





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# Old Ben Was The Father Of Modern Advertising

Advertising in various forms has been traced back to the ancient ruins of Babylonian, Egyptian, Greek and Roman cities. But advertising as we know it today can be attributed to Benjamin Franklin.

The first advertisements in both English and American newspapers had little to distinguish them typographically from the regular news matter. They looked like regular news stories but were actually paid ads.

It was Benjamin Franklin who finally put white space between ads in his 'Pennsylvania Gazette" in Philadelphia. He began the regular use of small stock woodcuts for illustrations in his newspaper and increased the size of the headlines in his ads.






