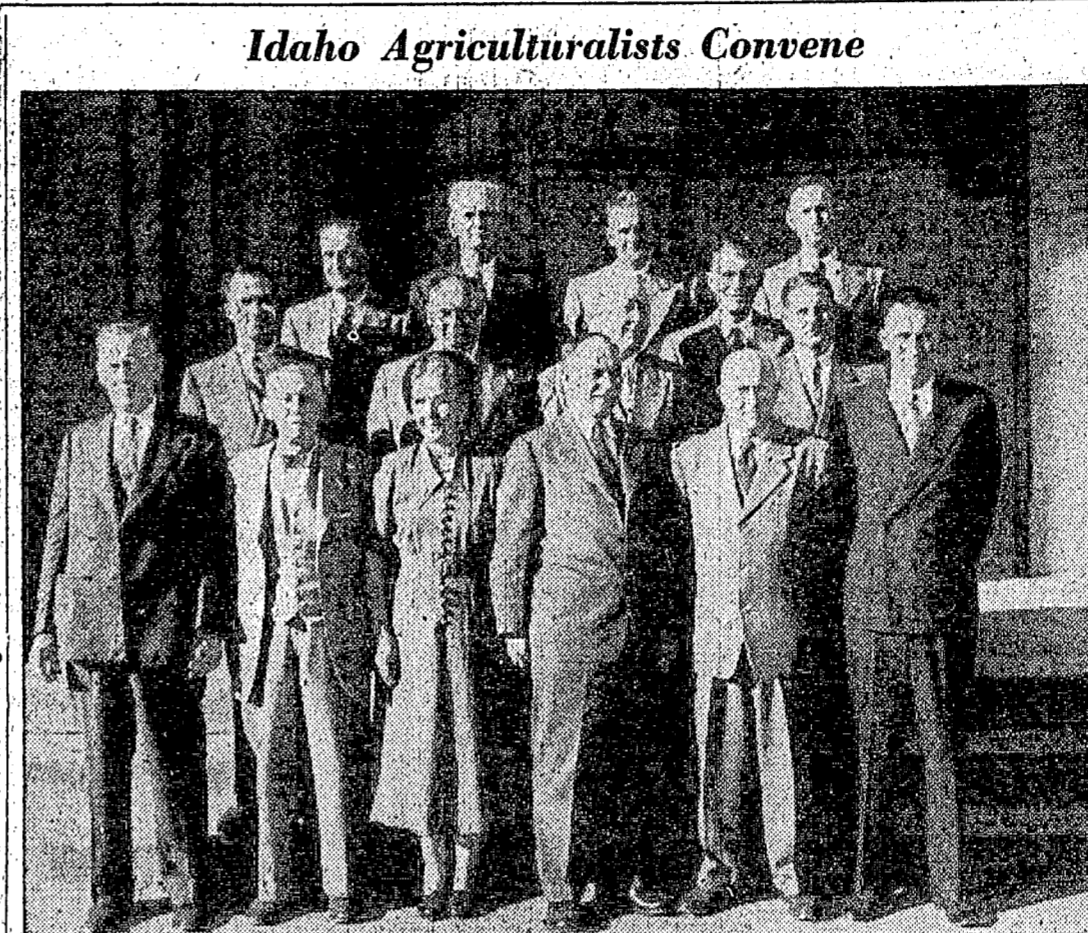

Beattie Announces Nov. 30 Deadline For Fulbright Test

Arthur H. Beattie, Fulbright Program advisor for the University of Idaho, urges prospective candidates for scholarships for study abroad in 1950-51 to obtain application forms and to assemble documents necessary to support their candidacy.

All papers, including transcripts and recommendations, must be submitted to Beattie, language professors in Ad. 327 no later than November 30th. Since there could be delays involved in securing photos, transcripts or recommendations, it is important that candidates take immediately the first steps toward preparing their application.

About a dozen seniors and graduate students in this university have now obtained blanks. Since hundreds of scholarships will be available next year to American graduate students (220 in France, for example, and 153 in Great Britain) it is to be hoped that a large number of candidates from Idaho will enter the competitions. It is especially desirable that more applications be made by students in technical fields.

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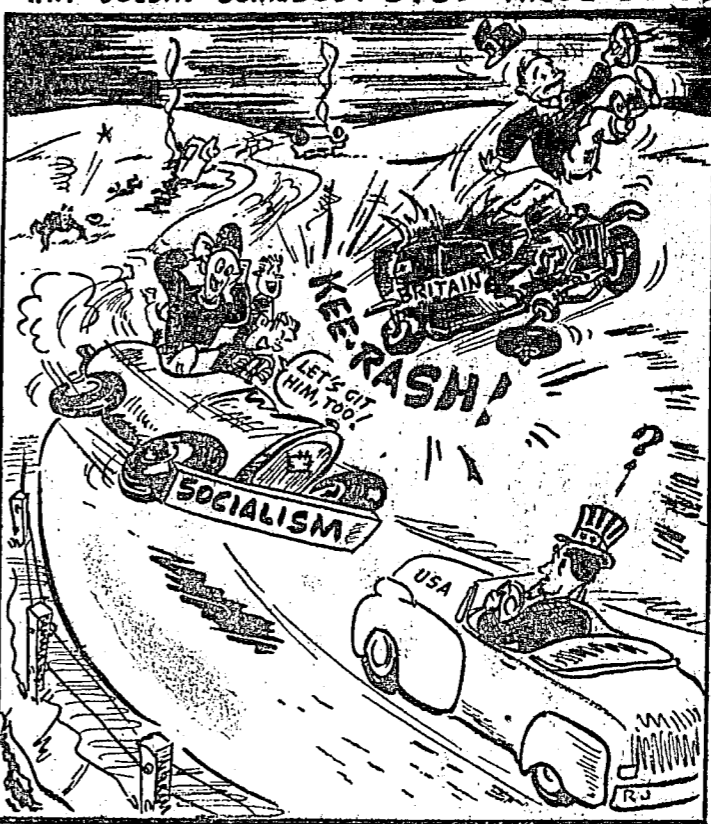
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Fraternities

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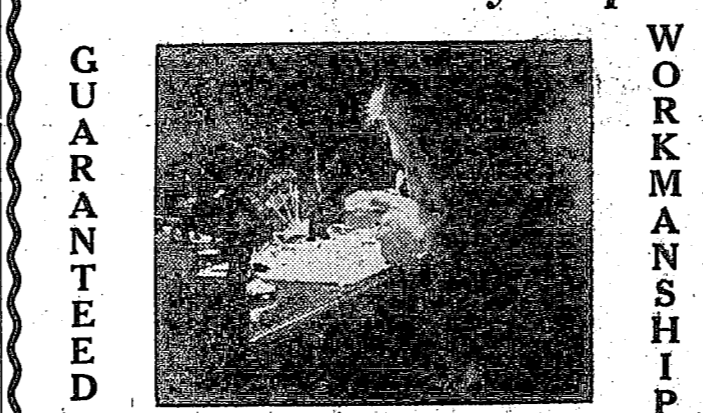
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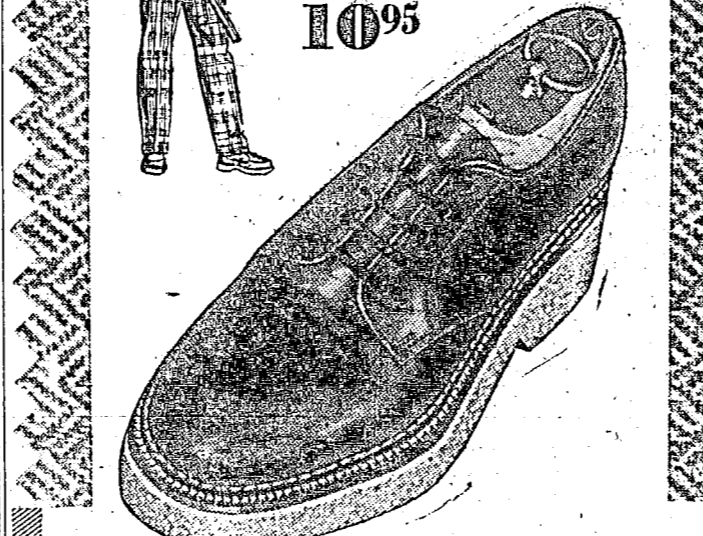


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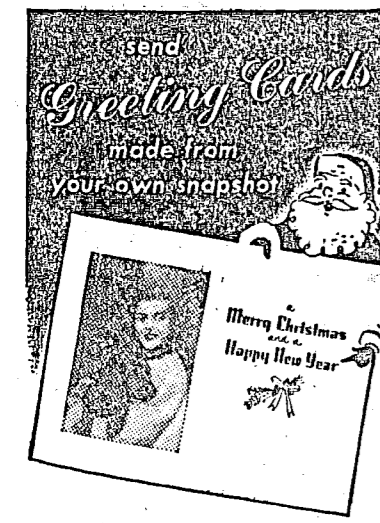

Idaho Completes Season Against High Flying Indians

Ten Vandal Seniors To Close College Grid Careers Saturday

Dixie Howell has never lost to Stanford University. For Howell tomorrow's game will be a third meeting with the Indians—once as a player, twice as a coach. Dixie was an All-America halfback on the 1935 Alabama eleven that trounced Stanford 29-13 in the Rose Bowl. Two years ago, during his first year at Idaho, he witnessed a 19-16 victory over the Indians.

Ten Vandal football players will, for the last time, wear the traditional silver and gold. They are: Carl Killsgaard, and Will Overgaard, tackles; Tom Trees, guard; Tom Ambrose, center; Ted Diehl and Jim Hammond, quarterbacks; Jerry Diehl and Jim Hatch, halfbacks; George Ballew and Orville Barnes, ends.

Should Stanford University get by the University of Idaho tomorrow afternoon and undefeated California a week later, Coach Marché Schwartz may see his Indians in the Rose Bowl New Year's day. Stanford's 1949 record now stands at five wins, two losses and one tie. Only one of the two reversals was administered in conference competition, that being to UCLA earlier in the season. Before the UCLA encounter, the Indians were dropped by mighty Michigan 27-7 and were tied later in the season by Santa Clara 7-7.

In conference play Stanford has knocked off Washington 40-0, Oregon State 27-7 and, last but not least, a favored Southern California eleven 34-13. The Indians in their other two tilts defeated San Jose State 49-0 and Harvard 44-0.

Sophomores Star
Stanford's 1949 squad is built around sophomore sensations Gary Kerkorian, Dick Horn, Harry Hugasian, and William McColl. All except McColl are backs. Of the four, three have been starters in all of Stanford's games thus far. The Indians had the best freshman squad on the coast last year. Schwartz will lose four men from his starting squad, but has many reserves to count on for the 1950 season.

As a team Stanford ranks seventh in the nation in defense, while Idaho ranks 12th in scoring. To date the Indians have allowed her opponents 68 in eight games for an average of 8.5 points per game. The Vandals, in seven games, have scored 220 points for an average of 31.4 points.

Women Schedule Rifle Matches

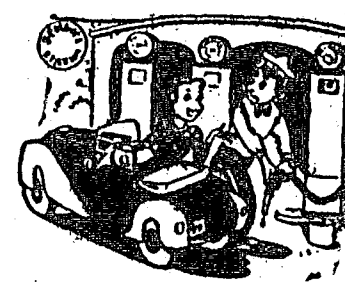

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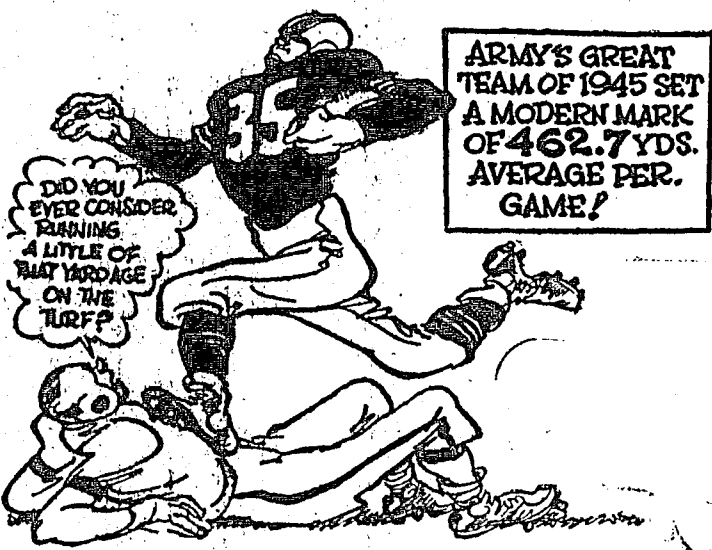
