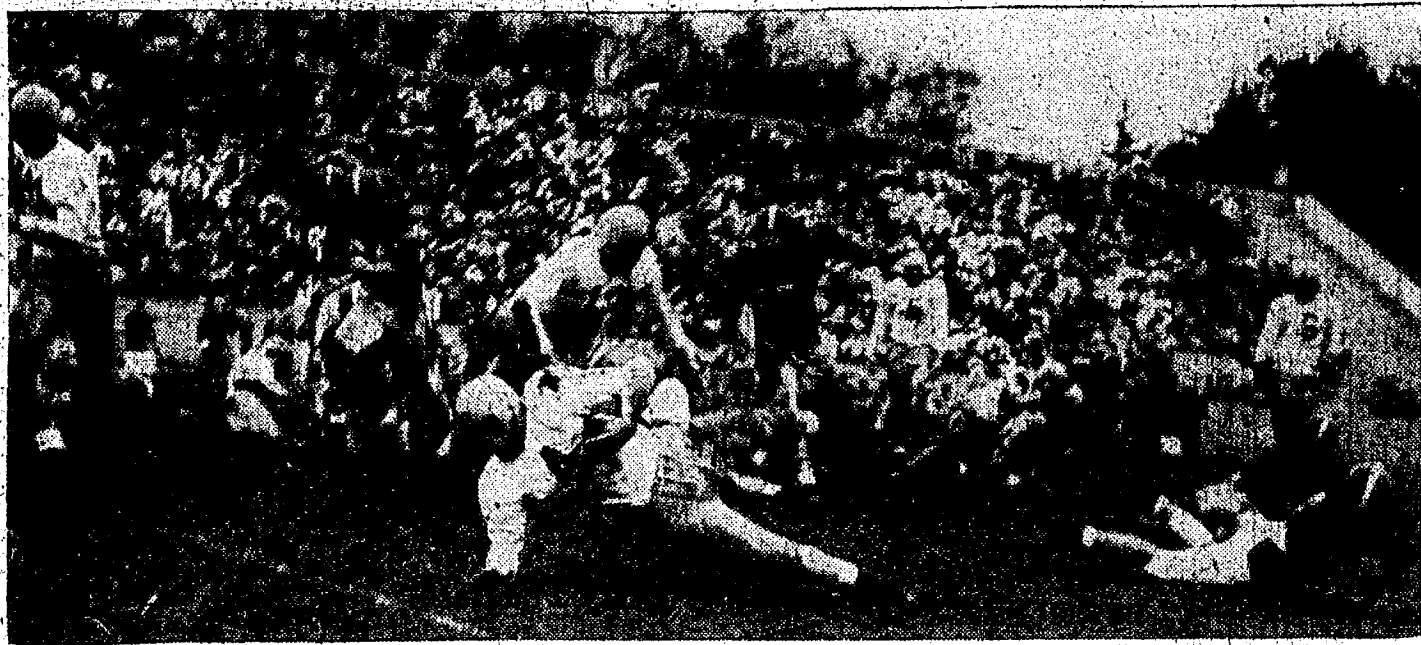

### WSC Player Trips Up Block And An Idaho Touchdown

## Idaho Breaks WSC 21-Game Hoodoo With 7-7 Tie

### Hard-Plunging Block Sets Up Idaho's Fourth Period Tally

Rain came down by bucketfuls at Rogers Field Saturday, but it wasn't the steady, drenching downpour that rendered a 23-year football drought for the University of Idaho. Coach Dixie Howell's determined Vandals snapped the second of their hoodoo losing streaks with a bone-jarring ground attack which bumped across a fourth quarter touchdown and netted them a seven-to-seven tie with Washington State college.

It was the first time in 21 contests between the two schools that Idaho has even been able to knot the count with WSC. They still have yet to win a ball game from the Cougars since 1925. Idaho last tied Washington State in 1927—seven to seven.

A soaked, pigskin crazy crowd of 19,000 witnessed the affair which started out on a green pasture and ended in a sloppy mud-fight. WSC churned up 66-yards of turf in 12 plays for their score early in the second period with Ray Hobbs punching over from four yards out. Hobbs added the extra point and Washington State had its seven for the afternoon.

Idaho tore up the marshy field in the opening minutes of the fourth canto, Jim Chadband capping the 75-yard drive with a dive into promised land from the one yard ribbon. Glen Christian neatly placed the porkhide between the uprights and the ball game was back on even terms where it stayed.

Hard effective blocking and charging by the Idaho line, coupled with the devastating line ramming of King Block, John Brogan and Glen Christian, carried Idaho deep into Washington State territory in the first period. WSC won the toss—elected to kickoff, and as a result they were in trouble the greater portion of the opening quarter.

The Vandal's ground-gobbling, rushing game, which ran up a total of 214 slippery yards to WSC's 152, started up early. On the first series of downs, Idaho worked up field to their own 48 where Brogan punted to Bud Roffler who took it on the State eight and returned it to the WSC 13. The Cougars got nowhere fast. Scott Foxley dropped back to punt—Idaho charged him hard—the ball slithered off the side of his foot and sailed out of bounds on the WSC 34.

Idaho lost two yards on the first play but John Brogan made up the loss when he shot through a gaping hole off right tackle and moved for a first and ten to the State 2. Block smashed over the left side to the WSC 15, Brogan added another yard at center, and Christian skipped around left end for a first down on the WSC 10.

Washington State dug in and held after Block penetrated to the Cougar seven on the next charge and Idaho bogged down after Glaves was caught for a 15-yard loss on a fourth-down pass attempt.

With Jim Chadband, Billy Mullins and Rich LeDuc slapping back the majority of WSC's running plays in a fashion they carried on all afternoon, WSC punted to the Idaho 28.

Idaho moved up field. Brogan faked a third-down punt, picked up a host of blockers and rambled up the left side to the 49. Christian gained three yards to the WSC 48 and Brogan pumped down to the 40 for a first and ten. On the next play King Block almost went the remaining distance. The Vandal fullback lowered his head and boomed straight through the middle, stumbled into the clear and fell on the WSC 266. WSC tightened their defense again and Idaho turned the ball over on the State 34.

Washington State opened up quick as Poole, Hobbs and Bailey engineered the Cougars on a sustained drive that didn't stop until it had reached the Idaho end zone.

### Skyline Six Power Plays On Neale Stadium Turf Saturday

The undefeated University of Wyoming Cowpokes, the only team on the Vandal schedule of 1950 to sport a clean record, will invade the University of Idaho campus Saturday afternoon—and in so doing will attempt to extend their win streak to seven straight games.

Led by diminutive Eddie Talboom, the nation's leading scorer and one of the most accurate passers in the west, coach Howell of the Vandals is afraid that his charges are going to run up against a little more than they can handle. Coach Gene Harlow, assistant to Howell, witnessed the contest between Wyoming and New Mexico last Saturday—reporting that the Cowpokes have just as fine a ball club as their record shows. In that game Wyoming rang up a convincing 44-0 victory.

Coach Howell stated that the Vandals will work hard this week and by late Saturday afternoon we will know the worst. Talboom hails from South Bend, Indiana—home of Notre Dame university. Although the 157-pound lad is the leading scorer, he is only one of the variety of backs. Another man that will bear watching is Royal McMullen, who in previous engagements has proven that he is a tough man to stop.

Coach Howell has reported that his Vandals have come out of the hard-fought contest with Washington State last weekend with only minor cuts and bruises. Howell did not say whether or not he would change his offense and defense style of play for the Wyoming contest. That remained in the secret department.

Saturday's game which will be played before a Dad's Day throng will start one-half hour earlier than previous games. The Neale stadium kickoff time is set for 1:30.

### THREE IDAHO OPPONENTS BLANK OPPONENTS

Of the four gridiron opponents remaining on the Vandals schedule, only Boston university failed to register a win. The Terriers suffered a 13 to 7 setback from Syracuse.

Wyoming rolled over hapless New Mexico 44 to 0. Oregon State downed Montana 20 to 0 and Arizona State of Tempe swamped New Mexico A. & M. 49 to 0.

## Coubabes Nip Idaho Frosh 13-12 With True Conversion

Washington State's freshman football team found an injury-riddled Idaho Babe almost too "red" hot to handle Friday afternoon. The heavily favored Cougar youngsters, playing at Neale stadium, were forced to come from behind in the second half to squeeze out a 13-12 victory. The educated toe of halfback Fran Weddle provided the winning margin as he booted a perfect placement after a third quarter touchdown.

A meager crowd was hardly settled in its seats before Cougar halfback Wayne Berry took the opening kickoff in his end zone and romped through the Idaho defenses for a 100-yard touchdown run. The play, however, was called back to the Washington 24 because of an offensive holding penalty and the Cougars lost a golden opportunity.

A feeble 20-yard kick booted into the strong wind by Stater Bob Burkhardt, late in the first quarter, set up Idaho's first score. The Vandal Babes, taking over on WSC's 23-yard line, tried a pass good for one yard, and then sent halfback Gus Pastos charging off right tackle for 22 yards and a touchdown. Bob Cruickshank's conversion attempt was no good, and Idaho led, 6-0.

WSC's only threat in the first half resulted from a 66-yard drive that was stopped on the Idaho goal line. The Cougars had discovered that they could run the Idaho ends at will. From the Idaho 11, mammoth Jim Head galloped around right end, but was hit with such bonecrushing force, as he crossed the goal line, that the ball squirted from his grasp and fell right in Pastos' arms. The surprised Vandal galloped back to the 26-yard line before he was stopped.

With the second half only a few minutes old, WSC took over on their own 29 and scored in five plays. A 39-yard reverse play from Head to Campbell, who then lateraled to Berry, counted for the Couababes. The extra point attempt failed and the score stood, 6-6.

Both teams desperately sought a tie breaking score, and so took to the air. Vandal Ted Kasteanes' running toss to Walt Dell was intercepted by Burkhardt, who ran back to the Idaho 40. In a flurry of running plays Berry, Rause and Head moved the ball to the six.
