

Not long ago quite a few people were wondering why ASUI films couldn't be shown in the Ag Science building auditorium. Their arguments were that the Borah room was too small to accomodate the large audiences drawn to these films, and that the larger Ag. Science auditorium was going unused.

So, with this in mind, we set out to find out why the restrictions on showing ASUI films in places other than the Borah room. We came up with this: If stateowned buildings were once opened for such usage it would be very difficult to draw the line on who could and who couldn't use these facilities.' Once opened to such activities, any group in or outside of the University might very well claim the right to use the buildings.

It is also argued that such things as janitorial services, heat, and light and power would have to be paid for by the University. If such facilities were to be paid for, there would again be the possibility that any group or organization could pay such a fee and use the buildings for any purpose.

Then too, the Student Union building was built expressly for the use of student activities. It is being paid for by students and the VOL. 56, NO. 38 operation expenses are paid for by students (through ASUI). Thus, some people argue, students should patronize their own business.
