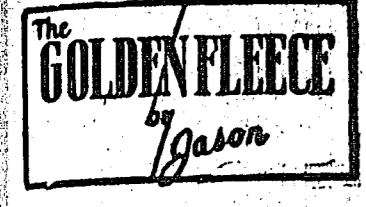

## Idaho Captures Team Victory In Spokane Tournament

### Stuart Chase Speaks Today On "Full Employment" In U.S.

If you took English composition and read "Luxury of Integrity," you are already familiar with Stuart Chase, noted author and commentator on economics and social problems, who will speak in Memorial gymnasium this morning at 11 a.m.



After the first Idaho-Washington State boxing match of the season in Pullman January 27 some newspapers carried accounts of a promising fighter who was, they inferred, of championship calibre.

It was said that he gave Idaho's great champion Herb Carlson his roughest fight this year—by some, that he even came close to winning.

The fighter they were talking about was Chuck Morgan, the Cougar's 165-pound sophomore.

But on two occasions now—the second Idaho-WSC match February 11, and the Spokane Invitational last night—Morgan has been withdrawn from a scheduled fight with Carlson.

A sustained publicity drive singing Morgan's praises has preceded each withdrawal. Each time "doctor's orders" were cited as the cause. Perhaps this is true. Perhaps Morgan could not appear because of valid reasons. However, no evidence releases from Cougar quarters gave any indication that Morgan was not in top shape. Indeed, they even more than implied that he had every possibility of beating Carlson.

Considering all this we can't help but wonder just what they are saving Morgan for—the Junior Prom?

So far this season Carlson has had only four chances out of a possible seven to show his wares. He opened the season against Shannon Hiatt, Eastern Washington, with a second round TKO. Then Gonzaga entered Joe Stephens against Herb and Stephens suffered an eye injury in the first round and the bout was declared "no contest."

He then decided Morgan at Pullman, drew a bye from Morgan in the next fight, decided John Murphy at Wisconsin, and drew a bye last week against Gonzaga and last night against Morgan in the Spokane tournament.

"No One To Fight With" All in all, Carlson has had little opposition against which to sharpen up for the coming Pacific Coast and National intercollegiate boxing tournaments.

In a way, no one can be blamed for not wanting to "lead a lamb to the slaughter." But in situations like this why do the papers continually harp on the fact that "forfeits decided the margin?"

In every card this season the Vandals have entered eight men. The bouts forfeited to them were in every case a weight division in which Idaho had men who have demonstrated their winning abilities against all opponents this season.

Is it our fault if we have men so competent that another coach feels it unwise—and rightly so—to send one of his men in the ring against them?

It was the other team that did the forfeiting. Should it be us, who had nothing to do about it, be blamed?

Wow "Pein was the victim of the biggest robbery since those seven masked men visited Brinks, Inc." Bob Johnson said in the Spokane Chronicle yesterday afternoon. He was speaking of the Herman Pein, (EWCE) and Don Ellis, (Idaho) fight which Ellis won.

It is heartening to hear of one man with the confidence to feel that he can judge fights better than qualified judges and the hundreds of fans who saw the match.

#### University Serves 5,188 Students During The Year

The University of Idaho is serving 5,188 students for the current year, 1949-50, Registrar D. D. DuSault reported recently. "This is just 16 students short of the all-time record set in 1948-1949, and late registrations may still establish a new record for the university."

At present a total of 3,787 resident students are enrolled for the current academic year. President J. E. Buchanan, in preparing budget estimates for the state legislative session just completed, estimated that the yearly enrollment figure would be 3,750, but this figure has already been exceeded by 37.

In addition, there are 907 students who have enrolled in non-resident instruction, 394 in extension courses, 847 in summer school and 5 in absentia. Subtracting 782 duplicate names, the total is 5,188 enrolled students. This figure does not include such activities as the FBI police schools, for which the university maintains records and provides instructors.

Through its extension division, the university serves about 10,000 4-H club boys and girls throughout the state. The 4-H clubs operate through county agents' offices with the aid of volunteer leaders. This brings the total of students served during the year by the university to more than 15,000.

#### Veterans Dividends One-Third Complete

The Veterans Administration reports that payment of the special \$2,800,000,000 National Service Life Insurance dividends is more than one-third complete. A total of 5,003,950 checks, amounting to \$899,769,708, were mailed to veteran policy holders in the first twenty-two working days since the GI insurance dividend payment started January 16. The VA expects to get out the bulk of all payments by June 30, 1950.

The checks are now being distributed at the rate of a million per week and it is asked that all veterans be patient. All dividends will be mailed as quickly as possible.

#### 1950 Miss Co-ed To Be Feted At Fashion Show March 22

Moscow's Miss Co-ed of 1950 will be crowned at the "Tik-Toks of Fashion" style show in the Moscow high school auditorium March 22.

Finalists for the title have been chosen from each campus women's living group, and the winner will be selected by a committee of one university professor, one businessman and one professional man.

#### Upsets Champion

Don (Fug) Ellis, Idaho heavyweight scrapper, upset Eastern Washington's Pacific coast conference heavyweight champion Herman Pein Wednesday night in the Spokane invitational tournament at Spokane.

Don lost a decision to WSC's Hubert Christianson last night in the finals.

SPOKANE ARMOY, SPOKANE, WASH., Mar. 2—The Idaho Vandal boxers punched their way to the first team title of the Spokane collegiate invitational boxing tournament here tonight. Vandal scrappers took three championships and placed men in all of the final bouts, freshman and varsity. Champions for the Idaho team were Frank Echevarria, Len Walker, and Herb Carlson.

#### All-Campus Mixer To Be Held Tonight In Women's Gym

"After Game Shuffle," an all-campus mixer sponsored jointly by the Intercollegiate Knights and Spurs, will be held in the Women's gym directly after the Idaho-Washington State basketball game tonight.

Jim Geddes and Beth Lillard, chairmen for the event, have announced that the only requirements for students, male and female alike, to have to be admitted, is that they possess 25c.

Committees in charge of plans designated sport dress as the official attire for the evening. Decorations will consist of a colorful display of wooded vegetation placed conveniently around the gym.

Predominantly the dance is for the primary purpose of providing students an opportunity to meet new acquaintances and to unify the "spirit of participation" on the Idaho campus. "If fellows and coeds alike would only participate more in endeavors of this sort, small cliques and groups would give way to larger all-student activities, and perhaps school spirit would be heightened," stated Geddes.

Music will be furnished through the facilities of radio KUOL. Receipts from the dance will go towards a fund to create projects on the campus which will benefit students directly.

Full information and program application blanks are available through the NSA committee of student government on this campus. Further information on study programs is available through the International Office, NSA, 91 Winthrop St., Cambridge, Mass.

#### Information Booklet

Students interested in projects for study and travel abroad sponsored by all other organizations and commercial agencies may obtain a limited number of NSA's best-seller, "Work Study Travel Abroad 1950," for 25c a booklet.

Nations included in the NSA programs are: England, France, The Netherlands, Switzerland, Austria, Scotland, Ireland, Germany and Czechoslovakia.

Other member nations are Yugoslavia, Italy, Belgium, Israel, Turkey, India, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Finland and Poland. The programs are of four types: study tours, seminar programs, workcamp tours and work-camps.

#### Air And Ship

Transportation will be by air and the S. S. Volendam, which will sail from Quebec, June 26, arriving in Rotterdam July 6. It will leave Rotterdam Sept. 5 and arrive in New York Sept. 14.

Programs are open to all bona fide students of American colleges and universities. Full arrangements have been made for married couples.

Team points gave Idaho 27, Gonzaga 21, Washington State 16, and Eastern Washington 0.

Jim Reilly, Gonzaga 130 pounder, eked out a close decision over DeForrest Tovey, Idaho in a decision widely disputed by the crowd.

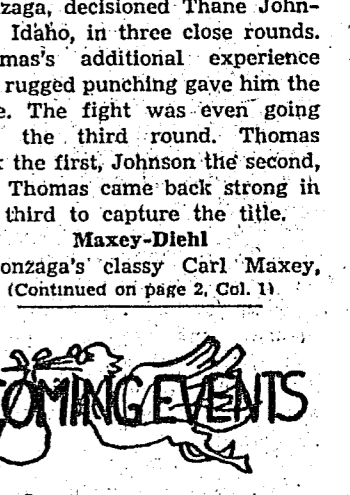
crowd. Reilly has split with Norm Walker, Idaho, in previous bouts this year at 135 pounds but dropped 5 pounds for this tournament.

Thomas took the first, Johnson the second, and Thomas came back strong in the third to capture the title.

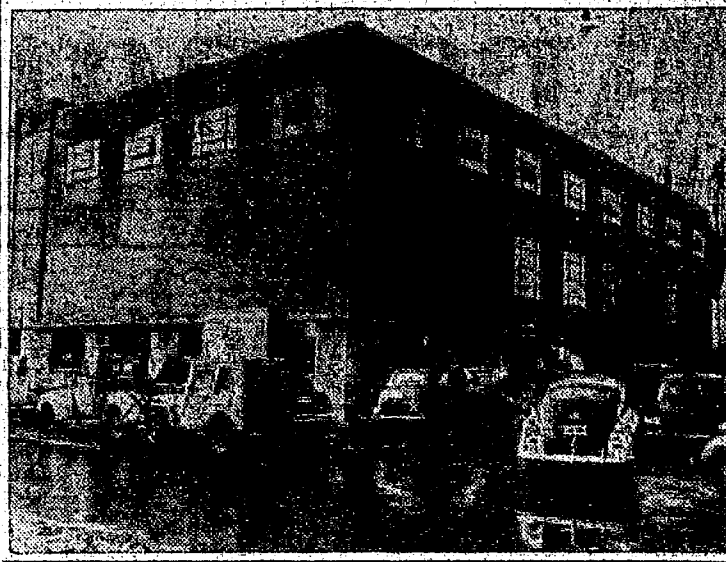

## Student Union Provides Enlarged Ballroom Space

If it's dancing you want, the new student union building will be the place to go. Not the least bit old fashioned in their attitude toward the favorite student pastime, the planners of the student union addition have provided every opportunity for dancing.

More than doubled in size, the main ballroom will be extended in almost every direction from its present location. It is expected that the ballroom will be able to handle all the big affairs previously held in the gymnasium. An orchestra shell, located in the middle of the west wall will have public address lines extending in three directions. Near the orchestra shell will be a room for storage of orchestra and sound equipment.

### Banquet Rooms

On the east side of the ballroom, near the entrance, is a cloak room, considerably expanded and improved over the old one.

Through a system of folding doors, the large ballroom can be divided into three separate areas to permit as many as three dances at the same time. The ballroom, or any part of it, can be used for large banquets as the need arises.

How about afternoon dancing, week night and Sunday dancing? This, too, has been provided for. The northwest corner of the large ballroom is being reserved for this purpose, and will be equipped with a juke box and seating along the walls. It is expected, too, that refreshments will be available.

### New Lounge

In the northeast corner of the ballroom near the entrance of the small auditorium, recently named Borah hall, is a raised area designed to serve jointly as a theatre lobby, and as a lounge where dancers may relax. One side of this raised area will be glassed in and the other side left open.

It comprises a chapter from "Coordinating Casting Design with Production," a paper submitted by Professor Hindle to Purdue University in partial fulfillment of requirement for the degree of Metallurgical Engineer.

## Vandaleers Name No Longer A Mystery

Origination of the name Vandaleers for Idaho's famed choral group, a mystery for 20 years, has finally been uncovered. A letter from Paul L. Rice, dean of Alma college, Michigan, recently received by Hall Macklin, explains how it all came about.

According to Rice, one of the first Vandaleers, many names were suggested and discarded after the group was organized in 1929. Everyone wanted Vandal with some unique variation so the singing group could be closely associated with Idaho's athletic teams.

"I was just in that stage of full wakefulness and sleep one night," wrote Rice, "when it came—the name Vandaleers." At present the group has increased to 60 members from the beginning 18. Each year the Vandaleers tour the state, and are becoming more renowned.

## University Herd Sets High Record

Production averages for the University Holstein herd were released today by Professor D. L. Fourn, held of the department of Dairy Husbandry. These averages are for the last ten years and cover a time when shifting labor and feed conditions caused many herds throughout the country to fall off in average production.

For the period 1940 to 1945 the average production on 24 registered holsteins was 14,325 pounds of milk and 492.8 pounds of butterfat while milking three times a day. From 1945 through 1949 the herd average was 14,273 pounds of milk and 496.7 pounds of fat on two time a day milking. The ten year average for the herd is 14,298 pounds of milk and 493.5 pounds of fat.

## Rate Your Teachers

The ASUI Executive Board has come up with a revised teacher rating questionnaire which will be a great improvement over the one used in the past.

This new questionnaire was written up by a committee headed by Ken Briggs. Using examples of Teacher-rating plans presently utilized by the University of Washington, Reed college and those advocated by the National Student association, the old form was greatly expanded and improved.

The main improvements noted are:  
 (1) More specific questions  
 (2) Wider choice of answers  
 (3) Answers can be more complete by specifying just what the instructor's faults are in the opinion of the student.

The committee which has been revising the old Teacher-rating plan questionnaire has been at work on this project since last fall. The need for a more definite and more complete question and answer arrangement was brought out in the student opinion poll held last spring.

In requesting a change from the present plan to the administration, the Executive Board will ask for immediate adoption of the new form for use as soon as possible. The plan will still be kept on a voluntary basis for the faculty.

Through the Executive Board, this is one way in which the students can contribute to an expanding program that is being carried on by the University administration. With complete objectivity in mind, dropping personal prejudices and keeping a mature outlook on this plan, the students can aid themselves as much as they can aid the instructors.

## An Honor System For Idaho

How can we check the problem of classroom cheating? Here are two suggestions.

First, we can use grade school tactics and provide enough monitors to look over the student's shoulder during an examination and thereby force him to be honest. This is not the most satisfactory method, however. Besides being impractical, it is a reflection on the integrity of the student and the reputation of the institution. Let's look elsewhere for the answer.

How about the honor system? After you have had a good laugh let's consider it more seriously. Can it be made to work at Idaho? It has been made to work in other schools. Are Idaho students less honorable than students in other schools?

The honor system will not, however, be made to work effectively overnight at Idaho or any other school. It will take years before it can become deeply enough entrenched to be really effective, and from start to finish its success or failure depends on the attitude of the students. On thing for certain, it will never succeed if it is not started and given a fair trial.

To start the honor system at least 10 to 15 percent of the students must believe in it and make a sincere effort to make it effective. From then on it is a matter of developing in the students a sense of pride until honesty in examinations becomes automatic, and the student who violates the code of honor is condemned for his dishonesty rather than praised for his skill in cheating.

Students studying under such conditions will be better prepared for citizenship and their college work will be more meaningful.

The honor system can be made to work at Idaho.

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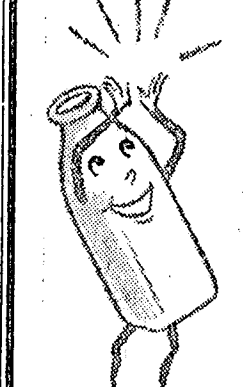

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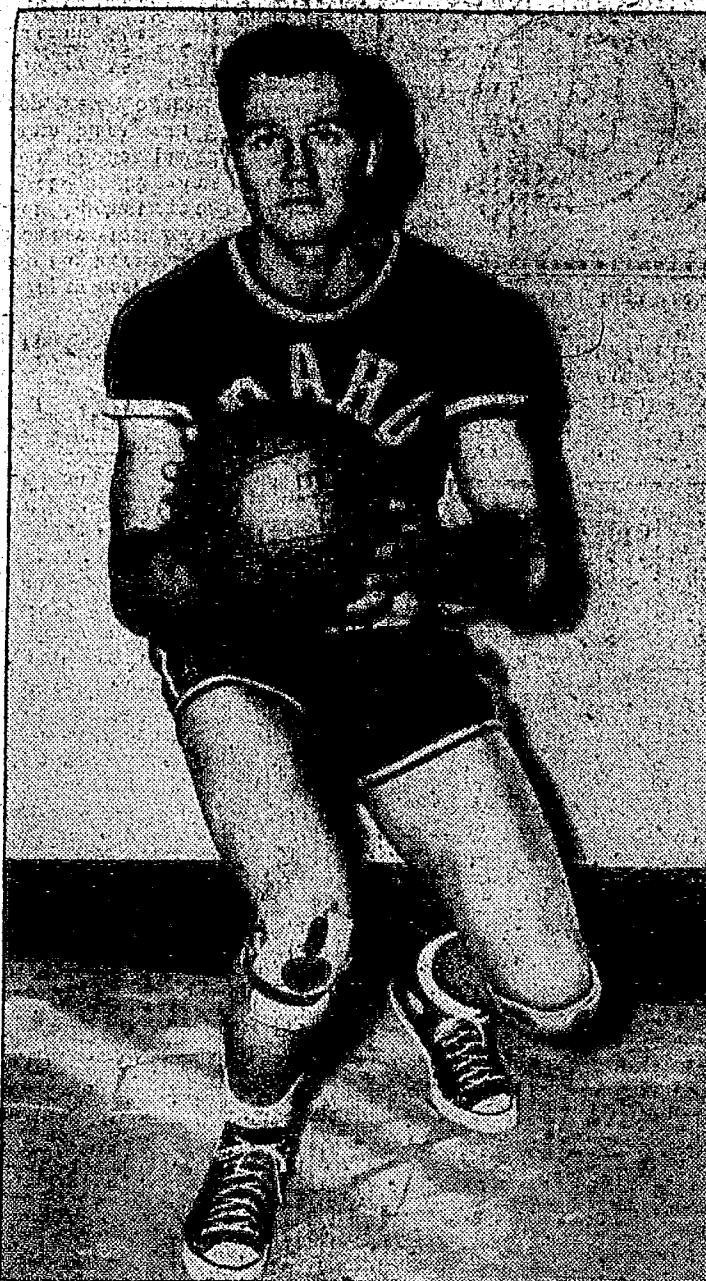

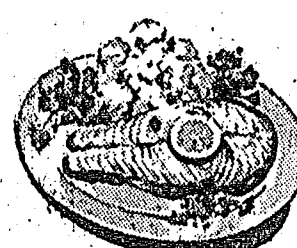
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Vandal Portraits
