

Cool, Coal, And Criminal

(Ed. Note: The coal strike just ended seriously affected many schools and colleges in this area, nearly forcing some of them to close. It is usually not the policy of the Argonaut to deal with national issues but in view of the jeopardy in which such a strike places the public, and our own university, we print the following article to help you, as a student, better understand the situation.)

People across the United States are still puzzled by the statement by Albert Einstein, one ed for men. decision handed down by a federal judge in Washington, of the foremost World Federal-D. C., when he dismissed contempt of court charges against ists: the United Mine workers.

After government attorneys, under provisions of the controversial Taft-Hartley Law, obtained an 80-day no-strike injunction against the UMW and directed John L. Lewis to get the men back to work, the miners refused to return to the pits. This, mine union lawyers declared, was a revolt of miners against union and that union officials could not this development lies in its apbe held responsible.

John L. had sent a telegram to all UMW locals ordering the men back to work. This, ruled the federal court, was sufficient to show that union officials had tried to obey the In the end, there beckons more injunction but were powerless to enforce the court order, and, therefore, were not guilty of contempt of court.

Everyone, including the miners, knew that Lewis was forced to issue the order for the men to return to the pits. He didn't do it on his own, therefore, they weren't any more eager to return to the pits than Lewis was.

You can see by this action that if a strike is called, a union leader can tell all of the union's members to go back to work, and if they don't, the officials cannot be held for contempt a group, we'd like to have you. of court. This makes a powerful labor leader even more powerful, while the government stands by, powerless to do anything except take over the industry affected. It solves nothing as far as the labor-management dispute is concerned.







This may be a remote thought but is it not true? During the latter part of the past coal strike, the U. S. reached a point of national emergency. Railroads had to curtail operations, steel mills cut back production as did many other "blood" producing industries which give our country its economic power.

Would it not be justifiable to apply to labor the same treatment under provisions of the anti-trust acts and other acts which deal with restraint of trade, so that labor leaders would have to deal with management for their individual cases instead of on an industry-wide basis?

When one union can throttle the country economically and get away with it, that is getting too powerful for the welfare of this nation.

Any politician who advocated such a program would be writing himself a one-way ticket to labor's "death row," along with Senator Taft, Congressman Hartley, and all others who voted for the controversial T-H Labor Law.

The fact is very clear to everyone except labor leaders who would lose much of their dictatorial powers, and staunch pro-unionists, that such a program would be detrimental to their own interests.
