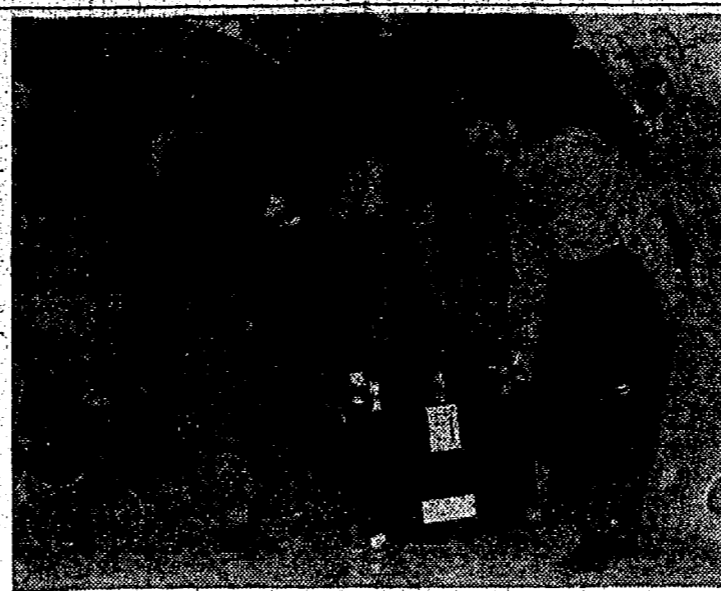


# BLOOD DRIVE SWINGS INTO LAST DAY SCHEDULE



**Rally For Blood**—Idaho Joes and James flocked en masse to their Student Union building Tuesday evening for a real "blood rally." Led by the student body cheer leaders, nearly 300 students participated. Highlight of the rally was the introduction of candidates for Plasma Princess. Musical numbers by the LDS band and a skit by Lucy Spencer and Jim Costley were also on the program. Students jammed the street in front of the Student Union and the patio to yell, watch and listen. The yell leaders and entertainers held forth on the roof over the entrance to the SUB.

## Blood Drive Lags Behind Schedule As Students Donate For Fourth Day

The blood-level in the miniature I-tank on the Student Union patio is resting below the three-quarter mark, as the ASUI blood drive lags far behind schedule. "It will take a lot of 'walk-ins' this afternoon to push the drive over the goal of 2,000 pints," reported Jim Dunham, chairman of the drive.

Yesterday's total of 449 brought the three day total to 1,375. Only 428 pints of blood were collected Wednesday, while 498 pints were collected Tuesday, the opening day of the drive.

Dunham added that there are at least 2,000 healthy men on the campus, even excluding those medically unable to give blood, and the athletes. The co-eds are holding back too, Dunham commented.

The 40-minute process of giving blood is virtually painless. An anesthetic, procaine, is used to deaden the area around where the blood is extracted. All donors receive two glasses of fruit juice and all the coffee and cookies they can down.

Two bloodmobile units, under the direction of Dr. E. S. Sestero, Idaho Red Cross blood center director, are handling the proceedings. Twenty-two beds are set up, which makes it possible to extract 75 pints of blood each hour. This large number of beds and other improved features in the routine have minimized the long waits in line that characterized the other drives.

"If you give, we have your blood. If you are rejected, you have a badge of honor for having tried. So why don't all of you come down," said Duane Lloyd, chairman of last year's drive and originator of the college-sponsored blood drives.

A queen of queens will be crowned tonight as the Plasma Princess is crowned at the intermission of "Corpuscle Capers," the blood drive dance, slated to begin at 9 p.m. in the south ballroom.

Admission to the dance will be a hole in the arm where blood has been taken, or else the adhesive bandage remains. If you heal faster than you wash. Ray Cox and his orchestra will play for the affair.

Competing for the Plasma Princess title are Norma Cox, Frosch queen; Betty Anderson, Little International queen; Margaret Alley, Holly queen; June Carr, Queen of the May; Leah Jensen, Homecoming queen; and Phyllis Ralstin, Miss Idaho of 1951.

A rally in front of the Student Union building Tuesday night attracted approximately 400 prospective donors. Featured in the entertainment were Jim Costley and Lucy Spencer, in a comedy skit; Slim Pickens and his Mountaineers; and Bill Exworthy, accordion.

Another attraction at the rally was the siren-precurred arrival of a Moscow fire engine. Bill Shaw, rally director, believed that if students would come to anything, they would answer a fire alarm.

Dunham said a special round of thanks were owed to the over 200 students and faculty members who have assisted in the drive. He stated that the Spurs, Intercollegiate Knights, typists from the secretarial studies classes, and the Faculty Women's club all had put in time, in addition to many students who just wanted to help in the blood drive.

## Curtain Rises Tonight On Courtroom Comedy

The curtain will ring up on the final dramatics production of the year, "Ladies of the Jury," tonight and tomorrow night in the University auditorium at 8:15 p.m. This courtroom comedy was written by Fred Ballard.

It is being directed by Edmund M. Chavez, with Stowell Johnstone acting as technical director.

The entire play takes place in a new Jersey court house, the first act being situated in the courtroom itself. Fred Burton presides as the Honorable Judge Fish, and Rod Greening is Van Sty, the suave, egotistical prosecuting attorney.

Tickets for the play are on sale at the bookstore and Hodgins drug store. Admission is 50 cents for students who don't have their activity cards.

The case with which the play is concerned is a murder trial. The defendant, Mrs. Yvette Yvet Gordon (Irene Sterling), a French chorus girl, is accused of murdering her husband, a prominent Rosedale, New Jersey, financier. Mr. Dale (Jerry Sperrazzo), the defense attorney, is a young, sincere lawyer, convinced of Mrs. Gordon's innocence. He fights against overwhelming odds imposed by Mr. Van Sty.

For the second and third acts of the play, the jury retires to the jury room. There are 12 of them, six men and six women. They have but one thing in common — upon them rests all responsibility of determining the innocence or guilt of Mrs. Gordon.

Jurors Listed

There is Andrew McClaren McKaig (Roger Styner), who is as Scotch as his name, and Mrs. McGuire (Mary Thompson), who has an Irish temper which keeps flaring up. There is Cynthia Tate (Marietta Cloos), a young girl just graduated from college, who is attracted to Alonzo Beal (Tom Wright), a poet who seems much more interested in reading Shakespeare than in determining a verdict.

Another jurist is Steve Bromm (Ted Torok), a World War II veteran who wants to get home to his wife, two kids, and gas station. Mrs. Dace (Beverly Alger), is a young newly-wed from the South, and Miss Pratt (Mona Rosenau) is a prim and proper spinster.

Tony Theodophilus (Tom Butera), a Greek candy store proprietor, and Mayme Mixer (Bonese Collins), a flashy ex-chorus girl who entertains the jury with her slinging and dancing, are responsible for many funny situations in the show. Mr. Dazey (Marvin Alexander), an "honest" real estate broker also entertains with his flowery, poetic speeches.

Last Jurist

Last of all, there is Mrs. Livingston Baldwin Crane (Sharon Henderson), a wealthy but sincere society woman, who is convinced of Mrs. Gordon's innocence, and Mr. J. J. NSA Prexy Speaks

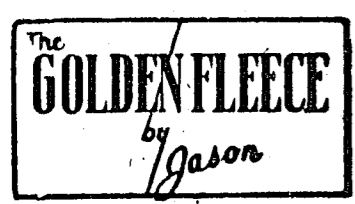

During the last drive, the blood center stayed open past closing time on the final day to accommodate a last minute rush of people. In fact it has been so slow that the center has been able to run a good many people through without an appointment. Several people have told this writer that they have heard others say they did not want to donate, and no reason for the refusal was given. This just isn't the type of attitude we expected from Idaho students.

This is the last day of the drive, and time's a wastin'. You still have time to give a pint of much needed blood — so get right down to the SUB and don't wait for an engraved invitation.

From now until the end of the school term visitors will be crawling out of the woodwork around here. Most of us are glad to have them around, and would like to have them leave the campus with a good impression since a goodly share of them are either future students or taxpayers (could even be both).

The 26th annual Little International Agriculture show will swing into high gear with the parade down Moscow's Main street and up to the campus which will begin at 1:45 p.m. on Saturday afternoon. Winners have been announced for the judging contests already held and champion showing and special events including a coed milking contest and crowning of the queen, Betty Anderson, will be featured in the evening show at the field house at 7 p.m.

Everyone showing animals in the Little International will lead their entries in the parade Saturday afternoon. The parade will assemble at "A" street and Main at 1:14 p.m. and get underway at 1:44.

Featured in the review will be Bill Choules, chairman, who will lead the march; a color guard; the Pershing Rifles; the Air Force drill squad; the University marching band; the queen and her court; floats depicting agricultural progress; farm equipment; animals of the contestants; and the Vandal riders.

## Idaho Entertains High School Writers

Four University students will entertain for the high school journalism conference banquet at 6 o'clock tonight in the North ballroom with Pat Cameron swinging the blues, Tom Hennessey playing the guitar, and Hugh and David Burgess as fire eater and magician.

Glenn Balch, novelist and short story writer from Boise, will speak tomorrow morning in conference room A of the SUB, Balch, who was born and raised in Texas, has worked with horses most of his life. In World War II he served as a major in the Air Force in India and China. He returned to the West after the war.

Fictitious Ranch

Most of Balch's novels in recent years are laid on a fictitious ranch called Darby Ranch located in southwestern Idaho. One of his most famous books is "Lost Horse." Other books he has written include "Tiger Roan," the story of a wild horse caught and trained by cruel methods to buck for rodeos; "Indian Paint," "Viking Dog," "Wild Horse," "Hide-Rack Kidnapped," the story of a collie dog who was the best sheep herder in the Salmon river country of Idaho; and "Christmas Horse."

Representatives from distant points including Twin Falls, American Falls, Blackfoot, and Post Falls, arrived for the conference last night. The students registered this morning from 8:30 to 10 o'clock, then heard a welcome address by President Buchanan. At 10:30 a.m. there was a panel on yearbook problems.

This afternoon students from Blackfoot will participate in a panel on Newspaper Problems to be held at 2 o'clock in conference room A. Rafe Gibbs will be moderator.

Blackfoot Representatives

Student representatives from Blackfoot are Anne VanAtta, editor of the Round Up, Blackfoot high school paper, who will discuss whether paper should be printed or mimeographed, how frequently a paper can or should be published, and the layout problems and staff responsibilities; and Pat Schindurling, sports editor, who will talk about relationship with coaches and obtaining accurate sports news, and financing and care of newspaper equipment.

Also from Blackfoot, Delana Clark, art editor, will discuss mimeographed paper heads, selling and production problems in connection with advertising, and student body participation in the school paper project. Marian Green, proofreader, will discuss the problems of the quality of paper, stencils, uniform type and proof-reading; gossip; and plagiarizing.

## Scholastic Honor Gain By Kappas

Kappa Kappa Gamma copped first place scholastic honors for campus living groups for last semester with an accumulative 3.03 grade average for 53 students, the registrar's office has reported. LDS led the men's division with a total of 2.63 with 22 members, but ranked ninth in the overall campus average.

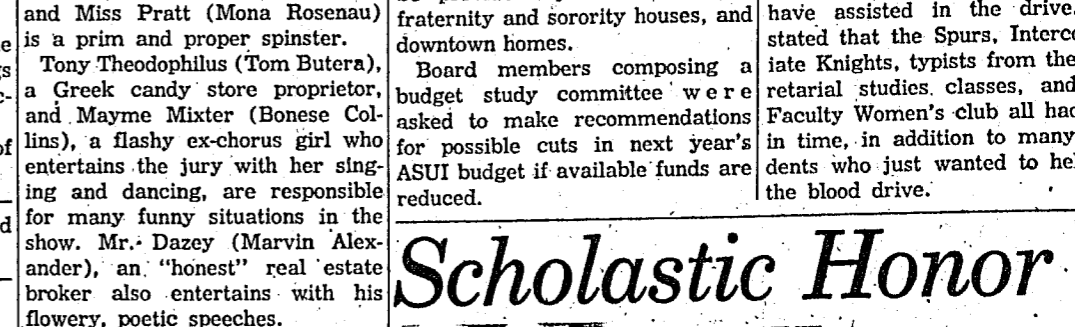
Second place for women went to Alpha Phi with a 2.98 for 47 students, and Delta Tau Delta took the men's second with a 2.61 with 51 students. Third through eighth places went to Pi Beta Phi, 2.94; Delta Gamma, 2.89; Alpha Chi Omega, 2.78; Delta Delta Delta, 2.71; Kappa Alpha Theta, 2.73, and Gamma Phi Beta, 2.66. Delta Tau Delta ranked tenth on the campus.

Willis Sweet hall was second highest for men with an accumulative average of 2.55 with 174 members, and Lindley hall was third with a 2.52 for 189 men.

Sorority women averaged a 2.84 grade point, with a 2.30 average recorded for fraternity men. The combined Greek-letter houses reported an accumulative 2.48 average.

Dormitory women earned a 2.50 grade average, with men in dormitories rating a 2.43 grade point. The combined students in University (Continued on Page 2, Col. 4)

The purpose of this organization is to provide additional learning experience and opportunity for leadership training for high school students.

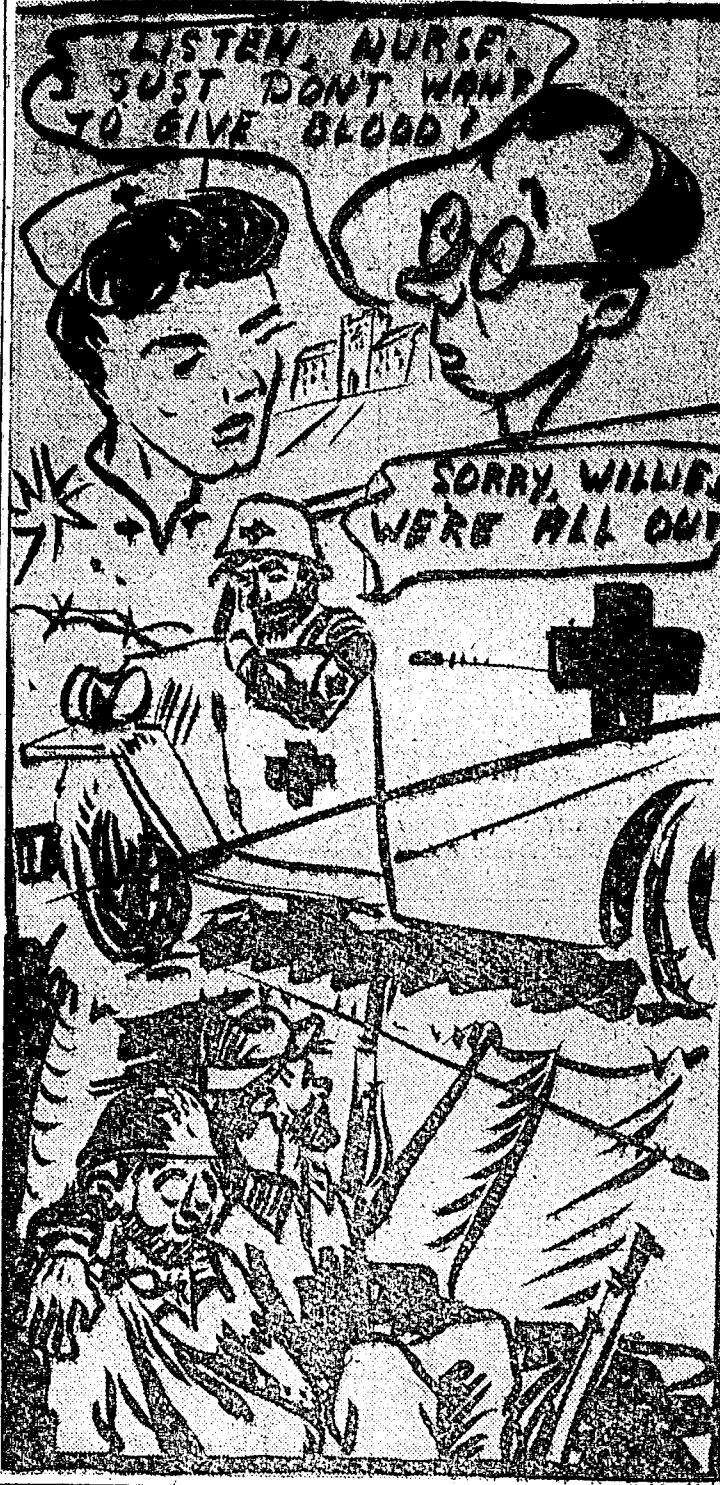
Those who have indicated interest in preparing for the field of business are eligible for membership.

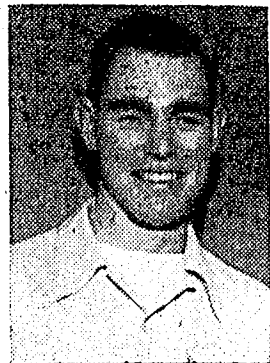

## Party Platforms Revealed By Campaigning Politios

Platforms for the Independent, United and Third parties have been announced by the chairmen of the parties for the student body election to be held Wednesday. Their respective points are being explained by representatives to the various campus living groups at the present time prior to the election.

A five-point platform drafted by the Independent party candidates for ASUI elections has been released by towell Johnstone, party chairman. The platform includes continuation of Independent Executive Board policies which contains expansion of class activities, training of student leaders, expansion of recruitment, and appointment by qualification.

The second plank in the platform, Executive Board hearings on important issues, includes Pep Band, beanies, NSA, and proposal for a drama tour.

Third, revision of the card file system, includes publicity and utilization of interviews.

Fourth is fuller utilization of the SUB for student activities and fifth is encouragement of campus-wide "Help Week".

### United Platform

The United Party platform includes five main points. They are, as listed by Bob Fuller, chairman: revision of ASUI committees with elimination of non-functioning of ASUI dance committee, strengthening of rally committee by inclusion of an I-Club member, rejuvenation of half-time committee.

The United Party second plans reorganization of class duties, includes having the freshman class take charge of student recruitment with the chairman of the preceding year and an Executive Board member as advisors, having the sophomore class take charge of the blood drive under the same arrangement as recruitment, have the junior class take charge of Campus Chest drive under above arrangement, and giving the senior class a well-earned rest.

The third part of the platform, concerning campus publications, includes correlation of the University department and the publication activity, and give credit, if possible, to workers on KUOI and Argonaut.

The fourth part, concerning committee reference files, includes encouragement of the Executive Board and student activities committee to make more use of these files, and putting and organized group or committee in charge of keeping these files up to date.

The fifth plank is to stand behind NSA.

### TPA Platform

The Third Party association's main aims are better government by and for the students and benefits for the students.

The first point is replacement of students on ASUI committees and councils by direct application for such membership, and not by arbitrary and usually biased appointment by the Executive Board and the various councils.

Second, the use of an advisory

constitutional amendment.

Fourth, the assumption of definite duties assigned the various class officers, or their entire elimination.

Fifth, an investigation into, and solution of the ASUI Pep Band issue, with which neither the students, administration, or music department are entirely satisfied.

Sixth, monetary assistance to KUOI to provide the ASUI with a radio station and transmitting equipment to insure complete campus coverage.

Seventh, the establishment of a mail exchange box in the Student Union for use by all living groups and other organizations, so that mail and other communications could be exchanged between living groups and other organizations, without requiring them to go through the U. S. mail, usually a considerable expense.

Eighth, the establishment of a

self-supporting office, whereby job openings and students desiring work could be matched quickly, thus eliminating the need of the University to hire high school part-time help, as it sometimes does.

Ninth, the establishment of a self-supporting ski area to be initiated and sponsored by the ASUI and/or the Vandal Ski club.

Tenth, improvements on the Student Union building, including darkroom facilities, a permanent sound system, and an enclosed projection booth, all as ASUI funds permit.

These are but the major, proposed planks. TPA is interested in the complaints and desires of every Idaho student, since the party is working for the benefit of all Idaho students, according to party President Tom Mitchell.

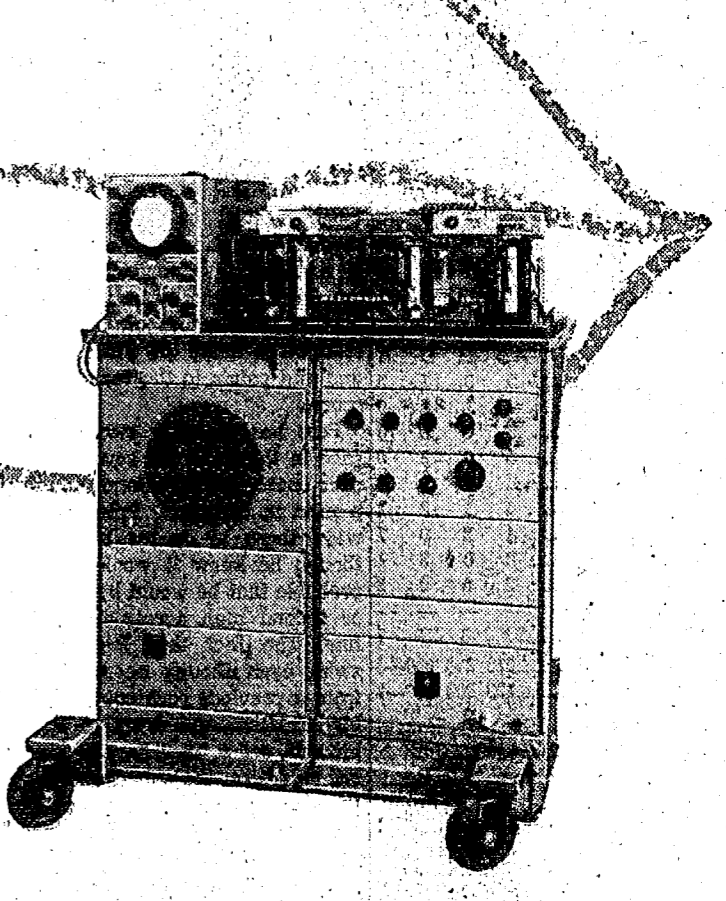

DSP and ATO will play-off for the league I championship early next week with the winner meeting the Town Men for campus honors.

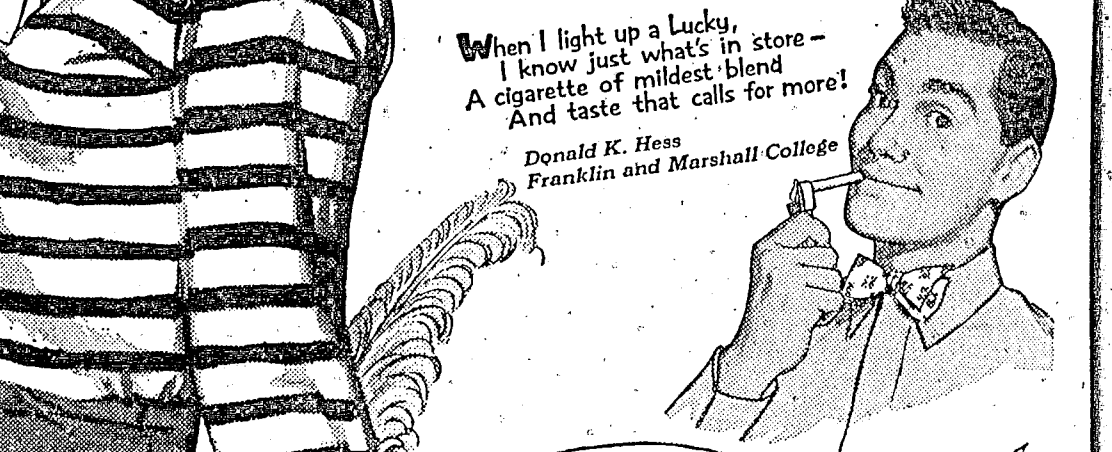
