What's wrong with cheating?

It's as logical as eating. It has a definite place in American education because it is an integral part of our social, patrol equipment as adequate economic and political composition.

Let's disassociate cheating from the moral issue and examine it objectively.

.Cheating is the product of academic pressure. In our system, the grade means everything. It means a potential job. greater parking space, with possi-It means graduate school. It means a money-saving scholarship. It means eligibility for athletics and sororities.

At most colleges, a grade is the fool's gold which purchases all these things. You can't get along without it. It's money. And necessarily, it is competition. And where there is competition, there is that native American trait called ingenuity. Cheating is merely one area of ingenuity applied to outmoded education.

Cheating does not belong to the moral realm. More fundamentally, it is a danger sign—a protest against a senile, in-firm, stereotyped educational system that is failing in its job firm, stereotyped educational system that is failing in its job. Cheating is a protest against a system which fails to arouse **Slated In February** interest and initiative in the student. It is spawned in outdated testing and grading methods.

Cheating is a protest against the "memory" education to which most American students are exposed. In this system, the best-crammed memories are awarded the "A's".

You'll find that the cheaters are not always the "weak" or "dumb" students. More often they are outstanding in athletics, school society and extra-curricular activities. Here's The Story On College Boxing By Don Theophilus, Jr.

For many years boxing has been in a rather precarious position as an intercollegiate sport. It is the exception, rather than the rule, for a university or college to have a boxing team. Idaho is among the small minority.

It is a pretty safe bet to say that most school faculties are opposed to boxing, either on an intramural or intercollegiate basis. Besides this there has often been a decided lack of enthusiasm and support from the students. Why is this the case?

First of all, people think of boxing as a sport where one boy deliberately tries to inflict punishment on his opponent. Something akin to a street brawl. How many times have you heard the exclamation, "Kill 'em Tiger," or "I can't see any-thing in two fellas just hitting each other." These and similar examples have done a lot of the dirty work in painting a black and inadequate picture of college boxing. BOXING IS NOT FIGHTING! It is not and should not be confused with what goes on within the professional sport.

The collegiate idea is aptly defined in the Preamble to the Official National Collegiate Athletic Association Boxing Rules. "Boxing is a sport of skill participated in for fun and satisfaction derived. Skill is the criterion, not brute power or force; points not knockdowns; clean hits, not knockouts. A well conceived skillful attack that builds up points is indicative of college boxing. A knockdown or knockout, should t occur, is considered incidental to the bout, not the objective." This is the essence of college boxing.

Those who condemn it overlook the educational and trainng values that can come from this excellent sport. For many boys it is the only outlet for an otherwise aggressive nature.
