Kirtley Addition Will Be Finished Within Two Weeks A construction dream started last spring will reach its first anti-climax the end of this month when the addition to Kirtley Engineering laboratory at its final stage will grace the Idaho campus.

Completion is expected for the first of the "big five" within another two weeks, which will include actual housing of the electrical engineering lab. It was originally estimated that the addition would be completed February 1.

In addition to the new engineering laboratory, a music building, an engineering classroom building, and a huge agricultural science structure comprise the construction plans at the university.

Bids for construction of a new electrical switching station were opened late Thursday afternoon. This is another phase of the university building program.

Work is now resuming on the Engineering classroom building started in late fall by H. Halverson, Inc., of Spokane.

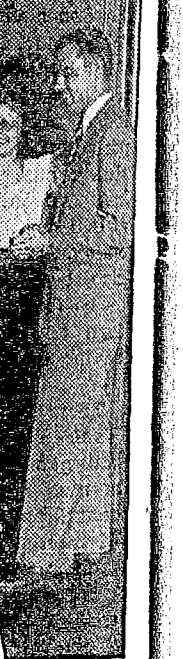
