The University of Idaho's decision to drop two California schools from its 1950 grid schedule has brought considerable comment from sportswriters in the northwest.

Most recent of these editorial comments was found in yesterday's Portland Oregonian, written by L. H. Gregory, dean of Pacific Coast sports writers.

"California games have been cancelled even though Idaho retains membership in the coast conference. The explanation is that Idaho desires to play more games with neighboring schools, mainly Utah. We hardly think we have all the story."

The Statesman writer tells of the efforts of the Vandal Boosters to "aid the Vandals become a juggernaut which might whip the hell out of Notre Dame."

Jason feels that he has presented enough of the Boise paper's attack to illustrate something which he pointed out some time ago.

Jason agrees with the new policy. A few seasons of wins over schools its own caliber will improve Idaho's athletics both in spirit and gate receipts more than seasons of valiant losses against larger schools.

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Campus Coasting Deemed Dangerous Ban Put In Effect

At the suggestion of the ASUI executive board, the city police force will begin immediately to put teeth into an ordinance which prohibits coasting or skiing on city thoroughfares.

The board, recognizing the recreational opportunities afforded by Moscow winters, set up areas where students could coast and ski without traffic hazards.

Graduate Record Examinations will be required of candidates for admission to certain graduate schools.

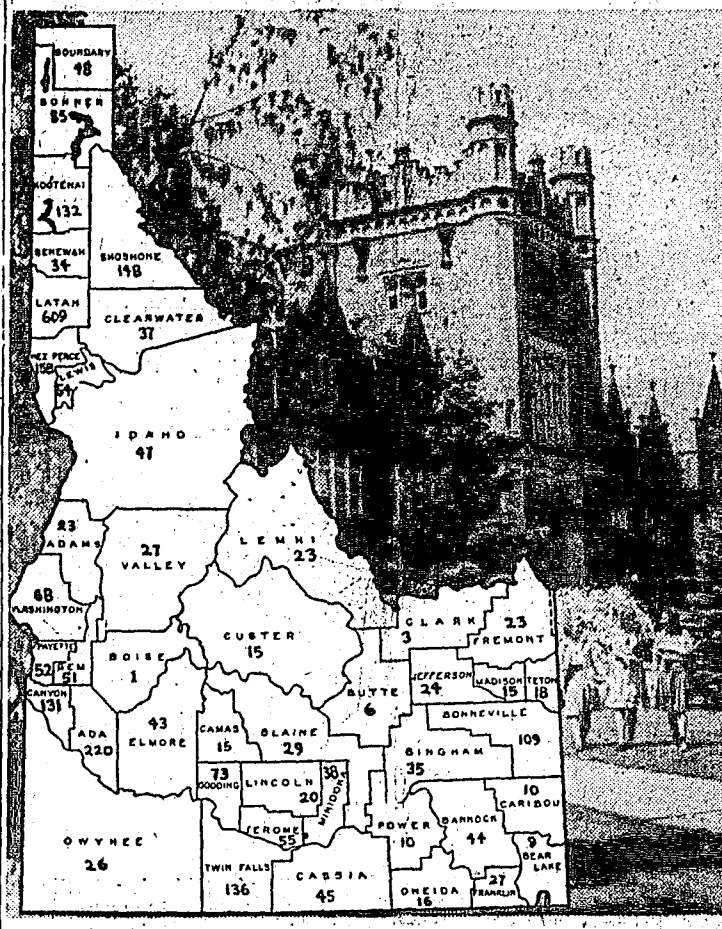
Charles Decker, Chief Counselor, Student Services, has announced that the exams will be given at the student counseling center.

Armstrong has been one of the top athletes in Idaho sports history. To date he has set school marks in the 100, 220, and 440-yard dashes.

Chinese Student Interviewed On KUOI

Juan Shi Yin, a Chinese graduate student in the School of Education, was interviewed Monday evening over KUOI on "Who's Who on the Idaho Campus."

Shi was born and reared in the small village of Barley City in Southern China.

He recalled days of hardship among the Chinese peasants, growing steadily poorer under capitalistic taxation and a bare subsistence level of living.

Yin believes the New Chinese Republic and the new government are favored by the majority of the people.

Idaho Band Plays "Mood Pastorale" At First Concert

The composition "Mood Pastorale" by Hall M. Macklin, head of the Music Department, will be featured by the University Band in their first formal concert of the school year.

The composition was originally conceived as a solo for cello with orchestral accompaniment. The main themes were written while Macklin was studying in Paris in 1930.

When finished, the composer felt that the number would be more effective as an orchestral tonepoem and the whole composition was re-written.

It was completed in 1934 and had private readings by Paul Whiteman's Concert orchestra and the University of Illinois Symphony orchestra.

In May, 1936, Carl Claus conducted the University of Idaho Symphony Orchestra in the first public performance.

Russell Howland, now of the music faculty of Fresno State College, California, transcribed "Mood Pastorale" for symphonic band and it was later published in 1941.

It appeared on the Selective Contest List for Class A High School Bands for 1941-42 after it had been performed before the American Bandmasters association.

Macklin, who came to the university as a music instructor in 1935, became head of the department in 1947.

He obtained his Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Illinois, his Masters of Music degree from Idaho and has studied privately in Paris.

A talented organist, Macklin has many published works for organ as well as compositions for band and orchestra and has written musical comedies which have been performed on the university campus.

IK's And Ski Club Set February 11 For Snow Carnival

Originality, workmanship, and beauty will be the basis of the judges' opinion in the snow sculpturing contest held in conjunction with the Winter Carnival.

Professors of the art department will judge the entries of each living group at 10:30 a. m. that day.

Points won in the snow sculpturing may be augmented by competing in a giant slalom race Saturday afternoon.

A scoring system has been worked out which will allow women to compete on an equal basis with the men.

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Each living group may enter 8 skiers to compete for points, but may enter any number above this to compete for the four individual prizes.

The giant slalom race will be laid out in such a way that any intermediate skier can compete and a special course will be laid out for women, tailored to fit the intermediate skier.

As an added attraction, members of the Idaho Ski team will give exhibitions in slalom running and jumping.

Snowfall Behind Last Year's; Temperatures Nearer Normal

Seems like a tough winter so far, doesn't it? Yet according to figures from Dr. K. H. Klages, the snowfall this year is about 20 inches behind last year's.

Recorded snowfall for this year, including yesterday's storm, is 39.8 inches. No snow fell in the month of November.

With 20.7 inches for December and 19.1 for the first 12 days of January, the total snowfall will not equal that of last winter.

During the 1948-49 winter that total snow accumulated measured 102.75 inches, almost double the longtime average of 54.0 inches for the Moscow area.

Normal Average! November showed 12.25 inches of snow last year, putting that season ahead of this at the beginning.

In December 35.05 inches fell, and only the month of January approached the normal monthly average with 16.95 inches.

This light snowfall during the month usually thought of to be worse was due to the cold spell. On Dr. Klages' temperature chart the red line for that month ran off the chart.

February of last year yielded 38.5 inches of snow. With 19 days of January and all of February and March left, Dr. Klages states that this year's snowfall will probably be above average.

With constant thawing weather, the snow is disappearing rapidly, while last year very little snow was lost in January through melting temperatures.

## Library Display On Snow Shoe Rabbits

Visual education and reference collection are among the purposes of the exhibitions of manuals in the first floor library exhibit case. Professor Earl J. Larrison and some of his students prepared the display as well as the specimens.

The snowshoe rabbit series, part of a much larger group, were collected near Moscow this fall in a study of pelage change and populations of this species. The squirrels are representatives of the many kinds of species of the squirrel family that live in the state. The coyote is an animal that is of considerable economic importance throughout Idaho.

The raccoon, recently shot near Moscow, is quite scarce in northern Idaho, but seems to be increasing lately. A carnivore common in the Moscow mountain area and surroundings is the bobcat, a two-thirds-grown cat which is exhibited. Weasels of several varieties are present in the state. The largest is here shown.

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
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
