

Carl Kiilsgaard

Even Robert Ripley might have breathed in wonderment at the similarity in the lives of two former University of Idaho students who graduated last June. Fiction writers might acclaim it as "new material."

The parallel of the two men's careers was brought to light last year when both starred for the Vandal football team. It was thought the amazing similarity of lives had ended when both finished the university last spring and one went to play professional football-the other to teach school. But today comes the news that both have been called back to the Marine Corps-at practically the same time.

Carl Kiilsgaard, Bonners Ferry, right tackle and captain of last year's Vandal football team; and Will Overgaard, Boise, left tackle, are the two men involved.

Met At School

Their fathers were both born in the same town in Denmark but the lads never had met each other until they entered the University as freshmen in 1946.

Both fathers born in Alborg, Denmark. C. P. Kiilsgaard left there in 1908, sailed for six years and then left the sea at Portland, Oregon, and took up farming near Davenport, Washington. Later, the family moved to American Falls and finally moved to Bonners Ferry in 1935.

E. N. Overgaard left Alberg, which is in Jutland, in 1906 and came to Montpelier in southern Idaho. The family moved to Boise in 1933 where Mr. Overgaard is a captain in the fire department. Both fathers speak Danish, have relatives still in that country, and although their sons naturally are well acquainted with the lads have been unable to get the fathers together.

Both attended high school at the same time. Both held almost identical positions in student council work, although Carl was in north Idaho and Will in south Idaho. Both were student body presidents the same year and both graduated the same year.

Both played football, basketball and competed in track in high school. In football both were ends, and Will was named to the All-Big Six team the same year that Carl was named to the All-Panhandle all-star team. They never competed against each other. Went To War Together

In World War II, both enlisted in the Marine Corps with Carl in the Sixth Division and Will in the Fourth Division. Carl was discharged in 1946 as a sergeant and Will got out in 1945 as a corporal. Both served in the South Pacific, Carl saw first service at Guadalcanal and went on through to Okinawa and wound up in China. Will was at the Marshalls, Saipan, Tinian and Iwo

Both have won four football letters at Idaho, due to their entrance at Idaho when freshmen were allowed to play on varsity

"I feel," said Will Overgaard recently, "that I have finally gotten ahead of Carl. You see, I am married and I have a small daughter. I guess Carl is still looking around for the right girl." Carl wouldn't commit himself although he agreed that Will had perhaps gotten the jump on him as far as family life was

Good Looking, Too

Both are good looking lads although their general height and weight and age is about the only resemblance. Carl is as dark as Will is blonde. For big men and for tackles, they both belie the idea of rough, tough gridiron stars. Both have fine personalities and were well liked on the squad and by their college mates. Both were good students with Carl perhaps having the smallest edge. And above all, they both spell their last names with a double A.

They are known as the "double A boys." Both were outstanding football players at Idaho. Carl won All-Coast honors last year and played in the East-West Shrine game and later with the College All-Stars against the professional champions. Overgaard received All-Coast honorable mention the

last two years. Upon graduation last spring, Will was hired as head football coach for Moscow high school. Kiilsgaard signed a contract to play football for the professional Chicago Cardinal grid team. Both were well "on the way" in their respective jobs when the

"greetings" arrived from Uncle Sam. Carl reports for his physical examination September 29 and Overgaard October 3, after which they both are to report to Camp

Pendleton, California. They will soon be in the Marine Corps together-for the second time. Their story should be interesting to watch for future similar





Boxing first attracted student fall of 1932 when Louie August enrolled as a freshman. Soon after that he organized a boxing club and arranged for a few bouts. Louie remained in this capacity as student coach until his graduation in 1935 when he undertook full time duties. In 1942 August relinquished this post and went into the service.

Highlights of this period were team championships at the Pacific Coast tournaments in 1938 and 1940 and national crowns in 1940 and 1941.

After Louie August left Bob Knox was hired as coach and he tutored the squad through the 1941-1942 seasons. From 1944-46 boxing was discontiued due to


