

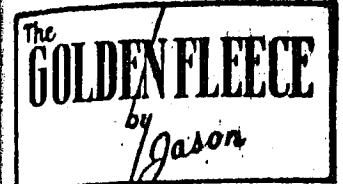

Think Before It's Too Late

As many ideologies, over a period of many years, manage to creep into the life and politics of a country, the Fabian Society during its 50 year life has seen its policies seep into the life blood of Great Britain. The same thing is happening in this country.

The Fabian Society, studied by history students in this very university, (and duly ignored, its only obvious purpose to give the prof another catch question) had some very famous founders. George Bernard Shaw, H. G. Wells, Mrs. Annie Besant, Sydney and Beatrice Webb, and Graham Wallas were advocates of the socialist movement. It progressed so unobtrusively that in 1925 the socialists were able to persuade David Lloyd George, British Liberal leader, to adopt their costly social service program.

George realized too late that he had been duped. Business did nothing while medical services were tampered with, and many doctors were convinced that it was to their advantage to nationalize transport service, coal mining, and other industry.

Is the same thing happening here? It is on the way. Everyone likes lower doctor bills. Yet, let's investigate these bills, and compare our present medical service to that in Great Britain. Youths study years, with great zeal, to enter the profession. If they are to be paid a set salary when they get out, directed by the government, initiative which in the past has led to great discovery and progress in the medical field will be obliterated. Who will give a damn if they discover a new antibody to combat some dread disease? Who is going to look? Nobody!

Take away your high doctors' fees, and give free medical attention. Your pregnant wife, who needs diagnosis badly, will stand in line behind workers with slivers in their fingers, and will have to wait her turn. Your son whose appendix is about to burst will wait too. Then, when he is on the table, the doctor might decide he's worked hard enough for this month's wages and stuff off on the job. Result? No wife. No son. No new addition to the family! No nothing!

Great advances have been made by our scientists, while at the same time this Fabian Society (pretty name for socialism) has been sneaking around telling poorer classes how nice free medicine can be. Great Britain is living testimony that there is no such thing as free medicine. Government efficiency is low, any fool knows that: Why let governmental agencies, with their consequential graft and corruption, take over a private enterprise, with high standards and principles, to run the profession into political muck? The citizens of Great Britain are paying through the nose for their lack of interest in political goings-on during the preceding 50 years. Why should we make the same error?

Some idiots will argue, "Well, so it does cut down on initiative—science has discovered all the wonder medicines we need anyway." Pretty poor reasoning. Things are never as good as they can be. Since time immemorial people have thought there were no new discoveries and inventions to be had. Then the automobile and airplane, penicillin and streptomycin, to name a few, were invented and discovered. Why put the collar on such activity? And socialism will do it!

Already the administration shows signs, and definite signs, of socialism. MVA was such a sign. The successful completion of CVA would be such a sign—and one damned close to home. Truman has made mutterings about socialized medicine—feeling out the chances for such a program. And common laborers needn't think their industry would be neglected. Medicine is just a step—it is a little more vulnerable than the rest. Why fool ourselves? We pay for free enterprise's findings, but we will pay much more for socialism, and socialism won't find anything for us but ruination.

Too many Americans don't realize just what nationalization amounts to. They think they will keep directing their businesses in the ordinary manner, with government subsidies and aids in direction. We already have our hands full of these, but this isn't complete nationalization. It means that one day you leave your office, the government bureaucrats take over, and you never see the old desk again.

An old timer in Bone, Idaho (population 10) summed the situation up pretty well this summer, when he commented, "The government will be running everything, unless some of us folks get busy and stop 'em."

Roylance lived at Rupert in pre-college years. At the university he was a member of Alpha Zeta and Sigma Xi, honorary scholastic fraternities.

The University's week was delayed past the national prevention week to eliminate conflict with the university Homecoming celebrations," said Dr. Cady, "but fire prevention and safety cannot be a one-week job. Everyone must work to cut down hazards at all times."

Campus cleanup plans call for various departments to hold a general "housecleaning" to eliminate hazards which might result in fire or cause accidents.

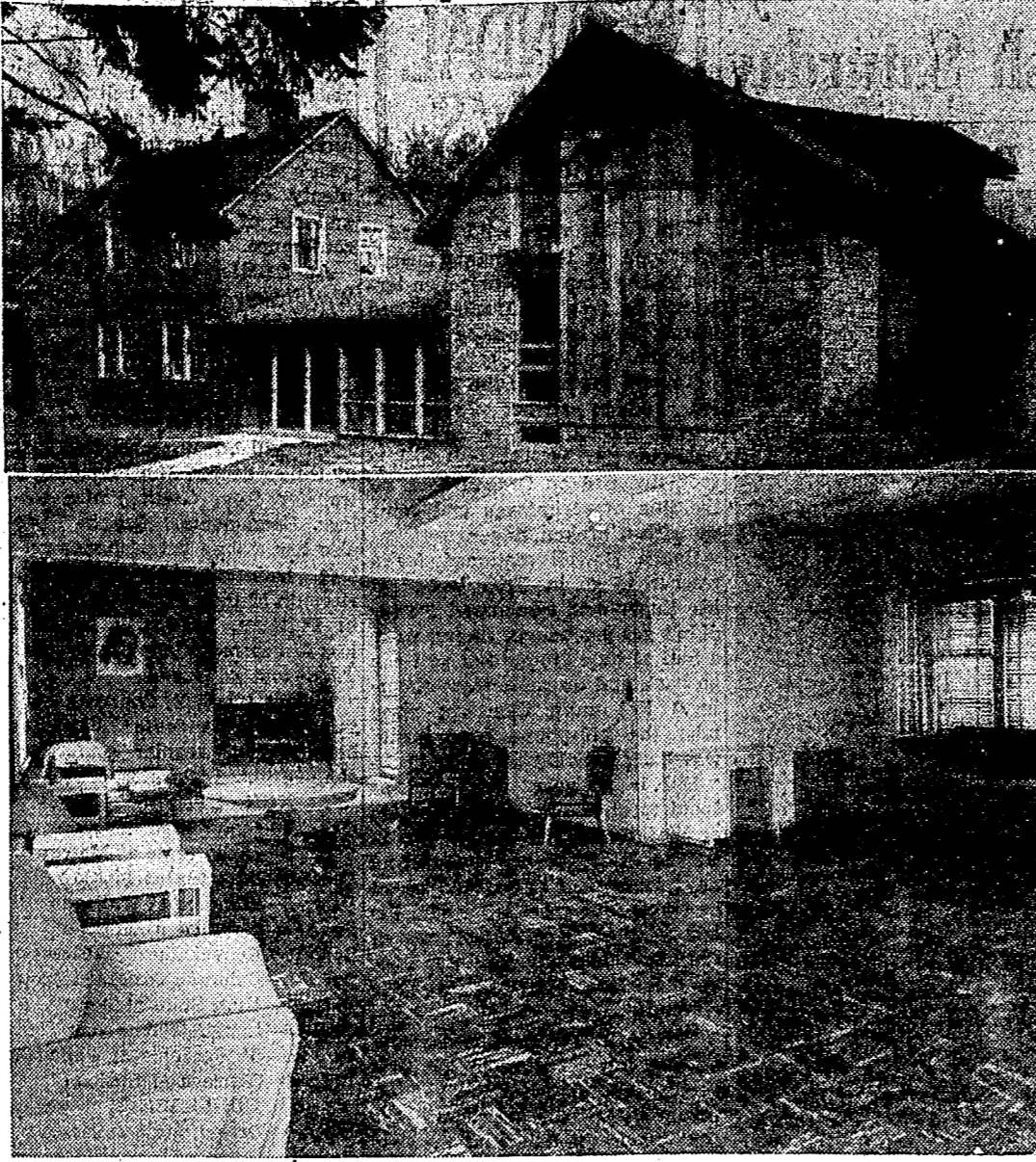
