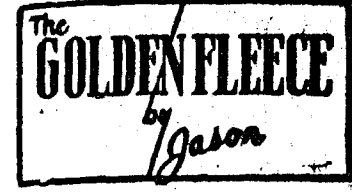


Registrar Reveals Honor List For First Semester

Dormitory Contract Completed

Contract completion for Steel house, new women's cooperative dormitory, has been announced by Lee Tyrrell, superintendent of Commercial Builders, Inc., Moscow construction company handling the building contract.

Tyrrell says the contract will be completed today. Hugh Richardson, architect from Lewiston who designed the building, will then inspect the building.

The building will also be inspected, probably Monday, by a crew of University engineers headed by George Gagon, buildings and grounds superintendent.

If the contract is found to be satisfactorily fulfilled, a University crew under Gagon's direction will move kitchen equipment to the new building from Ridenbaugh hall. The equipment will then be installed by the contractors, according to R. F. Green, director of dormitories.

Green also says adequate furniture for the living and dining rooms will be moved from Ridenbaugh. Study room equipment, consisting of new chairs and dressers, and reconditioned tables and desks, will be moved into the building by Gagon's crew.

David's department store will begin installation of the window drapery as soon as the furniture and kitchen equipment has been installed, says the interior decorator at David's, R. R. Tamplin.

WSSF To Get Part Of Funds

The World Student Service fund will receive 35 per cent of the money collected by the Campus Chest drive, according to the executive board vote last week. This is the largest percentage donated to any one organization by the Campus Chest.

The WSSF offers a program which is concrete, direct, and urgent. One of the most important accomplishments of the organization lies in the field of education for international understanding at college campuses in the country.

The WSSF has recently initiated an extensive program to meet student need. In Israel, the student population at the Hebrew university in Jerusalem has increased by 600 per cent in four years. Although the conditions and buildings at this university are not convenient, the school still grows. New classrooms are being built with the money collected by the WSSF.

The WSSF has also attempted to solve the problem of lack of contact between five different colleges in Beirut by establishing a student center. The organization believes that this center will cut down conflicts between groups and provide fruitful international exchanges.

This is the third in a series of explanatory articles discussing the different organizations being supported by Campus Chest this year.

Idaho Law Student Given Scholarship

Whitman Symmes, Jr., University of Idaho law student from Kellogg, has been awarded \$250 from the Hecla-Bunker Hill Scholarship fund, it was announced today by Dean H. E. Latig, director of student affairs.

The \$100,000 fund was established in 1951 by the Sullivan Mining company of Kellogg to "assist and enable worthy and ambitious young men and women to attend colleges and schools of higher learning in the State of Idaho by means of scholarships, gifts and loans." All recipients must be sons or daughters of employees of the Sullivan Mining company or its affiliated organizations.

State Department Tells Exam Dates In Foreign Service

The U. S. Department of State has recently announced the annual examination for appointment as class 6, foreign service officer.

The examination will be held September 15-17, 1953 in Atlanta, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, Dallas, Denver, Detroit, Honolulu, Los Angeles, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis, St. Paul, Salt Lake City, San Francisco, San Juan, P. R., Seattle, Washington, D. C. and at American Diplomatic posts and consulates abroad.

Appointments are made in the \$4,000 to \$5,000 per annum salary range after successful completion of written, oral, and physical examinations. Candidates must be at least 20 and under 31 years of age by July 1, 1953, a citizen of the United States for at least ten years, and if married, married to an American citizen.

The duties of foreign service officers include negotiation with foreign officials, political reporting, economic reporting in such fields as labor, finance, transportation and communications, commercial reporting and trade promotion, agriculture reporting, issuance of pass ports and visas, and development of cultural and informational programs.

Applications should be forwarded to the Board of Examiners for the Foreign Service, U. S. Department of State, Washington 25, D. C. by July 1, 1953.

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Abe Goff Speaks To Bench And Bar

Abe Goff, Moscow attorney and authority on the subject of military jurisprudence, addressed the Bench and Bar association of the law school Tuesday.

Goff, who spent five years in the judge advocate general division of the army during the war, has done much work in the field of military law and is one of the few civilian lawyers who is privileged to practice before the U. S. Court of Military Appeals, the highest military court in the country. His speech mainly concerned the broader aspects of military jurisprudence.

This meeting was the first in a series planned by the Bench and Bar to provide law students with a broader appreciation and knowledge of the law.

Hart To Speak At Farm Institute

In connection with the farm institutes being held in Idaho counties this month, D. J. Hart, dean of the school of business administration, will speak on "Economy of Idaho" at a farm institute meeting in Pocatello March 4.

The meeting, sponsored by the Tyhee Farm Bureau and the Portneuf Grange in cooperation with Bannock county agent and the Pocatello chamber of commerce will be held at the Bannock hotel.

The institute will emphasize the importance of distribution of economic goods and services, and will deal particularly with the significance of interdependence.

Austrian College Students Hear Lectures In English

Austrian college students are so interested in learning English that they prefer their lectures in that language, was the report received today from Dr. Karl H. Klages of the University staff, who is teaching this year in Austria under a Fulbright act lectureship.

In a letter to President J. E. Buchanan, Klages said that he had gone this month on a week's lecture tour in central and western Austria, speaking on the geography and economy of the Pacific Northwest. He is head of the agronomy department on campus.

At some universities, the Idahoan said that he planned to speak in German, but the students asked that he talk in English. In Austria, he explained, foreign language teachers pass over grammar lightly and stress conversational use.

"Ability of the students to grasp quickly a foreign language is remarkable," Klages added.

Hand-Written Books
In the Alpine village of Admont, he spoke in a monastery noted for its library of 70,000 books, some dating back to the 11th century. Many of the books are hand written.

The Idaho professor attended a lecture for Austrian technical workers given by Dr. Karl Schöber, who recently visited in southern Idaho to observe work on the University's branch experiment stations.

Films Buildings
The Austrian praised the research studies of the University and referred to the "high caliber" of the staff members, but said the buildings are "primitive."

WRA Swim Meet Will Be In March

The WRA intramural swim meet will be held March 28 in the Memorial gym at 1:30 p.m., according to Ernie Gohrband, WRA swim manager.

Requirements for the meet are that the swimmer have two hours of swimming any Saturday morning, beginning now, or that she be enrolled in a swimming class at the present time.

Events will be novelty relays composed of a pajama relay, a balloon relay, and a cracker relay. A novelty relay team is composed of four persons from a living group. Form events are the elementary backstroke and the breast stroke. Speed events are the free style, breast stroke, back crawl and a medley relay of the three combined. This medley team is composed of three swimmers with a limit of two speed events per person.

The diving will require that the entrant do one each of the front, back and an optional dive. The living groups may have any number of teams entered in any of these events. All races will be one length of the pool only.

Beginners or advanced swimmers are eligible.

Audience Held Spellbound By Latest ASUI Release

Laughter echoed from the screen at the end of the film, but not from the spellbound audience who saw last night's ASUI presentation, "The Treasure of Sierra Madre." Bogart, Huston, Holt and Bedoya turned in a job of superb acting.

The human frailties of greed, suspicion, petty meanness, and gross crime were brought to a high climax by the parts portrayed by the entire cast. As the wind had whipped the gold away the movie goers were touched with a sense of man's futility.

Each scene seemed like an opus in itself, presenting one more tidbit to delight the palate of the audience. Through the whole plot there seemed to run the thread of man's unconquerable greed. Each individual lusted for the gold and tried to scheme a way to get it all for himself.

One can well see why this film was one of John Huston's best jobs of directing and writing. I, for one, would like to read the novel by Traven to see if it is as powerful, and appealing, as Huston's movie script.

No Women
As the critics pointed out, "The Treasure of Sierra Madre" was most realistic. Time magazine also commented that this picture did "not wear its art on its sleeve." The story was whirling in the audience's minds before they realized that here was a film of stark simplicity but of the greatest cinematic art.

One minor surprise to the viewers was the complete absence of women from the movie. A single skirt probably would have spoiled the dramatic portent of the plot.

Crawford Selected To Colorado Post

Ivan C. Crawford, 66, former dean of the college of engineering at Idaho, Kansas and Michigan universities, has been appointed director of the Colorado water conservation board, it was learned here today.

Crawford, who retired a year ago from his Michigan post, was appointed to the \$9,120 a year job by the governor of Colorado. While at the University of Idaho in 1933, Crawford was a special consultant to the federal government on water conservation problems.

He will have the task of settling a feud over Colorado river water which has split the east slope and west slope, and threatens to cut off Denver's future growth for lack of water. A native of Leadville, Colo., Crawford is a graduate of the University of Colorado. Since leaving Michigan he has been living at Boulder, Colo.

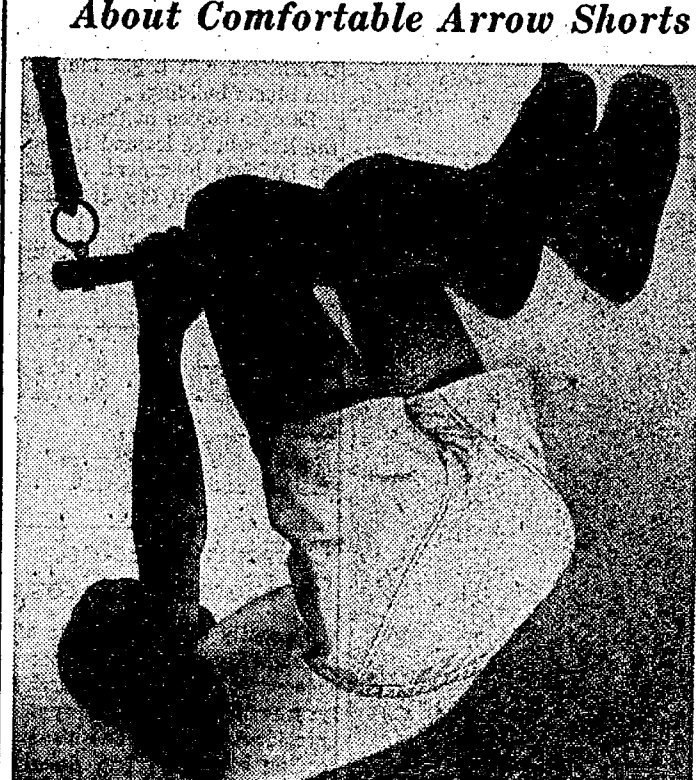
Dean Kerr Attends Accrediting Meet

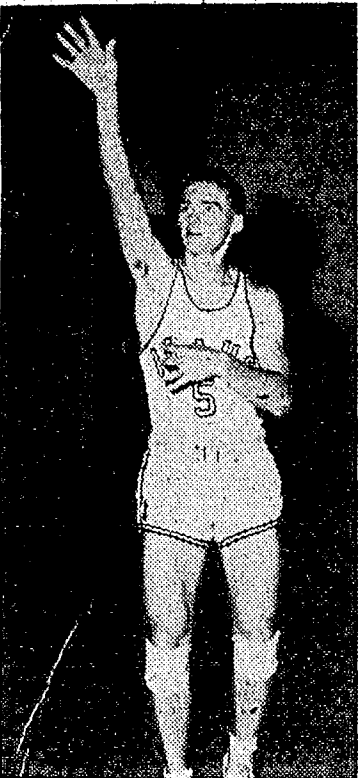

Washington has already wrapped up the Division title and the right to the Pacific Coast playoffs by winning 14 straight league contests. As if this wasn't enough, the team has taken a vow to make it 16 in a row and thereby set a record.
