would be able to make the purchase. Then, too if compulsion enters the picture might it distort the objectives of the plan?
Button, button, who's got the beanie? The obvious means for solving these problems is not a half-baked vote in Executive Board, but a considered judgment which will only be as
good as the loud shouts of interested students. -K.L.
