# Hosack Tells Of Situation Seen Abroad

"To a large extent, Americans seem to be more anxious to see Europeans unite than the Europeans are themselves," said Dr. Robert E. Hosack, professor of political science, in speaking before the Thursday meeting of the Idaho International Relations club on "Signs of European Unity."

However, he said, there are at present definite signs of a community of nations in Europe, the deliberate Council of Europe, the Schumann plan organization, the European Payments union, the North Atlantic Treaty organization, and the European defense community, now in the process of formulation.

Hosack drew on his experiences in talking to political leaders and common citizens during a six-week tour of Europe last summer. He said that the man-on-the-street mentioned unity more than ever before and mentioned it favorably. He qualified his remarks on the optimistic outlook for European unity by quoting a German businessman: "Anybody with common sense would be for unity, but those who are pretty well off now aren't going to be anxious for a change."

Hosack said that this seems to be the current popular opinion. Hosack said further that unity plans take on a different color in Britain because that nation feels closer political and economic ties with the Commonwealth than with the continent. In addition to this, the British are able to play a more dominant role in Commonwealth affairs than in any possible European union.

Such a union materialize, the British won't be among the first to join, he said. Even at that, they may never join at all, but would only cooperate on an economic and military basis, he concluded.
