

How many times can a football team listen to an official penalize them wrongly before they can justifiably say "what's the use?" Why is it so apparent that because Idaho is not usually counted on as a major power we are sent officials who couldn't referee a recess for a kindergarten group. These questions MUST NOT go unanswered.

Good conscience demands that this game be declared "no contest" and the two teams should have an opportunity this year to play a football game, as they were scheduled to do. We are told that if the poor officiating is a result of poor judgment only, then we cannot have this privilege. If that is the rule, we ask you to think twice before you tell us that is the way you look at it.

We are not trying to put you on a spot, Mr. Schmidt. We know that you must be having trouble getting decent officials. But on the other hand, we, the students here at the University, are getting mighty tired of watching outrageous examples such as we witnessed Saturday. As members (even cellar dwelling members) of the Pacific Coast conference, we demand a fair shake with those people.

In closing, we would like to again make it abundantly clear that we have all the respect in the world for the University of Oregon, their president, their coach, and their team. But regardless of what you decide to do about this, we think you would be doing officials Miller, Carrol, and Frazier a distinct favor if you saw to it that they were NEVER assigned to officiate here at the University again.
