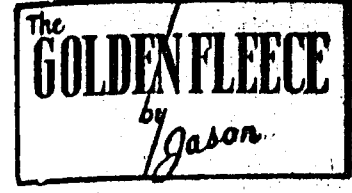

Noted Journalist Speaks On Far Eastern Situation

"Crossfire in Asia" will be the topic of Cecil Brown, radio news commentator, author, and world traveler, when he talks on the Far Eastern war situation Monday at 11 a.m. in the University auditorium.



As many of you have heard already, Editor Allen Derr had his appendix removed Monday night and is now residing at the University infirmary. That unfortunate incident leaves the writing of today's column to Jason's assistant (a kid just out of prep school so to speak), whom we shall, for clarity's sake (and want of a better name), call Treb.

Jason's substitute Treb attended the ASUI executive board meeting Tuesday at which were appointed seven students to probably the most important committee of the year, the student union committee.

With this committee the tremendous responsibility of operating and forming policies for the entire \$650,000 student union building will lie. Especially during the sixth-months trial period that the Board of Regents has given them, will their job be important. Student ownership and operation is on trial.

Also President Buchanan expresses his thanks to all those students who had a hand in the summer recruitment program, which he felt was largely responsible for Idaho's decrease in enrollment of only 7 to 10 percent, while the average decrease in the nation's universities as a whole is 25 percent.

Attention, Campus Males
To you 2,000 or more draft-dodgers (of which Treb is one), the following information was imparted from the lips of the Director of Student Affairs:

First, there are two categories you are placed in. (1) Postponement until the end of the academic year for freshmen and others in the lower half of the class academically. (2) Deferment (class 11A) for those who have completed one academic year, are in the upper half of their class, academically, and have made normal required arrangements to enroll in college before August 1, 1950.

Warning! In order to secure either postponement or deferment a student must apply to his draft board and arrange for the registrar to send a letter to the board. More complete information on this touching subject can be found on page one of this paper.

Brown will be the first speaker for Idaho's fall public events program.

A newsmen with wide experience, Brown began work on newspapers in the United States in 1929. At the onset of World War II, he was called to Rome to write and broadcast for International News Service and Columbia Broadcasting company. Brown was expelled from Italy by the Fascists and was then sent to Yugoslavia to cover the Nazi attack on that country in 1941.

Aboard Warship
Brown's news broadcasts from Singapore later in the war made journalistic history. He was aboard the British warship, Repulse, when it was torpedoed, and he witnessed the sinking of the Prince Brown's radio reporting of the sinking of the two ships won him the Overseas Press club prize and the Peabody award for outstanding radio reporting.

At the present time Mr. Brown broadcasts every morning on the Mutual Broadcasting system.

Doors Open Wide At Spur-Sponsored Annual Nickel Hop

Students Support Freedom Crusade

The Crusade for Freedom will receive support from the Idaho students through contributions to the Campus Chest in early November. DeForest Tovey and Harry Turner are local representatives of the Crusade.

Dedicated as a tribute to those who today are giving their lives in the struggle for human freedom, the Freedom Bell will stand as a permanent symbol of the free world's determination to resist communist aggression.

Radioed To Europe
On July 4th, radio free Europe went on the air with native language broadcasts to Czechoslovakia and Rumania. Similar programs were soon added, beamed to Poland, Hungary, and Bulgaria—six hours a day, seven days a week.

Dedication ceremonies will take place on United Nations Day, October 24 in Berlin, where the first clasp of the Freedom Bell will be carried by radio to free peoples everywhere. Simultaneously, bells will ring out all over America and throughout Western Europe. Behind the Iron Curtain, patriots will scrawl the outline of the Freedom Bell on walls, just as the "V" symbol was used against Nazi tyranny.

Homecoming is almost upon us and Mortar Board's annual sale of T-Mums will soon be under way. Mums can be ordered in all living groups through Wednesday, October 11. A special booth will be set up in the Ad building on October 11 and 12 to enable those living off the campus to order their mums.

Executive Board Approves Budget For Year's Expenditures Of ASUI

At the last Executive Board meeting the ASUI 1950-51 budget was approved, with the total amount budgeted at \$270,734.00. In the various departments, football is the biggest money-getter, expected to show a gross profit of \$3,850. Expenditures for the sport are \$101,150, with income amounting to \$105,000.

**Idaho Males Have
Two Categories,
Says Uncle Sam**
Male students at the university within draft ages, will be classified in two categories, postponement of induction and occupational deferment, in compliance with Selective Service Act regulations.

The first category provides for the postponement of induction of University students who are pursuing a full-time course of instruction, until the end of the academic year, or until the student ceases to satisfactorily pursue such course of instruction.

Postponement cannot be given any registrant until he has taken his armed forces physical exam and has received his order to report for induction. Students in attendance at the university on the date specified for them to report for induction, and who desire to request postponement of induction under this provision of the law, should submit to the local board, a written request along with a statement from the Registrar stating that he has enrolled and that the local board will be notified if his grades become unsatisfactory.

Regulations Exist
Requests for classification in the second category, occupational deferment, will be considered by selective service local boards, if all three of the following conditions exist.

First, the registrant must have completed at least one academic year of a full-time course of instruction at the university.

Second, the college at which the registrant completed an academic year must have certified that the registrant's scholastic standing placed him among the upper half of his class.

Ready For Public**
