

How about the honor system? After you have had a good laugh let's consider it more seriously. Can it be made to work at Idaho? It has been made to work in other schools. Are Idaho students less honorable than students in other schools?

The honor system will not, however, be made to work effectively overnight at Idaho or any other school. It will take years before it can become deeply enough entrenched to be really effective, and from start to finish its success or failure depends on the attitude of the students. On thing for is now being devised by a student certain, it will never succeed if it is not started and given a fair trial.

To start the honor system at least 10 to 15 percent of the students must believe in it and make a sincere effort to make it effective. From then on it is a matter of developing in the students a sense of pride until honesty in examinations becomes automatic, and the student who violates the code of honor is condemned for his dis-






