Former U. Student Merits Silver Star

Major Conrad R. Underdahl, an Idaho graduate and a former instructor in the University's ROTC program, has been awarded the silver star for gallantry in action during a Korean campaign.

The citation stated that Major Underdahl led an attack on 101 enemy tanks which ultimately destroyed the tanks.

Graduated from the university in 1940, Major Underdahl served in the Pacific theater for three years. After the war, he joined the ROTC staff as assistant professor of military science and tactics.

College Enrollment Drops Below 1949

The U. S. Office of Education reported in its annual survey that enrollments in institutions of higher education for the fall of 1950 were 6.6 per cent below those of the fall of 1949. In the universities freshmen classes dropped 11 per cent from last year. The freshmen showed a drop of 10 per cent and the women of 2 per cent.

Despite the 10 per cent loss of men on the campuses they still outnumber the women 2 to 1. The veterans showed a tendency to concentrate in the larger institutions. The only institutions which showed no marked change were Negro institutions.

Family Life Is Stressed As Source Of Solution To War

Ready or not, one year ago Father Time shoved us into the last half of the twentieth century. It was scarcely a triumphal entry. Nor has 1950 added any lustre to the second lap.

We are even closer than a year ago to the terrible possibility of a death struggle between two competing ideologies. If that struggle becomes a full-fledged one, our future is trial and tribulation. Mass deprivation and destitution, and diversion of our normal aims of living into strife and destruction will be our lot. At the very best we will lead a brink-edge existence for another generation.

Family Stressed

Where does family life fit into such a picture? First, more and more, family ties must be the source of our deeper emotional satisfactions. We live in a world which is increasingly harsh and impersonal. Fewer and fewer of us live our lives out, or even a great part of them, among the people of one community. As a result, many people lack the satisfaction of close personal or community ties. The attainment of material goals—wealth, security, high standards of living—as major objectives of life will become more and more difficult. These circumstances highlight our increasing dependence upon satisfying personal interrelationships for lasting happiness. The family can and should be a highly important unit in providing these interrelationships.

Second, the people of the world will find their way out of their present desperate circumstances only when they secure leaders who are able to rise above petty, individual considerations. We need leaders who can accept power without becoming drunk upon it. Those who find satisfaction in strife and injury, and are so driven by their own problems that they are unable to think objectively can never lead the nations to peace and good-will.

Where do people acquire such qualities? The evidence indicates that they are rooted predominantly in a satisfying family life. Persons who are rejected by parents and family, who feel themselves injured or deprived in their family relationships, and who come from "conflict-riven homes" are likely to pervert power when they attain it. They may even struggle for leadership seeking through the exercise of power to work out their personal problems, or to avenge previous hurtful experiences.

Hitler's fanatical ruthlessness, it seems clear, had its roots in his defective family life. On the other hand, Abraham Lincoln pointed to the beneficent effect of a good personal interrelationship with his step-mother: "All I am, or that I ever hope to be," he said, "I owe to my darling mother."

So close and important is the relationship between family experiences, adult adjustment, and international affairs that Dr. Brock Chisholm, head of the World Health Organization recently declared, "There is nothing more important (in the attainment of enduring peace) than the proper rearing of children."

He stressed the importance of education for family life and parenthood, adding that the emotional stresses and turmoil were terrifically complicating the problem of assuring a good family life, and increasing the need for family life education.

Those who seek to safeguard their personal satisfactions for the future, and at the same time contribute their bit to the making of a better world need to give conspicuous attention to effective preparation for family living. It is one of the tragedies of our great age that so vital an aspect of life is left so largely to chance.

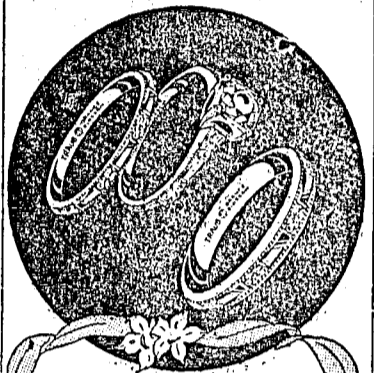
PH No. 3, 23-16; and CH No. 4 romped over PH No. 4, 34-23.

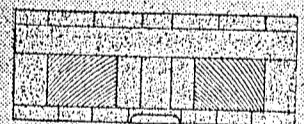

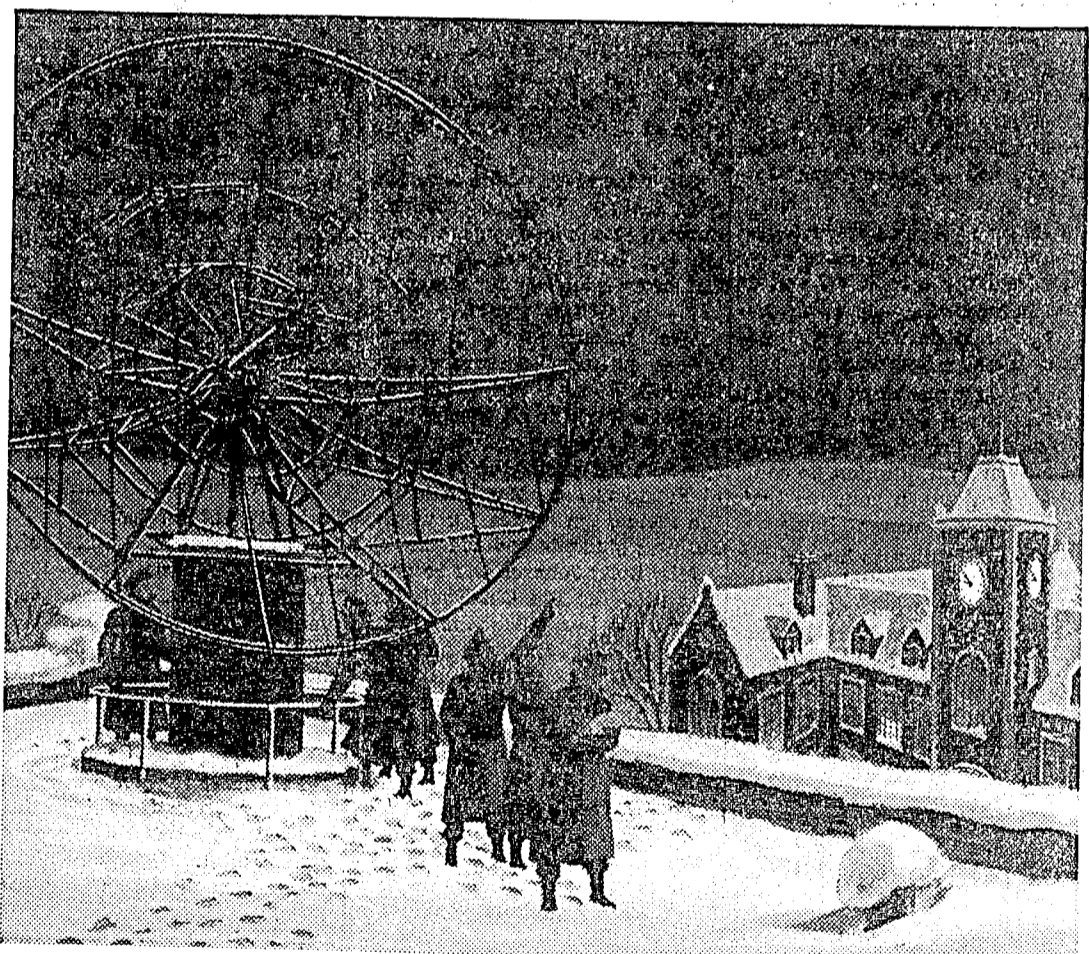
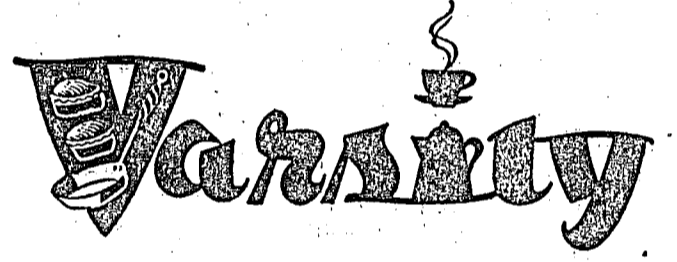
