University Students Are Determined To 100% Houses Dads To Register At SUB; Break Own Blood Drive Record To Receive Trophies To Be Awarded

A "bloody rally" Monday night will put the nation's "givingest" student body in the proper spirit to roll up their sleeves Tuesday morning and break their own blood drive record.

Those are the plans of Don Mitchell, blood drive chairman, and his campus committee. "Bloody" yells, a theme song, and some fast talking by auctioneer Howard Harris will pace the rally which will begin at 6:15 Monday evening. Head dietician Bernice Moyn has approved serving dinner at 5:30 p.m. in all independent living groups so students may attend the rally.

The Pep Band truck will start in front of the Campus club at 6:15 p.m. Monday, and move past Willis Sweet, up to Ridenbaugh, down Blake avenue and Elm street to the Kappa-DG corner, right to ATO corner, and stop in front of the SUB.

The Boise regional Red Cross mobile blood unit will arrive in

Moscow Monday night. Fifteen nurses and Red Cross personnel under the direction of Dr. E. E. Sestero, will begin blood-letting operation Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock. Donations will be taken each of the three days of the drive until 4:30 p.m.

If the number of donors warrants later hours, they can be arranged, according to Dr. Sestero. Appointment cards will be mailed today and tomorrow to all students who turned in schedule sheets. However, late appointments can be made by calling 4046, or by picking up a schedule sheet at either of the blood drive booths set up in the SUB and the Ad building.

Vets village residents have been or will be, contacted for appointments by members of the University Dames club. For parents who absolutely need a baby sitter in order to give blood, a nursery will be set up in the Town Girl's Lounge of the SUB.

Mitchell warns all prospective donors to "take it easy." It isn't necessary to do without meals before giving blood. Dr. Sestero has asked that donors refrain from eating fatty foods for four hours before giving.

A C-47 transport from the Mountain Home Air Force base will make two stops at the Moscow-Pullman airport to pick up the collected pints and fly them to San Francisco where the blood will be processed before shipping it overseas.

Posters will be distributed to each living group, said Mitchell, and also thermometers to record the percentage of donations.

Intercollegiate Knights and Spurs will assist with the details of the drive. Mrs. Jesse E. Buchanan is in charge of volunteer registered nurses and Mrs. Dawn M. McGee will supervise the nurses aides. The faculty women will preside at the "juice and cookies" counter.

Blood Cups

Blood cups, or cup-size trophies, will be given by the ASUI to each living group making a record of 100 per cent donations in the coming campus blood drive, according to Ray Cox, ASUI president.

The announcement was made yesterday afternoon as challenges and counter-challenges were issued by various living groups.

To solve the problem of who is exempt from giving blood when figuring living group percentages, the blood drive committee appointed an exemption board of three to handle any queries.

Board members are Dick Aston, Mary McDonald, and John Bjorke. The committee also set three specific exemptions:

1. Students under 18 years of age.
2. Students who can't give blood for medical reasons.
3. Athletes in active participation in varsity football, basketball, and cross-country running.

Regarding other athletes, Mack Fleniken, freshman football coach, approved of his "boys" donating blood. He asked, however, that they all give on Tuesday morning if possible.

Coach Frank Young took the same position in regard to his boxers.

Visiting dads will begin registering at 4 p.m. today in the SUB lounge to get the annual Dad's Day festivities underway. The trophy for the greatest percentage of dads in attendance will be awarded on the basis of these registration figures compiled until game time Saturday.

Students who expect to complete their courses by June 30, 1953, may apply.

Full information for the meteorological aid positions may be obtained at first and second-class post offices, or from the United States Civil Service commission, Washington 25, D.C.

Information for the agricultural assistant jobs may be obtained at the placement office or from the head of the department where the appropriate courses are given. All applications must be filed not later than October 21, 1952.

Idaho fans will get their second look of the season at the Vandal football machine Saturday. Coach Babe Curfman's eleven takes on the North Dakota State Bisons at Neale Stadium as the feature of the annual Dad's Day program.

Jack Spts Ready To Shoot Bisons

The visiting team from Fargo has compiled three wins against two defeats this year against mediocre opposition.

To date they have beaten Concordia, Augustana and last week South Dakota State. The two losses—to Iowa State Teachers college andorningside—were attributed to injuries to key men in NDSC lineup.

Coach John Nikevich scouted the Bisons when they downed South Dakota State 48-14 last week. He says they are a squad of hard-hitting gridders who like the game and love to run and pass.

Nineteen lettermen are the nucleus for Coach Mac Wenskunas, a former Illinois great. As a result the Bisons can field a veteran team.

Coach Wenskunas is a former teammate at Illinois of Chuck Gottfried, Idaho line coach, was captain of the Illini in the 1946 Rose Bowl game and was all Big Ten lineman the same year.

NDSC uses a split-T system very much like Idaho. According to Nikevich they are hard-tackling and alert to cash in on opposition mistakes.

Outstanding members of the visiting club include Quarterback Frank Esposito, Halfback Ben Noiland, Fullback John Sowa and End Chuck Thern.

Four of the five games played this season by the Bisons have been played under the lights. This will only be their second afternoon contest.

Idaho has spent all week sharpening up their ground attack in hopes of running over the NDSC squad. If that won't work the passing arm will be unlimbered. Both have received stress in practice.

Statistics Lists Rate Idaho High

Number ten in the nation for rushing defense is the honor held this week by the Idaho football team. In four games the Vandals have held their opponents to a mere 103.5 yards on the ground per game.

On the Pacific Coast they again shine as a unit. In the kickoff returns department they top the heap. They are second behind UCLA in rush defense.

On offense the Vandals are second in rushing and fifth in passing to wind up in fifth position for total offense gains.

Individuals also received their share of the honors on the weekly statistics lists released by the PCC Commissioner's office.

Jay Buhler again leads the kickoff returns column having picked up 43 more yards against Utah State. It is not known whether or not he still leads the nation.

Wayne Anderson is fourth on the Coast in passing. He has completed 25 of 48 for an average of 52.1 per cent, better than Don Heinrich.

Jerry Ogle slipped up to sixth place in pass receiving after his fine performance last week. Ogle has 11 catches for 135 yards.

Jay Buhler is fourth in punt returns and fifth in total scoring with 19 points.
