Theme For Peace Conference Told; Shirer, Lindsay Will Give Addresses

The 1953 theme of the Borah Peace conference being held next Wednesday is "Mutual Security and Technical Assistance Programs as Positive Projects in Solving the Problems of War and Peace."

All University classes will be excused to permit students to attend the conference. The conference will open Wednesday morning in Memorial gymnasium at 9 o'clock with an opening address by University President J. E. Buchanan.

William L. Shirer, author, foreign correspondent, and radio commentator, will present the first address of the conference. "America's Role in Building Global Prosperity and Peace," after the introduction by President Buchanan.

The second address will be given at 1 p.m. in Memorial gymnasium by Kenneth Lindsay, writer on international affairs and former member of the British parliament. Lindsay will speak on "Building Peace and Prosperity in Asia."

Forums Scheduled
The topics of the morning and afternoon addresses will be divided into sections and discussed immediately following the main addresses in forums lasting an hour and a half.

The forums on the first address will be "Mutual security and the American farmer: Are foreign markets the key to farm prosperity?" held in Ag Science 106 and moderated by Dr. Edward C. Moore, chairman of the philosophy department.

The second forum on the first address will be "Mutual security and American industry: Is there a conflict between trade and aid?" This forum will be held in Engineering 104 and will be moderated by Dr. William Folz, head of the department of agricultural economics.

A charter member of the Idaho chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, national professional men's journalism fraternity, he was the chapter's first president.

As a senior Cutler worked part-time for the Publications office, becoming staff editor upon graduation.

The Coyotes had to bow out of the match when Coach Eddie Cole resigned to become manager of the Caldwell Chamber of Commerce. The College of Idaho had boxed earlier this season losing at least one card to Idaho State 1-7.

The loss of this card gives the Vandals a full two week tuning-up period for the PCI boxing championships at Sacramento March 26, 27 and 28.

Next to dumping the Washington Huskies the highlight of Idaho's recent basketball season was the showing made at the Oklahoma City tournament back in December. The Vandals went into the tourney unheralded and proceeded to smack down seeded Western Kentucky 75-60 and rugged Wyoming 66-53.

In the finals the "cinderella" squad from Idaho battled down to the fourth quarter with defense-minded Oklahoma A & M before losing 51-49 in the final seconds.

News stories and radio broadcasts told what a terrific hit the Vandals were making with the fans around Oklahoma City. They were such a sensation that Jay Simon, tournament director, has asked Idaho to come back again.

Says Simon, "Next season we are going to have a four-night tournament with the dates December 28-31. By going to four nights we'll be able to increase our gross take to \$50,000 and also it will give each school a chance to play before the night crowd in the first round."

"From the 1952 field we are inviting back Idaho, Wyoming, Western Kentucky, Oklahoma A & M, Tulsa and Oklahoma City. If all six accept, we'll be replacing only Penn State and Bowling Green."

So far Idaho hasn't accepted the offer in an effort to get what officials consider a more liberal money guarantee. If they do it will be the Vandals' third appearance in the December classic. Chuck Finley's crew, by the way, came out of that latest tourney rated the number 18 team in the country.

Beaver Baseball Club Sets For Defense Of ND Crown

Oregon States defending Western Regional NCAA baseball champions, minus several key players from last year, are still strong enough on paper to take the Northern Division diamond race for the second straight year.

Last season the Washington Huskies were leading the Division when the last place Idaho Vandals smacked them down 9-8 and dropped the Seattle school into a tie with the Beavers. OSC won the play-off.

Coach Ralph Coleman's 1953 club will launch the pre-season campaign with a five-game swing into California, where the Beavers will meet Grant junior college of Sacramento, California, San Jose State and Fresno State. First game is scheduled against Grant on March 23.

Coach Coleman lost seven lettermen from the 1952 squad that whipped USC in the PCC playoffs and then defeated Fresno State for the regional crown, he still has the nucleus for another good team. Biggest question mark appears to be in the outfield and in pitching.

OSC lost Capt. Pete Goodbrod, dependable centerfielder, through graduation, and All-American Dwane Helbig signed a pro contract with the Portland Beavers. Helbig had two years college eligibility remaining.

Missing from the pitching staff are Don White, standout southpaw; Don Hopp, promising freshman right hander who also signed with Portland, and Bud Berg, letterman reserve. Norb Wellman, husky righthander who hurled two playoff victories last spring, will team up with veteran Bailey Brem for mound duties. Brem has been a mainstay the past two years. Southpaws ready for duty are Jim Nierman and Corky Coleman, both up from the jayvees.

Houbregs To Lead Huskies Against Seattle U. Tonight

The "dream game" that Seattle basketball fans have been hoping for and talking about for three years will take place tonight at Corvallis' Gill Coliseum. At 7:30 p.m. the Washington Huskies, PCC hoop champs, collide with high-scoring Seattle university in the opening game of the NCAA western regionals.

Each Puget Sound school will feature an All-American in its starting five. For the Chieftains it will be the fabulous, all-around shot maker Johnny O'Brien. Hook-shot artist Bob Houbregs will spearhead the Husky attack.

The winner tonight will play one of three teams—Wyoming, Hardin-Simmons or Santa Clara for the right to represent the west in the NCAA finals at Kansas City March 17-18. Actually only four games stand between the Huskies and the national title, all tough, however.

Idaho has played both schools in the last few years. Two years ago the Vandals outshot Seattle here 54-36. Johnny O'Brien got exactly half the points, for the Chieftains that night. Washington, of course, was dropped two weeks ago, 64-61, by Chuck Finley's crew.
