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Japan's Christian University Is Forerunner Of Peace

"The International Christian university in Japan will prove to be a forerunner of peace," stated Eiichi Okajima, a Japanese student doing research work at an American university.

The ICU, with its international character and Christian idealism, is just the institution that will satisfy the urgent needs of Japan. Japan needs education based on the principle of universal brotherhood with equal opportunities and rights for all. Education must be based on the full recognition of the individual's responsibility toward the promotion of the welfare of society.

Okajima left Yokohama about two and a half years ago, and wanted to discard all the biased education that he had acquired. He wanted to acquire and equip himself with the knowledge and scholarship that would enable him to see things as they stand.

Study In America

"It is my opinion that an American university or college is a wonderful place for a Japanese student to acquire a real education. I wish that every student of Japan could come to the United States for study," continues Okajima.

If the International Christian University had already been established at the time Okajima had come to America, he would certainly have applied for admission to the ICU. Not only from the financial point of view, but for other reasons as well, the ICU would have afforded better opportunities for him than any college or university in the United States.

The plans for ICU call for a university of the highest academic standard and a faculty which will be inferior to none other. In order to assure the opening next April of this unique institution in the Far East, the ICU should be given every possible help, materially as well as spiritually, from all quarters.

Idaho Alum Directs Plant
William A. McIntyre, who received his B.S. degree in chemical engineering from Idaho in 1949, is now a shift supervisor at the new 2.5 million dollar cobalt refinery of the Howe-Sound Mining company in Salt Lake City. He has transferred from the Casper Refinery of the Standard Oil company.

The plant uses a new chemical process which substitutes completely chemical means for the usual smelting process. The technique promises to be so much cheaper than present smelting that many existing facilities may be scrapped.

Initial operations at this plant are being used to "iron out" the new process. When full production is reached, it will increase the world's production of cobalt by 40 per cent, which is about 50 per cent of the U. S. consumption.

Ore for the Salt Lake City plant comes from the Catera company's Blackbird mine near Forney, Idaho. It is the nation's only significant source of cobalt ore.

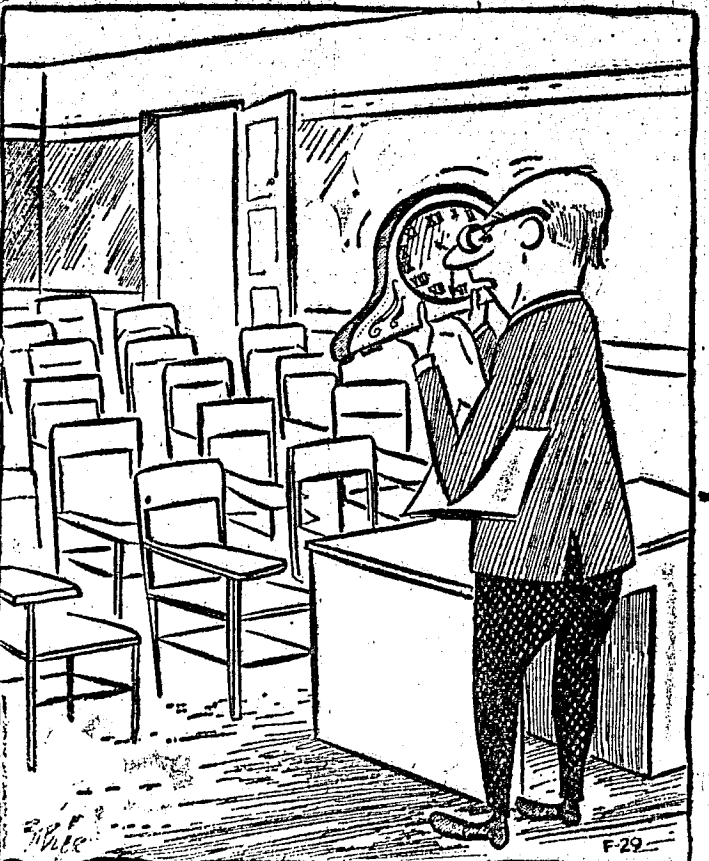
SUB To Be Closed During Vacation

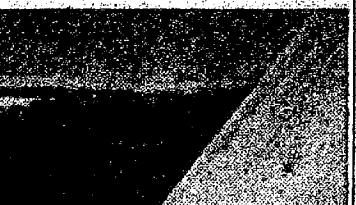
Idaho Spurs Begin Christmas Project

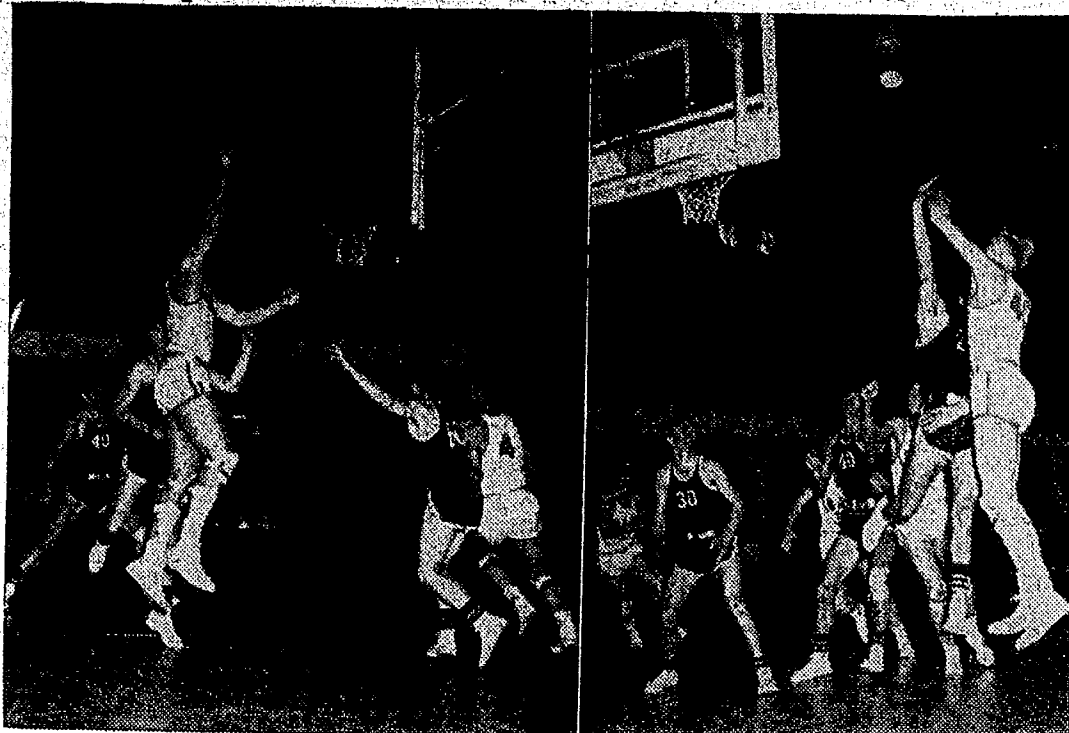

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National Title Is Won By Ray Lewis

Senior defensive end, Ray Lewis, has officially been given national recognition as the collegiate player who has blocked the most punts during one season.

Lewis' honor came at the same time that Idaho was recognized as co-holder of the national team record for blocked punts during a single season.

Ken Hunter, Idaho's publicity director, received the news in a letter from Homer F. Cooke, Jr., director of the NCAA Athletic Bureau which clears all statistics.

Said Cooke: "On the basis of nine punts blocked during the season, Idaho will join Miami, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest in sharing the record."

Concerning Lewis' outstanding mark: "No records are kept covering individuals in blocking punts, since individual credit on blocked punts is not reported to us. Anyway, we'll certainly consider Ray Lewis' six successes as the highest known figure, unless and until someone comes along with something better."

Ray had originally been credited with but five blocks. A sixth against North Dakota State was later officially declared a blocked punt, although he was able only to deflect the kick, limiting it to 10 yards.

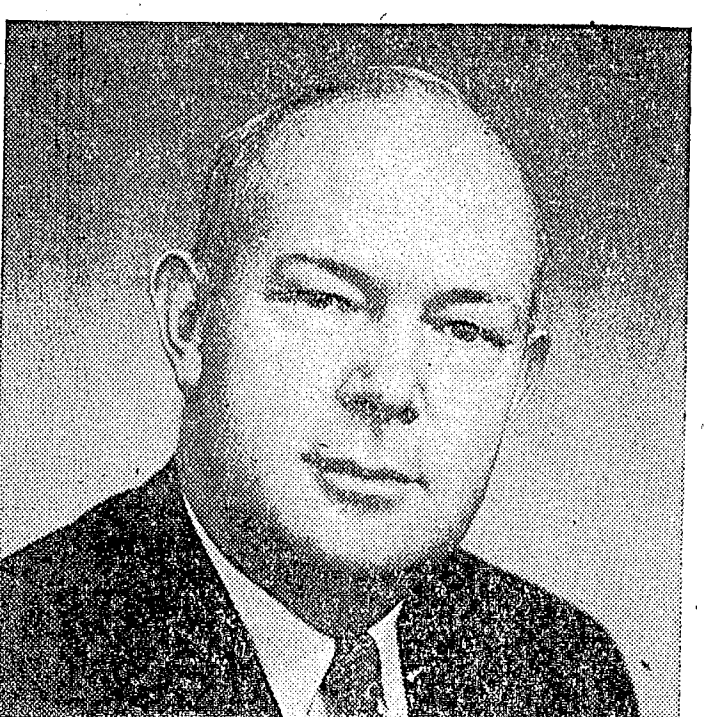
